1 AN ACT Relating to higher education tuition; amending RCW  
2 28B.10.265, 28B.15.014, 28B.15.031, 28B.15.100, 28B.15.202, 28B.15.225,  
3 28B.15.380, 28B.15.402, 28B.15.515, 28B.15.502, 28B.15.520, 28B.15.522,  
4 28B.15.527, 28B.15.543, 28B.15.545, 28B.15.556, 28B.15.600, 28B.15.615,  
5 28B.15.620, 28B.15.628, 28B.15.725, 28B.15.730, 28B.15.740, 28B.15.750,  
6 28B.15.756, 28B.15.820, 28B.50.259, 28B.70.050, 28B.80.580, and  
7 28B.15.910; creating a new section; repealing RCW 28B.15.824; providing  
8 an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

10 **Sec. 1.** RCW 28B.10.265 and 1992 c 231 s 2 are each amended to read  
11 as follows:

12 Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards  
13 of the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen  
14 State College, and the community colleges may waive all or a portion of  
15 the tuition, operating, and services and activities fees for children  
16 of any person who was a Washington domiciliary and who within the past  
17 eleven years has been determined by the federal government to be a  
18 prisoner of war or missing in action in Southeast Asia, including  
19 Korea, or who shall become so hereafter, if the children meet such

1 other educational qualifications as such institution of higher  
2 education shall deem reasonable and necessary under the circumstances.  
3 Applicants for free or reduced tuition shall provide institutional  
4 administrative personnel with documentation of their rights under this  
5 section.

6 ~~((Before June 30, 1995, no individual waiver program under this  
7 section may be reduced by more than twice the percentage reduction  
8 required in operating fee foregone revenue from tuition waivers in the  
9 biennial state appropriations act.))~~

10 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28B.15.014 and 1992 c 231 s 3 are each amended to read  
11 as follows:

12 Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards  
13 of the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen  
14 State College, and the community colleges may exempt the following  
15 nonresidents from paying all or a portion of the nonresident tuition  
16 fees differential:

17 (1) Any person who resides in the state of Washington and who holds  
18 a graduate service appointment designated as such by a public  
19 institution of higher education or is employed for an academic  
20 department in support of the instructional or research programs  
21 involving not less than twenty hours per week during the term such  
22 person shall hold such appointment.

23 (2) Any faculty member, classified staff member or administratively  
24 exempt employee holding not less than a half time appointment at an  
25 institution who resides in the state of Washington, and the dependent  
26 children and spouse of such persons.

27 (3) Active-duty military personnel stationed in the state of  
28 Washington and the spouses and dependents of such military personnel.

29 (4) Any immigrant refugee and the spouse and dependent children of  
30 such refugee, if the refugee (a) is on parole status, or (b) has  
31 received an immigrant visa, or (c) has applied for United States  
32 citizenship.

33 (5) Domestic exchange students participating in the program created  
34 under RCW 28B.15.725.

35 (6) Any dependent of a member of the United States congress  
36 representing the state of Washington.

4 as follows:

5       The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include the  
6 fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at the  
7 state's colleges and universities but shall not include fees for short  
8 courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, marine  
9 station work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension  
10 courses, and individual instruction and student deposits or rentals,  
11 disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and universities shall  
12 have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, health, and student  
13 activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income derived from  
14 any or all revenue producing lands, buildings and facilities of the  
15 colleges or universities heretofore or hereafter acquired, constructed  
16 or installed, including but not limited to income from rooms,  
17 dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing or student  
18 activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or the  
19 appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be established

34 as follows:

35       (1) The governing boards of the state universities, the regional  
36 universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges  
37 shall charge to and collect from each of the students registering at

1 the particular institution for any quarter or semester such tuition  
2 fees and services and activities fees, and other fees as such board  
3 shall in its discretion determine. The total of all fees shall be  
4 rounded to the nearest whole dollar amount: PROVIDED, That such  
5 tuition fees for other than the summer term shall be in the amounts for  
6 the respective institutions as otherwise set forth in this chapter.

7 (2) Part time students shall be charged tuition and services and  
8 activities fees proportionate to full time student rates established  
9 for residents and nonresidents: PROVIDED, That students registered for  
10 fewer than two credit hours shall be charged tuition and services and  
11 activities fees at the rate established for two credit hours: PROVIDED  
12 FURTHER, That, subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, residents  
13 of Idaho or Oregon who are enrolled in community college district  
14 number twenty for six or fewer credits during any quarter or semester  
15 may be exempted from payment of all or a portion of the nonresident  
16 tuition fees differential upon a declaration by the higher education  
17 coordinating board that it finds Washington residents from the

25 universities and the community colleges may exempt all or a portion of  
26 the additional charge, for students who are registered exclusively in  
27 first professional programs in medicine, dental medicine, veterinary  
28 medicine, or law, or who are registered exclusively in required courses  
29 in vocational preparatory programs.

