2 lapse."

5 (1) Appropriations made in this act to the department of social and
6 health services shall initially be allotted as required by this act.
7 Subsequent allotment modifications shall not include transfers of
8 moneys between sections of this act except as expressly provided in
9 this act, nor shall allotment modifications permit moneys that are
10 provided solely for a specified purpose to be used for other than that
11 purpose.

12 (2) The department of social and health services shall not initiate
13 any services that will require expenditure of state general fund moneys
14 unless expressly authorized in this act or other law, or unless the
15 services were provided on March 1, 1991. The department may seek,
16 receive, and spend, under RCW 43.79.260 through 43.79.282, federal
17 moneys not anticipated in this act as long as the federal funding does
18 not require expenditure of state moneys for the program in excess of
19 amounts anticipated in this act. If the department receives
20 unanticipated unrestricted federal moneys, except maternal and child
21 health block grant moneys, those moneys shall be spent for services
22 authorized in this act, and an equal amount of appropriated state
23 general fund moneys shall lapse. As used in this subsection,
24 "unrestricted federal moneys" includes block grants and other funds
25 that federal law does not require to be spent on explicitly defined
26 projects or matched on a formula basis by state funds.

27 (3) The department of social and health services is authorized to
28 expend federal funds made available by the federal immigration reform
29 and control act, P.L. 99-603, for the purposes contained in that act.

1 (4) From federal funds received by the department of social and
2 health services, the department shall allot sufficient amounts to
3 provide federally funded employees with salary and benefit increases
4 equivalent to the increases provided in this act for classified state
5 employees under the jurisdiction of the state personnel board.

6 (5) Appropriations contained in sections 202 through 214 of this
7 part are provided to implement Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill No.
8 5540 (infectious disease immunizations).

9 (6)(a) The department, pursuant to its authority under RCW
10 43.20B.020, shall adopt a schedule of fees, based on the recipient's
11 ability to pay, to be charged during the 1991-93 fiscal biennium for
12 the following services: (i) Involuntary commitment under chapter 71.05
13 RCW; (ii) inpatient mental health services for minors under chapter
14 71.34 RCW; (iii) senior citizen services under chapter 74.38 RCW; and
15 (iv) family reconciliation services under chapter 13.32A RCW. In
16 adopting the fee schedules, the department may provide to each family
17 a one-time one hundred dollar exemption to encourage early access to
18 services.

19 (b) \$737,000 of the general fund--state appropriation to the
20 division of revenue collections is provided solely for the
21 administration and collection of the fees imposed pursuant to this
22 subsection. \$470,000 of the general fund--state appropriation to the
23 community services administration program is provided solely to
24 annually determine financial responsibility of households affected by
25 the fee schedules adopted under this subsection. If the fees are not
26 imposed under (a) of this subsection, the amounts provided in this
27 subsection shall lapse.

28 (7) The department shall not enter into any contracts or require
29 the expenditure of any funds provided in this act which would permit
30 the transfer of any property currently on the grounds of Western state

1 hospital to Pierce county or any other entity without direct and

1 units per thousand vocational and handicapped full time equivalent
2 students.

3 (g) For each nonhigh school district having an enrollment of more
4 than seventy annual average full time equivalent students and less than
5 one hundred eighty students, operating a grades K-8 program or a grades
6 1-8 program, an additional one-half of a certificated instructional
7 staff unit.

8 (h) For each nonhigh school district having an enrollment of more
9 than fifty annual average full time equivalent students and less than
10 one hundred eighty students, operating a grades K-6 program or a grades
11 1-6 program, an additional one-half of a certificated instructional
12 staff unit.

13 (3) Allocations for classified salaries for the 1991-92 and 1992-93
14 school years shall be calculated using formula-generated classified
15 staff units determined as follows:

16 (a) For enrollments generating certificated staff unit allocations
17 under subsection (2) (d) through (h) of this section, one classified
18 staff unit for each three certificated staff units allocated under such
19 subsections.

20 (b) For all other enrollment in grades kindergarten through twelve,
21 including vocational but excluding handicapped full time equivalent
22 enrollments, one classified staff unit for each sixty average annual
23 full time equivalent students.

24 (c) For each nonhigh school district with an enrollment of more
25 than fifty annual average full time equivalent students and less than
26 one hundred eighty students, an additional one-half of a classified
27 staff unit.

