SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5542

State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to child death investigations and training; adding
- 2 a new section to chapter 43.103 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds and declares that
- 5 sudden and unexplained child deaths are a leading cause of death for
- 6 children under age three. The public interest is served by research
- 7 and study of the potential causes and indications of such unexplained
- 8 child deaths and the prevention of inaccurate and inappropriate
- 9 designation of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) as a cause of death.
- 10 The legislature further finds and declares that law enforcement
- 11 officers, fire fighters, emergency medical technicians, and other first
- 12 responders in emergency situations are not adequately informed
- 13 regarding sudden, unexplained death in young children including but not
- 14 limited to sudden infant death syndrome, its signs and typical history,
- 15 and as a result may compound the family and child care provider's grief

- 1 through conveyed suspicions of a criminal act. Coroners,
- 2 investigators, and prosecuting attorneys are also in need of updated
- 3 training on the identification of unexplained death in children under
- 4 the age of three, including but not limited to sudden infant death
- 5 syndrome awareness and sensitivity and the establishment of a state-
- 6 wide uniform protocol in cases of sudden, unexplained child death.
- 7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 43.103 RCW
- 8 to read as follows:
- 9 The council shall research and develop an appropriate training
- 10 component on the subject of sudden, unexplained child death, including
- 11 but not limited to sudden infant death syndrome. The training
- 12 component shall include, at a minimum:
- 13 (1) Medical information on sudden, unexplained child death for
- 14 first responders, including awareness and sensitivity in dealing with
- 15 families and child care providers, and the importance of forensically
- 16 competent death scene investigation;
- 17 (2) Information on community resources and support groups available
- 18 to assist families who have lost a child to sudden, unexplained death,
- 19 including sudden infant death syndrome;
- 20 (3) Development and adoption of an up-to-date protocol of
- 21 investigation in cases of sudden, unexplained child death, including
- 22 the importance of a consistent policy of thorough death scene
- 23 investigation, and an autopsy in unresolved cases as appropriate;
- 24 (4) The value of timely communication between the county coroner or
- 25 medical examiner and the public health department, when a sudden,
- 26 unexplained child death occurs, in order to achieve a better
- 27 understanding of such deaths, and connecting families to various
- 28 community and public health support systems to enhance recovery from
- 29 grief.

- 1 The council shall work with volunteer groups with expertise in the
- 2 area of sudden, unexplained child death, including but not limited to
- 3 the SIDS Northwest Regional Center at Children's Hospital, the
- 4 Washington chapter of the national SIDS foundation, and the Washington
- 5 association of county officials.
- 6 Upon development of an appropriate curriculum, agreed upon by the
- 7 council, the training module shall be offered to first responders,
- 8 coroners, medical examiners, prosecuting attorneys serving as coroners,
- 9 and investigators, both voluntarily through their various associations
- 10 and as a course offering at the criminal justice training center.