31 section may be reduced by more than twice the percentage reduction  
32 required in operating fee foregone revenue from tuition waivers in the

34 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.15.202 and 1992 c 231 s 7 are each amended to read  
35 as follows:

36 Tuition fees and maximum services and activities fees at the  
37 University of Washington and at Washington State University for other  
38 than the summer term shall be as follows:

1 (1) For full time resident undergraduate students and all other  
2 full time resident students not in graduate study programs or enrolled  
3 in programs leading to the degrees of doctor of medicine, doctor of  
4 dental surgery, and doctor of veterinary medicine, the total tuition  
5 fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be ((~~thirty-three~~)) ~~thirty-six~~  
6 percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be thirty-seven percent  
7 of the per student undergraduate educational costs at the state  
8 universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070:  
9 PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be one  
10 hundred and twenty dollars. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year  
11 the building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total  
12 tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher  
13 education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the  
14 building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded  
15 up to the nearest half percent.

16 (2) For full time resident graduate and law students not enrolled  
17 in programs leading to the degrees of doctor of medicine, doctor of  
18 dental surgery, and doctor of veterinary medicine, the total tuition  
19 fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be ((~~twenty-three~~)) ~~twenty-~~  
20 five percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be twenty-six  
21 percent of the per student graduate educational costs at the state  
22 universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070:  
23 PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be one  
24 hundred and twenty dollars. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year  
25 the building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total  
26 tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher  
27 education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the  
28 building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded  
29 up to the nearest half percent.

30 (3) For full time resident students enrolled in programs leading to  
31 the degrees of doctor of medicine, doctor of dental surgery, and doctor  
32 of veterinary medicine, the total tuition fees shall be one hundred  
33 sixty-seven percent of such fees charged in subsection (2) of this  
34 section: PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall  
35 be three hundred and forty-two dollars. Beginning with the 1995-96  
36 academic year the building fee for each academic year shall be a  
37 percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated  
38 by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual

1 percentage the building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic  
2 year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.

3 (4) For full time nonresident undergraduate students and such other  
4 full time nonresident students not in graduate study programs or  
5 enrolled in programs leading to the degrees of doctor of medicine,  
6 doctor of dental surgery, or doctor of veterinary medicine, the total  
7 tuition fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be one hundred eight  
8 percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be one hundred twelve  
9 percent of the per student undergraduate educational costs at the state  
10 universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070:  
11 PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be three  
12 hundred and fifty-four dollars. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic  
13 year the building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of  
14 total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher  
15 education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the  
16 building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded  
17 up to the nearest half percent.

18 (5) For full time nonresident graduate and law students not  
19 enrolled in programs leading to the degrees of doctor of medicine,  
20 doctor of dental surgery, and doctor of veterinary medicine, the total  
21 tuition fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be sixty-five percent  
22 and thereafter total tuition fees shall be sixty-seven percent of the  
23 per student graduate educational costs at the state universities  
24 computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That  
25 the building fees for each academic year shall be three hundred and  
26 fifty-four dollars. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year the  
27 building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total  
28 tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher  
29 education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the  
30 building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded  
31 up to the nearest half percent.

32 (6) For full time nonresident students enrolled in programs leading  
33 to the degrees of doctor of medicine, doctor of dental surgery, and  
34 doctor of veterinary medicine, the total tuition fees shall be one  
35 hundred sixty-seven percent of such fees charged in subsection (5) of  
36 this section: PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year  
37 shall be five hundred and fifty-five dollars. Beginning with the 1995-  
38 96 academic year the building fee for each academic year shall be a  
39 percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated

1 by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual  
2 percentage the building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic  
3 year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.

4 (7) The governing boards of the state universities shall charge to  
5 and collect from each student, a services and activities fee. The  
6 governing board may increase the existing fee annually, consistent with  
7 budgeting procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not  
8 to exceed the annual percentage increase in resident undergraduate  
9 tuition fees: PROVIDED, That such percentage increase shall not apply  
10 to that portion of the services and activities fee previously committed  
11 to the repayment of bonded debt. The services and activities fee  
12 committee provided for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a request to the  
13 governing board for a fee increase.