28 (4) Fringe benefit allocations shall be calculated at a rate of
29 21.11 percent in the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years of certificated
30 salary allocations provided under subsection (2) of this section, and

1 a rate of 18.84 percent in the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years of
2 classified salary allocations provided under subsection (3) of this
3 section.

4 (5) Insurance benefit allocations shall be calculated at the rates
5 specified in section 506 of this act, based on:

6 (a) The number of certificated staff units determined in subsection
7 (2) of this section; and

8 (b) The number of classified staff units determined in subsection
9 (3) of this section multiplied by 1.152. This factor is intended to
10 adjust allocations so that, for the purposes of distributing insurance
11 benefits, full time equivalent classified employees may be calculated
12 on the basis of 1440 hours of work per year, with no individual
13 employee counted as more than one full time equivalent.

14 (6)(a) For nonemployee related costs associated with each
15 certificated staff unit allocated under subsection (2) (a), (b), and
16 (d) through (h) of this section, there shall be provided a maximum of

2 1990-91 school year.

3 (8) The superintendent may distribute a maximum of \$4,546,000
4 outside the basic education formula during fiscal years 1992 and 1993
5 as follows:

6 (a) For fire protection for school districts located in a fire
7 protection district as now or hereafter established pursuant to chapter
8 52.04 RCW, a maximum of \$375,000 may be expended in each fiscal year.

9 (b) For summer vocational programs at skills centers, a maximum of
10 \$1,762,000 may be expended in fiscal year 1992 and a maximum of
11 \$1,762,000 may be expended in fiscal year 1993.

12 (c) A maximum of \$272,000 may be expended for school district
13 emergencies.

14 (9) For the purposes of RCW 84.52.0531, the increase per full time
15 equivalent student in state basic education appropriations provided
16 under this act, including appropriations for salary and benefits
17 increases, is 5.7 percent from the 1990-91 school year to the 1991-92
18 school year, and 4.6 percent from the 1991-92 school year to the
19 1992-93 school year.

20 (10) A maximum of \$2,450,000 may be expended in the 1991-92 fiscal
21 year and a maximum of \$2,450,000 may be expended in the 1992-93 fiscal
22 year for high technology vocational equipment for secondary vocational
23 education programs and skill centers.

24 (11)(a) For each school year, the funding provided under subsection
25 (2)(a)(ii) of this section shall be based on a ratio of 54.3
26 certificated instructional staff per thousand students in kindergarten
27 through grade three only if the district documents an actual ratio of
28 at least 54.3 full time basic education certificated instructional
29 staff per thousand full time equivalent students at those grade levels.

1 (b) Districts at or above 52.3 certificated instructional staff per
2 one thousand full time equivalent students may dedicate up to 1.3 of
3 the 54.3 funding ratio to employ classified instructional assistants
4 assigned to basic education classrooms in kindergarten through grade
5 three. For any school district documenting a lower ratio, the funding
6 provided under subsection (2)(a)(ii) of this section shall be based on
7 the district's actual K-3 ratio achieved in that school year, or the
8 statutory minimum ratio established under RCW 28A.150.260(2)(c), if

10 (c) Districts may not use allocations provided above the statutory

3 (a) General apportionment (basic education), section 502;

4 (b) Pupil transportation, section 506;

16 (d) "LEAP Document 1C" means the computerized tabulation
17 establishing staff mix factors for basic education certificated

21 (e) "LEAP Document 12" means the computerized tabulation of 1990-
22 91, 1991-92, and 1992-93 school year salary allocations for basic
23 education certificated administrative staff and basic education
24 classified staff and derived base salaries for basic education
25 certificated instructional staff as developed by the legislative
26 evaluation and accountability program committee on April 8, 1991, at
27 13:30 hours.

28 (3) Incremental fringe benefits factors shall be applied to salary
29 increases at a rate of 1.2047 for certificated salaries and 1.1534 for

1 (4) The increase for each certificated administrative staff unit
2 provided under section 502 of this act shall be the 1990-91 state-wide

5 (1) \$74,253,000 of the general fund--state appropriation,
6 \$18,555,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation, and \$47,805,000
7 of the special fund salary and insurance contribution increase
8 revolving fund appropriation are provided for the following salary
9 increases:

10 (a) A 4.0 percent across-the-board increase effective January 1,
11 1992, and an additional 3.5 percent across-the-board increase effective
12 January 1, 1993, for all classified and exempt employees under the
13 state personnel board and commissioned officers of the Washington state
14 patrol; and

