- 10 child deaths and the prevention of inaccurate and inappropriate
- 11 designation of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) as a cause of death.

- 13 officers, fire fighters, emergency medical technicians, and other first
- 14 responders in emergency situations are not adequately informed
- 15 regarding sudden, unexplained death in young children including but not
- 16 limited to sudden infant death syndrome, its signs and typical history,
- 17 and as a result may compound the family and child care provider's grief
- 18 through conveyed suspicions of a criminal act. Coroners,
- 19 investigators, and prosecuting attorneys are also in need of updated
- 20 training on the identification of unexplained death in children under
- 21 the age of three, including but not limited to sudden infant death
- 22 syndrome awareness and sensitivity and the establishment of a state-
- 23 wide uniform protocol in cases of sudden, unexplained child death."
- 24 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 43.103
- 25 RCW to read as follows:
- 26 The council shall research and develop an appropriate training
- 27 component on the subject of sudden, unexplained child death, including

- 1 but not limited to sudden infant death syndrome. The training
- 2 component shall include, at a minimum:
- 3 (1) Medical information on sudden, unexplained child death for
- 4 first responders, including awareness and sensitivity in dealing with
- 5 families and child care providers, and the importance of forensically
- 6 competent death scene investigation;
- 7 (2) Information on community resources and support groups available
- 8 to assist families who have lost a child to sudden, unexplained death,
- 9 including sudden infant death syndrome;
- 10 (3) Development and adoption of an up-to-date protocol of
- 11 investigation in cases of sudden, unexplained child death, including
- 12 the importance of a consistent policy of thorough death scene
- 13 investigation, and an autopsy in unresolved cases as appropriate;
- 14 (4) The value of timely communication between the county coroner or
- 15 medical examiner and the public health department, when a sudden,
- 16 unexplained child death occurs, in order to achieve a better
- 17 understanding of such deaths, and connecting families to various
- 18 community and public health support systems to enhance recovery from
- 19 grief.
- The council shall work with volunteer groups with expertise in the
- 21 area of sudden, unexplained child death, including but not limited to
- 22 the SIDS Northwest Regional Center at Children's Hospital, the
- 23 Washington chapter of the national SIDS foundation, and the Washington
- 24 association of county officials.
- 25 Upon development of an appropriate curriculum, agreed upon by the
- 26 council, the training module shall be offered to first responders,
- 27 coroners, medical examiners, prosecuting attorneys serving as coroners,
- 28 and investigators, both voluntarily through their various associations
- 29 and as a course offering at the criminal justice training center."