14 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.15.225 and 1992 c 231 s 8 are each amended to read  
15 as follows:

16 Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing board  
17 of the University of Washington may exempt the following students from  
18 the payment of all or a portion of the nonresident tuition fees  
19 differential: Students admitted to the university's school of medicine  
20 pursuant to contracts with the states of Alaska, Montana, or Idaho, or  
21 agencies thereof, providing for a program of regionalized medical  
22 education conducted by the school of medicine; or students admitted to  
23 the university's school of dentistry pursuant to contracts with the  
24 states of Utah, Idaho, or any other western state which does not have  
25 a school of dentistry, or agencies thereof, providing for a program of  
26 regionalized dental education conducted by the school of dentistry.  
27 The proportional cost of the program, in excess of resident student  
28 tuition and fees, will be reimbursed to the university by or on behalf  
29 of participating states or agencies. Subject to the limitations of RCW  
30 28B.15.910, the governing board of Washington State University may  
31 exempt from payment all or a portion of the nonresident tuition  
32 (~~fee[s]~~) fees differential for any student admitted to the University  
33 of Washington's school of medicine and attending Washington State  
34 University as a participant in the Washington, Alaska, Montana, or  
35 Idaho program in this section. Washington State University may reduce  
36 the professional student tuition for students enrolled in this program  
37 by the amount the student pays the University of Washington as a  
38 registration fee.

5       **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.15.380 and 1992 c 231 s 9 are each amended to read  
6 as follows:

7       Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards  
8 of the state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen  
9 State College may exempt the following students from the payment of all  
10 or a portion of tuition fees and services and activities fees:

11       (1) All veterans as defined in RCW 41.04.005: PROVIDED, That such  
12 persons are no longer entitled to federal vocational or educational  
13 benefits conferred by virtue of their military service: AND PROVIDED  
14 FURTHER, That if any such veterans have not resided in this state for  
15 one year prior to registration, the board may exempt the student from  
16 paying up to fifty percent of the nonresident tuition fees  
17 differential. Such exemptions may be provided only to those persons  
18 otherwise covered who were enrolled in universities on or before  
19 October 1, 1977.

20       (2) Children of any law enforcement officer or fire fighter who  
21 lost his or her life or became totally disabled in the line of duty  
22 while employed by any public law enforcement agency or full time or  
23 volunteer fire department in this state: PROVIDED, That such persons  
24 may receive the exemption only if they begin their course of study at  
25 a state-supported college or university within ten years of their  
26 graduation from high school.

31       **Sec. 8.** RCW 28B.15.402 and 1992 c 231 s 10 are each amended to  
32 read as follows:

33       Tuition fees and maximum services and activities fees at the  
34 regional universities and The Evergreen State College for other than  
35 the summer term shall be as follows:

36       (1) For full time resident undergraduate students and all other  
37 full time resident students not in graduate study programs, the total

1 tuition fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be ((~~twenty-five~~)  
2 twenty-seven percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be twenty-  
3 eight percent of the per student undergraduate educational costs at the  
4 regional universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and  
5 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year  
6 shall be seventy-six dollars and fifty cents. Beginning with the 1995-  
7 96 academic year the building fee for each academic year shall be a  
8 percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated  
9 by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual  
10 percentage the building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic  
11 year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.

12 (2) For full time resident graduate students, the total tuition  
13 fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be ((~~twenty-three~~) twenty-  
14 five percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be twenty-six  
15 percent of the per student graduate educational costs at the regional  
16 universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070:  
17 PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be  
18 seventy-six dollars and fifty cents. Beginning with the 1995-96  
19 academic year the building fee for each academic year shall be a  
20 percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated  
21 by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual  
22 percentage the building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic  
23 year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.

24 (3) For full time nonresident undergraduate students and all other  
25 full time nonresident students not in graduate study programs, the  
26 total tuition fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be one hundred  
27 eight percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be one hundred  
28 twelve percent of the per student undergraduate educational costs at  
29 the regional universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and  
30 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year  
31 shall be two hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty cents.  
32 Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year the building fee for each  
33 academic year shall be a percentage of total tuition fees. This  
34 percentage shall be calculated by the higher education coordinating  
35 board and be based on the actual percentage the building fee is of  
36 total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest  
37 half percent.

38 (4) For full time nonresident graduate students, the total tuition  
39 fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be ((~~seventy-five~~) eighty-one

1 percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be eighty-four percent  
2 of the per student graduate educational costs at the regional  
3 universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070:  
4 PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be two  
5 hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty cents. Beginning with the  
6 1995-96 academic year the building fee for each academic year shall be  
7 a percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be  
8 calculated by the higher education coordinating board and be based on  
9 the actual percentage the building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-  
10 95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.