15 (b) For state classified and exempt employees whose salaries are
16 determined by the comprehensive salary survey, an additional increase
17 effective January 1, 1992, which, when calculated in combination with

17 of contracts with a single firm or individual having a value exceeding
18 one hundred thousand dollars without the written approval of the office

22 performance audit of state contracting for personal services. The

28 (5) The state treasurer shall report by September 1 of each year to

3 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 907. EMPLOYMENT RECRUITING.** A state agency
4 seeking to fill a vacant position within the agency shall not use

6 organization outside of state government for assistance or advice in

8 recruitment division of the department of personnel. This section does

19 expenditure savings realized by affected state agencies as a result of
20 the implementation of the recommendations of the motor pool review team
21 of the governor's commission on efficiency and accountability in
22 government. Periodically during the 1991-93 fiscal biennium and by
23 June 30, 1993, the director of financial management shall withhold from
24 agency appropriations and deposit in the savings recovery account at
25 least \$4,300,000 as a result of these savings recommendations.

26 (3) The director of financial management shall identify the
27 expenditure savings realized by affected state agencies as a result of
28 the implementation of furniture acquisition study by the governor's

1 commission on efficiency and accountability in government.
2 Periodically during the 1991-93 fiscal biennium and by June 30, 1993,
3 the director of financial management shall withhold from agency
4 appropriations and deposit in the savings recovery account at least
5 \$1,100,000 as a result of these savings recommendations.

6 (4) In order to provide for the self-supporting operations of the
7 state productivity board during the 1991-93 fiscal biennium, the
8 director of financial management shall withhold from funds appropriated
9 to state agencies in this act a portion of the savings that are
10 realized as a result of the state employees' suggestion award and
11 incentive pay program under chapter 41.60 RCW. The funds withheld
12 under this subsection shall equal at least \$570,000 and shall be
13 deposited in the savings recovery account.

14 (5) The director of financial management shall withhold from funds
15 appropriated to state agencies at least \$2,759,000 to reflect reduced
16 billings to state agencies for payments to the data processing
17 revolving fund. These reductions are the result of reduced
18 expenditures by the department of information services for the approval
19 of feasibility study and other services formerly provided by the
20 department's policy and planning division. The amount withheld under
21 this subsection shall be deposited in the savings recovery account."

22 "Sec. 909. RCW 43.19.1923 and 1987 c 504 s 17 are each amended to
23 read as follows:

24 There is created within the department of general administration a
25 revolving fund to be known as the ((^u))central stores revolving
26 fund((^u)), which shall be used for the purchase of supplies and
27 equipment handled or rented through central stores, and the payment of
28 salaries, wages, and other costs incidental to the acquisition,
29 operation, and maintenance of the central stores, and other activities

1 connected therewith, which shall include utilities services.
2 Disbursements from the fund for the purchasing and contract
3 administration activities of the division of purchasing within the
4 department are subject to appropriation and allotment procedures under
5 chapter 43.88 RCW. Disbursements for all other activities within the
6 central stores are not subject to appropriation. The fund shall be
7 credited with all receipts from the rental, sale or distribution of
8 supplies, equipment, and services rendered to the various state
9 agencies. Central stores, utilities services, and other activities
10 within the central stores revolving fund shall be treated as separate
11 operating entities for financial and accounting control. Financial
12 records involving the central stores revolving fund shall be designed
13 to provide data for achieving maximum effectiveness and economy of each
14 individual activity within the fund."

15 "Sec. 910. RCW 43.08.250 and 1985 c 57 s 27 are each amended to
16 read as follows:

17 The money received by the state treasurer from fees, fines,
18 forfeitures, penalties, reimbursements or assessments by any court
19 organized under Title 3 or 35 RCW, or chapter 2.08 RCW, shall be
20 deposited in the public safety and education account which is hereby
21 created in the state treasury. The legislature shall appropriate the
22 funds in the account to promote traffic safety education, highway
23 safety, criminal justice training, crime victims' compensation,
24 judicial education, the judicial information system, winter recreation
25 parking, and state game programs. All earnings of investments of
26 balances in the public safety and education account shall be credited
27 to the general fund. During the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 1993,
28 the legislature may appropriate moneys from the public education and
29 safety account for the purposes of local jail population data

1 collection under RCW 10.98.130, the department of corrections'
2 community partnership program under RCW 72.09.300, the treatment
3 alternatives to street crimes program, the criminal litigation unit of
4 the attorney general's office, contracts with county prosecuting
5 attorneys to provide paternity establishment services, and grants to
6 local law enforcement agencies under the crimestoppers program to
7 increase public involvement in the prevention and solution of crimes."

