- 7 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) A student's ability to learn can be
- 8 adversely impacted by a number of factors, including but not limited
- 9 to: Lack of parent involvement and support; child abuse and neglect;
- 10 poverty, including parental unemployment or underemployment; family
- 11 transiency and homelessness; drug and alcohol abuse; poor health and
- 12 nutrition; crime; and peer influence.
- 13 (2) The legislature finds that:
- 14 (a) Prevention and intervention services at the elementary school
- 15 level can offer early identification, encouragement, and follow-up of
- 16 each child's special interests, creative talents, and particular
- 17 abilities as well as identification of and cooperative assistance with
- 18 learning, emotional, environmental, social, or physical obstacles to
- 19 normal child growth and development; and
- 20 (b) The provision of counseling and related prevention and
- 21 intervention services at the elementary school level can contribute to
- 22 enhancement of the classroom environment for students and teachers, and
- 23 better enable students to realize their academic and personal
- 24 potential.
- 25 (c) The legislature finds that services should be provided to the
- 26 extent possible by public or private human service agencies."

- 1 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. Unless the context clearly requires
- 2 otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout sections 2
- 3 through 7 of this act.
- 4 (1) "Child intervention specialist" or "community-based public or
- 5 private human service provider" means a person who provides early
- 6 intervention and prevention services and includes but is not limited to
- 7 services provided by licensed mental health professionals, child
- 8 psychiatrists, health care providers, social service caseworkers or
- 9 social workers, school counselors, school psychologists, school nurses,
- 10 and school social workers.
- 11 (2) "Early grades," "elementary grades," and "elementary level"
- 12 mean kindergarten through grade six and may include preschool age
- 13 children served by the school district.
- 14 (3) "Elementary grades prevention and intervention program" means
- 15 a district-wide program or plan of early detection, prevention, and
- 16 intervention of learning, emotional, environmental, social, or physical
- 17 problems of elementary students, that addresses student and family
- 18 needs; the appropriate use and roles of child intervention specialists,
- 19 including training and necessary supervision; interprofessional
- 20 cooperation; and interagency, public and private, collaboration and
- 21 coordination of the planning, delivery, and evaluation of programs and
- 22 services.
- 23 (4) "Early intervention services" means services that are provided
- 24 to address social and emotional factors that can affect student
- 25 performance and behavior and that are provided when problems just begin
- 26 to emerge.
- 27 (5) "Prevention services" means services that are provided to
- 28 address social and emotional factors that can affect student
- 29 performance and behavior and that are provided to students before
- 30 problems occur.

- 1 (6) "Superintendent" means the superintendent of public 2 instruction."
- 3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) From funds appropriated by the
- 4 legislature, the superintendent shall establish the fair start program
- 5 to assist school districts in providing prevention and intervention
- 6 programs for elementary grade students. The fair start program shall
- 7 not become a part of the state's basic program of education obligation
- 8 as set forth under Article IX of the state Constitution.
- 9 (2) The superintendent shall distribute funds equitably to all
- 10 school districts based on the district's enrollment in grades
- 11 kindergarten through six. However, the allocations for school
- 12 districts enrolling fewer than one thousand full-time equivalent
- 13 students shall be distributed to the educational service district in
- 14 which the district is located. The educational service district shall
- 15 use the allocation to provide early intervention and prevention
- 16 services under a cooperative agreement between the district and the
- 17 educational service district. Educational service districts shall
- 18 coordinate the use of staff and resources to serve school districts.
- 19 Fair start funds shall not be used to replace funding for existing
- 20 activities. However, any district currently providing elementary
- 21 students with prevention and intervention services that loses the
- 22 source of funding for those services, for reasons beyond the control of
- 23 the district, may use fair start funds to continue or enhance the
- 24 existing level of prevention and intervention services.
- 25 (3) Two or more school districts may cooperatively administer an
- 26 elementary prevention and intervention program. An educational service
- 27 district may administer a program on behalf of one or more school
- 28 districts."

- 1 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. (1) School districts and educational
- 2 service districts accepting fair start funds shall submit not later
- 3 than June 1, 1993, the following information to the superintendent of
- 4 public instruction:
- 5 (a) District goals relating to prevention and early intervention
- 6 services for elementary students and the district's plan, based on the
- 7 goals, for providing prevention and early intervention services to
- 8 students. To ensure delivery of appropriate services to students
- 9 through a coordinated network of service providers, districts shall
- 10 document that community-based public and/or private human service
- 11 providers, district-level and building-level staff and administrators,
- 12 and parents participated in developing the goals and plan;
- 13 (b) Documentation of written interagency agreements or contracts
- 14 between school and educational service districts, and public and/or
- 15 private community-based human service providers to provide prevention
- 16 and early intervention services to students;
- 17 (c) Procedures for notifying parents or guardians regarding the
- 18 referral of students for prevention and intervention services and
- 19 liability issues relating to the provision of prevention and
- 20 intervention services to students outside school buildings;
- 21 (d) Use of grant funds for prevention and intervention-related
- 22 inservice purposes, including as necessary and appropriate,
- 23 multicultural in-service training; and
- (e) Other information as requested by the superintendent.
- 25 (2) To the greatest extent possible, the delivery of prevention and
- 26 early intervention services to students:
- 27 (a) Shall not be duplicative of other programs;
- 28 (b) Shall be consistent with the applicable children's mental
- 29 health delivery system developed under chapter 71.36 RCW;

- 1 (c) Shall emphasize the most efficient and cost-effective use of
- 2 fair start funds; and
- 3 (d) Shall be provided on a twelve-month basis.
- 4 (3) When using school personnel to provide prevention and
- 5 intervention services, school districts are encouraged to utilize
- 6 paraprofessionals.
- 7 (4) School districts and educational service districts accepting
- 8 fair start funds shall enter into written interagency agreements with
- 9 community-based public and/or private human service providers to assure
- 10 delivery of appropriate services to students."
- 11 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. (1) Districts shall use fair start funds
- 12 to provide prevention and intervention services to students with
- 13 priority given to students based on need. Districts shall establish
- 14 the criteria determining need.
- 15 (2) Funds from the fair start program regarding health care shall
- 16 be used only for services and information relating to nutrition and
- 17 poor health.
- 18 (3) Nothing under sections 2 through 7 of this act precludes a
- 19 district from incorporating a primary intervention program model or a
- 20 family support worker model as part of the district's fair start
- 21 program."
- 22 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. The superintendent of public instruction
- 23 may adopt rules as necessary under chapter 34.05 RCW to implement
- 24 sections 2 through 5 of this act."
- 25 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. Upon request, the superintendent shall
- 26 provide information to districts regarding how other districts have
- 27 used fair start funds locally or how other districts have established

- 1 interagency agreements with community-based public and/or private human
- 2 service providers under section 4 of this act."
- 3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 8. Sections 2 through 7 of this act are
- 4 each added to chapter 28A.600 RCW."
- 5 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. If any provision of this act or its
- 6 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
- 7 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
- 8 persons or circumstances is not affected."