11 (5) The governing boards of each of the regional universities and  
12 The Evergreen State College shall charge to and collect from each  
13 student, a services and activities fee. The governing board may  
14 increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting  
15 procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed  
16 the annual percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition fees:  
17 PROVIDED, That such percentage increase shall not apply to that portion  
18 of the services and activities fee previously committed to the  
19 repayment of bonded debt. The services and activities fee committee  
20 provided for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a request to the governing  
21 board for a fee increase.

22 **Sec. 9.** RCW 28B.15.515 and 1991 c 353 s 1 are each amended to read  
23 as follows:

24 (1) The boards of trustees of the community college districts may  
25 operate summer schools on either a self-supporting or a state-funded  
26 basis.

27 If summer school is operated on a self-supporting basis, the fees  
28 charged shall be retained by the colleges, and shall be sufficient to  
29 cover the direct costs, which are instructional salaries and related  
30 benefits, supplies, publications, and records.

31 Community colleges that have self-supporting summer schools shall  
32 continue to receive general fund state support for vocational programs  
33 that require that students enroll in a four quarter sequence of courses  
34 that includes summer quarter due to clinical or laboratory requirements  
35 and for ungraded courses limited to adult basic education, vocational  
36 apprenticeship, aging and retirement, small business management,  
37 industrial first aid, and parent education.

1       (2)((~~a~~)) The board of trustees of a community college district  
2 may permit the district's state-funded, full-time equivalent enrollment  
3 level, as provided in the (~~operating budget~~) omnibus state  
4 appropriations act, to vary (~~by plus or minus two percent each fiscal~~  
5 ~~year unless otherwise authorized in the operating budget appropriations~~  
6 ~~act~~). If the variance is above the state-funded level, the district  
7 may charge those students above the state-funded level a fee equivalent  
8 to the amount of tuition and fees that are charged students enrolled in  
9 state-funded courses. These fees shall be retained by the colleges.

10       (~~b~~) Any community college that in 1990-91 has an enrollment above  
11 the state-funded level but below the authorized variance may increase  
12 its excess enrollments to within the variance.

13       (c) Community colleges that currently have excess enrollments more  
14 than the authorized variance, by means of enrollments that would have  
15 otherwise been eligible for state funding, shall reduce those excess  
16 enrollments to within the authorized variance by September 1, 1995, in  
17 at least equal annual reductions, commencing with the 1991-92 fiscal  
18 year.

19       (d) ~~Except as permitted by (c) of this subsection, should the~~  
20 ~~number of student supported, full-time equivalent enrollments in any~~  
21 ~~fiscal year fall outside the authorized variance, the college shall~~  
22 ~~return by September 1st to the state general fund, an amount equal to~~  
23 ~~the college's full average state appropriations per full-time~~

27       (3) The state board for community and technical colleges  
28 (~~education~~) shall ensure compliance with this section.

29       **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.15.502 and 1992 c 231 s 11 are each amended to  
30 read as follows:

31       Tuition fees and maximum services and activities fees at each  
32 community college for other than the summer term shall be set by the  
33 state board for community and technical colleges as follows:

34       (1) For full time resident students, the total tuition fees for the  
35 1993-94 academic year shall be (~~twenty-three~~) twenty-five percent and  
36 thereafter total tuition fees shall be twenty-six percent of the per  
37 student educational costs at the community colleges computed as  
38 provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That the building

1 fees for each academic year shall be one hundred and twenty-seven  
2 dollars and fifty cents. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year the  
3 building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total  
4 tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher  
5 education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the  
6 building fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded  
7 up to the nearest half percent.

8 (2) For full time nonresident students, the total tuition fees for  
9 the 1993-94 academic year shall be one hundred eight percent and  
10 thereafter total tuition fees shall be one hundred twelve percent of  
11 the per student educational costs at the community colleges computed as  
12 provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That the building  
13 fees for each academic year shall be four hundred and three dollars and  
14 fifty cents. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year the building fee  
15 for each academic year shall be a percentage of total tuition fees.  
16 This percentage shall be calculated by the higher education  
17 coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the building  
18 fee is of total tuition in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the  
19 nearest half percent.

20 (3) The governing boards of each of the state community colleges  
21 shall charge to and collect from each student a services and activities  
22 fee. Each governing board may increase the existing fee annually,
