37 advocates in dependency matters. The administrator for the courts,

1 after consulting with the association of juvenile court administrators

20 (5) \$325,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal
21 year 2008 is provided solely for the completion of the juror pay pilot
22 and research project.

23 (6) \$830,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal
24 year 2008 and \$1,170,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for
25 fiscal year 2009 are provided solely for improving interpreter services
26 at the trial court level.

27 (a) Of these amounts, \$170,000 for fiscal year 2008 and \$170,000
28 for fiscal year 2009 are provided solely to assist trial courts in
29 developing and implementing language assistance plans. The
30 administrator of the courts, in consultation with the interpreter
31 commission, shall adopt language assistance plan standards consistent

8 funding in this subsection (b) shall not be used to supplant existing

11 recipients shall report to the administrator of the court the amount

32 impact on the state agencies dependent on successful data exchange with
33 the judicial information system and the results of the feasibility
34 studies.

35 (b) The judicial information systems committee shall provide
36 quarterly updates to the appropriate committees of the legislature and
37 the department of information systems on the status of implementation
38 of the core case management system.

1 (c) The legislature respectfully requests the judicial information
2 systems committee invite representatives from the state agencies
3 dependent on successful data exchange to their regular meetings for
4 consultation as nonvoting members.

33 district's maximum levy amount shall be increased by an amount equal to

1 (c) For districts in an interdistrict cooperative agreement, the
2 nonresident school district's maximum levy amount shall be reduced and
3 the resident school district's maximum levy amount shall be increased
4 by an amount equal to the per pupil basic education allocation included
5 in the nonresident district's levy base under subsection (3) of this
6 section multiplied by:

7 (i) The number of full-time equivalent students served from the
8 resident district in the prior school year; multiplied by:

9 (ii) The serving district's maximum levy percentage determined
10 under subsection (5) of this section; increased by:

11 (iii) The percent increase per full-time equivalent student as
12 stated in the state basic education appropriation section of the
13 biennial budget between the prior school year and the current school
14 year divided by fifty-five percent;

15 (d) The district's maximum levy amount shall be reduced by the
16 maximum amount of state matching funds for which the district is
17 eligible under RCW 28A.500.010.

18 (3) For excess levies for collection in calendar year 2005 and
19 thereafter, a district's levy base shall be the sum of allocations in
20 (a) through (c) of this subsection received by the district for the
21 prior school year and the amounts determined under subsection (4) of
22 this section, including allocations for compensation increases, plus
23 the sum of such allocations multiplied by the percent increase per full
24 time equivalent student as stated in the state basic education

26 amount added to a district's levy base pursuant to this subsection
27 (4)(b) by any additional salary increase allocations included in a
28 district's levy base pursuant to the enactment of an initiative to the

30 (5) A district's maximum levy percentage shall be twenty-two
31 percent in 1998 and twenty-four percent in 1999 and every year
32 thereafter; plus, for qualifying districts, the grandfathered
33 percentage determined as follows:

34 (a) For 1997, the difference between the district's 1993 maximum
35 levy percentage and twenty percent; and

36 (b) For 1998 and thereafter, the percentage calculated as follows:

37 (i) Multiply the grandfathered percentage for the prior year times

1 the district's levy base determined under subsection (3) of this

3 (ii) Reduce the result of (b)(i) of this subsection by any levy

15 appropriations act. If levy reduction funds are dependent on formula
16 factors which would not be finalized until after the start of the

18 estimate the total amount of levy reduction funds by using prior school

20 shall not include moneys received by school districts from cities or

25 (8) For the purposes of this section, "current school year" means
26 the year immediately following the prior school year.

27 (9) Funds collected from transportation vehicle fund tax levies
28 shall not be subject to the levy limitations in this section.

29 (10) The superintendent of public instruction shall develop rules
30 and regulations and inform school districts of the pertinent data
31 necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.

32 (11) For calendar year 2009, the office of the superintendent of
33 public instruction shall recalculate school district levy authority to
34 reflect levy rates certified by school districts for calendar year
35 2009.

36 NEW SECTION. Sec. 909. Section 908 of this act expires January 1,
37 2012.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 910.** If any provision of this act or its
2 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
3 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
4 persons or circumstances is not affected.

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 911.** This act is necessary for the immediate
6 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
7 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
8 immediately.