8 "Sec. 911. RCW 41.60.050 and 1987 c 387 s 4 are each amended to
9 read as follows:

10 The legislature shall appropriate from the department of personnel
11 service fund for the payment of administrative costs of the
12 productivity board. However, during the 1991-93 fiscal biennium, the
13 administrative costs of the productivity board shall be appropriated
14 from the savings recovery account."

15 "Sec. 912. RCW 43.09.270 and 1982 c 206 s 1 are each amended to
16 read as follows:

17 The expense of maintaining and operating the division shall be paid
18 out of the state general fund: PROVIDED, That those expenses directly
19 related to the prescribing of accounting systems, training, maintenance
20 of working capital including reserves for late and uncollectable
21 accounts and necessary adjustments to billings, and field audit
22 supervision, shall be considered as expenses of auditing public
23 accounts within the meaning of RCW 43.09.280 and 43.09.282, and shall
24 be prorated for that purpose equally among all entities directly
25 affected by such service.

26 During the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 1993, the expense of
27 maintaining and operating the division of municipal corporations shall
28 be paid from the municipal revolving fund under RCW 43.09.282."

1 **"Sec. 913.** RCW 43.23.035 and 1986 c 202 s 1 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 The department of agriculture is hereby designated as the agency of
4 state government for the administration and implementation of state
5 agricultural market development programs and activities, both domestic
6 and foreign, and shall, in addition to the powers and duties otherwise
7 imposed by law, have the following powers and duties:

8 (1) To study the potential marketability of various agricultural
9 commodities of this state in foreign and domestic trade;

10 (2) To collect, prepare, and analyze foreign and domestic market
11 data;

12 (3) To establish a program to promote and assist in the marketing
13 of Washington-bred horses: PROVIDED, That the department shall present
14 a proposal to the legislature no later than December 1, 1986, that
15 provides for the elimination of all state funding for the program after
16 June 30, 1989;

17 (4) To encourage and promote the sale of Washington's agricultural
18 commodities and products at the site of their production through the
19 development and dissemination of referral maps and other means;

20 (5) To encourage and promote those agricultural industries, such as
21 the wine industry, which attract visitors to rural areas in which other
22 agricultural commodities and products are produced and are, or could
23 be, made available for sale;

24 (6) To encourage and promote the establishment and use of public
25 markets in this state for the sale of Washington's agricultural
26 products;

27 (7) To maintain close contact with foreign firms and governmental
28 agencies and to act as an effective intermediary between foreign
29 nations and Washington traders;

1 (8) To publish and disseminate to interested citizens and others
2 information which will aid in carrying out the purposes of chapters
3 43.23, 15.64, 15.65, and 15.66 RCW;

4 (9) To encourage and promote the movement of foreign and domestic
5 agricultural goods through the ports of Washington;

6 (10) To conduct an active program by sending representatives to, or
7 engaging representatives in, foreign countries to promote the state's
8 agricultural commodities and products;

9 (11) To assist and to make Washington agricultural concerns more
10 aware of the potentials of foreign trade and to encourage production of
11 those commodities that will have high export potential and appeal;

12 (12) To coordinate the trade promotional activities of appropriate
13 federal, state, and local public agencies, as well as civic
14 organizations; and

15 (13) To develop a coordinated marketing program with the department
16 of trade and economic development, utilizing existing trade offices and
17 participating in mutual trade missions and activities.

18 The department of agriculture shall assess a fee for services
19 provided under the agricultural market development program during the
20 fiscal biennium ending June 30, 1993. The revenue derived from these
21 fees shall be deposited in the agricultural local account.

22 As used in this section, "agricultural commodities" includes
23 products of both terrestrial and aquatic farming."

24 "**Sec. 914.** RCW 43.43.670 and 1980 c 69 s 2 are each amended to
25 read as follows:

26 There is created in the Washington state patrol a crime laboratory
27 system which is authorized to:

28 (1) Provide laboratory services for the purpose of analyzing and
29 scientifically handling any physical evidence relating to any crime.

1 (2) Provide training assistance for local law enforcement
2 personnel.

