## SENATE BILL 5474

State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

By Senators Rinehart, Bailey, Murray, West and Bauer.

Read first time February 1, 1991. Referred to Committee on Education.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to a data collection and reporting system on
- 2 children's education and well-being; creating new sections; making an
- 3 appropriation; and providing an expiration date.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A task force is created to plan a state
- 6 system for the efficient collection and reporting of data about
- 7 conditions affecting the education and well-being of children. The
- 8 purpose of the system is to provide school districts and local and
- 9 state policymakers convenient access to demographic information from
- 10 existing sources that is, to the extent feasible, consistently
- 11 organized by school, school district, and other boundaries useful to
- 12 the ongoing planning and evaluation of local and state programs,
- 13 practices, and activities to benefit children. The Washington state
- 14 institute for public policy shall coordinate and staff the task force,
- 15 and may contract for technical consulting services as needed.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** (1) One representative shall be
- 2 appointed to the task force created in section 1 of this act from each
- 3 of the following: Office of the superintendent of public instruction,
- 4 department of social and health services, department of health,
- 5 employment security department, department of community development,
- 6 office of financial management, the administrator for the courts, the
- 7 Washington state association of counties, and the association of
- 8 Washington cities.
- 9 (2) The task force shall select a chair from among its members.
- 10 (3) The task force shall seek consultation and review of its plan
- 11 from the department of information services, the Washington school
- 12 information processing cooperative, educational service districts,
- 13 school districts, groups representing racial and ethnic minorities, and
- 14 other interested parties.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** The task force shall, by December 1,
- 16 1991, submit to the legislature, through the director of the Washington
- 17 state institute for public policy, a plan for a state system of
- 18 collecting and reporting data from existing information sources about
- 19 conditions affecting the education and well-being of children. The
- 20 plan shall present options and make recommendations both for activities
- 21 that can be phased in over one to two years and for activities that can
- 22 be phased in over three or more years. The plan shall at a minimum:
- 23 (1) Provide for the establishment, management, and administration
- 24 of the system with emphasis on the efficient use of existing resources;
- 25 (2) Describe the system's inclusion of geographic information
- 26 technology and linkage to the Washington school information processing
- 27 cooperative, the data collection and reporting systems of state
- 28 agencies that serve children, the office of financial management, the
- 29 courts, and other relevant organizations;

- 1 (3) Enumerate the types of data to be made available through the
- 2 system and describe how each type of data is to be collected and
- 3 reported, including recommendations for any measures necessary to
- 4 ensure the adequate collection and reporting of such data. Data
- 5 reported shall be aggregated by school districts and other geographical
- 6 units and shall include but not be limited to:
- 7 (a) Census data;
- 8 (b) Juvenile and adult employment and unemployment data by age,
- 9 gender, and race or ethnicity;
- 10 (c) Vital records, including adolescent pregnancy and birth
- 11 statistics by age, and race or ethnicity of mother;
- 12 (d) Reported cases of juvenile and adult crime by age, gender, and
- 13 race or ethnicity;
- 14 (e) Reported cases of child abuse and neglect by age, gender, and
- 15 race or ethnicity of child;
- 16 (f) Child and adult health indicators, including indicators of
- 17 mental health and substance abuse, by age, gender, and race or
- 18 ethnicity;
- 19 (g) Child social services participation;
- 20 (h) Free and reduced price lunch participation;
- 21 (i) Educational attainment, including rates of graduation, GED
- 22 completion, and school dropout; and
- 23 (j) Student population characteristics such as age, gender, race or
- 24 ethnicity, first language, disability status, and standardized test
- 25 scores;
- 26 (4) Provide for the development of common data definitions and
- 27 common reporting timelines;
- 28 (5) Provide a standardized means by which each school district may,
- 29 at the school district's discretion, use the system to input
- 30 individual-level data on student background characteristics, such as

- 1 family income, parents' education, family status, mobility, grade point
- 2 average, scholastic aptitude test scores, and course or competency
- 3 requirements completed, and have access to that data in combination
- 4 with the demographic data;
- 5 (6) Provide for appropriate confidentiality and privacy safeguards;
- 6 (7) Describe how the system may be accessed;
- 7 (8) Provide for quality control;
- 8 (9) Provide for the ongoing evaluation and modification of the
- 9 system to meet the needs of the system's users; and
- 10 (9) Include a budget and timeline for implementation.
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The sum of forty-nine thousand dollars,
- 12 or as much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the
- 13 biennium ending June 30, 1993, from the general fund to the Washington
- 14 institute for public policy for the purposes of this act.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** This act shall expire December 1, 1991.