3 The crime laboratory system shall assign priority to a request for
4 services with due regard to whether the case involves criminal activity
5 against persons. The Washington state advisory council on criminal
6 justice services shall assist the crime laboratory system in devising
7 policies to promote the most efficient use of laboratory resources
8 consistent with this section.

9 During the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 1993, the state patrol
10 shall establish a schedule of fees to be collected from those federal
11 and local governmental entities requesting crime laboratory services.
12 The fees shall recover at least thirty percent of the total cost
13 incurred in the crime laboratory operations. The fee revenue shall be
14 deposited by the state patrol in the state general fund and
15 appropriated exclusively for the operations of the laboratories."

16 "Sec. 915. RCW 9.46.100 and 1985 c 405 s 505 are each amended to
17 read as follows:

18 There is hereby created (~~(a fund to be known as)~~) the ((¹))gambling
19 revolving fund((¹)) which shall consist of all moneys receivable for
20 licensing, penalties, forfeitures, and all other moneys, income, or
21 revenue received by the commission. The state treasurer shall be
22 custodian of the fund. All moneys received by the commission or any
23 employee thereof, except for change funds and an amount of petty cash
24 as fixed by rule or regulation of the commission, shall be deposited
25 each day in a depository approved by the state treasurer and
26 transferred to the state treasurer to be credited to the gambling
27 revolving fund. Disbursements from the revolving fund shall be on
28 authorization of the commission or a duly authorized representative
29 thereof. In order to maintain an effective expenditure and revenue

1 control the gambling revolving fund shall be subject in all respects to
2 chapter 43.88 RCW but no appropriation shall be required to permit
3 expenditures and payment of obligations from such fund. All expenses
4 relative to commission business, including but not limited to salaries
5 and expenses of the director and other commission employees shall be
6 paid from the gambling revolving fund.

7 The (~~office of financial management may direct the~~) state
8 treasurer (~~to loan~~) shall transfer to the general fund (~~an amount~~
9 ~~not to exceed \$1,400,000~~) one million dollars from the gambling
10 revolving fund for the (~~1983-85~~) 1991-93 fiscal biennium."

11 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 916. EMERGENCY FUND ALLOCATIONS. Whenever
12 allocations are made from the governor's emergency fund appropriation
13 to an agency that is financed in whole or in part by other than general
14 fund moneys, the director of financial management may direct the
15 repayment of such allocated amount to the general fund from any balance
16 in the fund or funds which finance the agency. No appropriation shall
17 be necessary to effect such repayment."

18 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 917. STATUTORY APPROPRIATIONS. In addition to
19 the amounts appropriated in this act for revenue for distribution,
20 state contributions to the law enforcement officers' and fire fighters'
21 retirement system, and bond retirement and interest including ongoing
22 bond registration and transfer charges, transfers, interest on
23 registered warrants, and certificates of indebtedness, there is also
24 appropriated such further amounts as may be required or available for
25 these purposes under any statutory formula or under any proper bond
26 covenant made under law."

1 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 918. BOND EXPENSES.** In addition to such other
2 appropriations as are made by this act, there is hereby appropriated to
3 the state finance committee from legally available bond proceeds in the
4 applicable construction or building funds and accounts such amounts as
5 are necessary to pay the expenses incurred in the issuance and sale of
6 the subject bonds."

7 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 919. LEGISLATIVE FACILITIES.** Notwithstanding
8 RCW 43.01.090, the house of representatives, the senate, and the
9 permanent statutory committees shall pay expenses quarterly to the
10 department of general administration facilities and services revolving
11 fund for services rendered by the department for operations,
12 maintenance, and supplies relating to buildings, structures, and
13 facilities used by the legislature for the biennium beginning July 1,
14 1991."

15 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 920. AGENCY REIMBURSEMENTS.** Amounts received
16 by an agency as reimbursements pursuant to RCW 39.34.130 shall be
17 considered as returned loans of materials supplied or services
18 rendered. Such amounts may be expended as a part of the original
19 appropriation from the fund to which it belongs, without further or
20 additional appropriation, subject to conditions and procedures
21 prescribed by the director of financial management, which shall provide
22 for determination of full costs, disclosure of such reimbursements in
23 the governor's budget, maximum interagency usage of data processing
24 equipment and services, and such restrictions as will promote more
25 economical operations of state government without incurring continuing
26 costs beyond those reimbursed."
