SENATE BILL 5698

State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

By Senators Bauer, Craswell, Rinehart, von Reichbauer and Skratek; by request of Superintendent of Public Instruction and State Board of Education.

Read first time February 15, 1991. Referred to Committee on Education.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to K-12 education personnel training and
- 2 recruitment; amending RCW 28A.415.010 and 28A.405.450; adding new
- 3 sections to chapter 28A.415 RCW; creating new sections; recodifying RCW
- 4 28A.305.260, 28A.305.270, and 28A.405.450; repealing RCW 28A.410.140
- 5 and 28A.625.420; and making an appropriation.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 7 PART I
- 8 CENTER FOR IMPROVEMENT OF TEACHING
- 9 NEW SECTION. Sec. 101. It is the intent of RCW 28A.415.010,
- 10 28A.405.450, as recodified by this act, and sections 201, 301, 401
- 11 through 409, 501, 601, and 602 of this act to foster and consolidate K-
- 12 12 educational staff recruitment and training programs and to provide
- 13 a continuum of coordinated, comprehensive, regionalized programs
- 14 designed to enhance the quality of instruction, as well as to improve

- 1 the ethnic and racial diversity reflected in Washington's K-12
- 2 education personnel.
- 3 Sec. 102. RCW 28A.415.010 and 1990 c 33 s 414 are each amended to
- 4 read as follows:
- 5 It shall be the responsibility of each educational service district
- 6 board to establish a center for the improvement of teaching. The
- 7 center shall administer, coordinate, and act as fiscal agent for such
- 8 programs related to the recruitment and training of certificated and
- 9 classified K-12 education personnel as may be delegated to the center
- 10 by the superintendent of public instruction under RCW 28A.310.470, or
- 11 the state board of education under RCW 28A.310.480. To assist in these
- 12 activities, each educational service district board shall establish an
- 13 improvement of teaching coordinating council to include, at a minimum,
- 14 representatives as specified in RCW 28A.415.040. An existing in-
- 15 service training task force, established pursuant to RCW 28A.415.040,
- 16 may serve as the improvement of teaching coordinating council. The
- 17 educational service district board shall ensure coordination of
- 18 programs established pursuant to RCW 28A.415.030, 28A.410.060,
- 19 <u>28A.405.450</u> as recodified by this 1991 act, and sections 101, 201, 301,
- 20 401 through 409, 501, 601, and 602 of this 1991 act to the extent
- 21 possible.
- The educational service district board may arrange each year for
- 23 the holding of one or more teachers' institutes and/or workshops for
- 24 professional staff preparation and in-service training in such manner
- 25 and at such time as the board believes will be of benefit to the
- 26 teachers and other professional staff of school districts within the
- 27 educational service district and shall comply with rules and
- 28 regulations of the state board of education pursuant to RCW 28A.410.060
- 29 or the superintendent of public instruction or state board of education

- 1 pursuant to RCW 28A.405.450 as recodified by this 1991 act, and
- 2 sections 101, 201, 301, 401 through 409, 501, 601, and 602 of this 1991
- 3 act. The board may provide such additional means of teacher and other
- 4 professional staff preparation and in-service training as it may deem
- 5 necessary or appropriate and there shall be a proper charge against the
- 6 educational service district general expense fund when approved by the
- 7 educational service district board.
- 8 Educational service district boards of contiguous educational
- 9 service districts, by mutual arrangements, may hold joint institutes
- 10 and/or workshops, the expenses to be shared in proportion to the
- 11 numbers of certificated personnel as shown by the last annual reports
- 12 of the educational service districts holding such joint institutes or
- 13 workshops.
- 14 In local school districts employing more than one hundred teachers
- 15 and other professional staff, the school district superintendent may
- 16 hold a teachers' institute of one or more days in such district, said
- 17 institute when so held by the school district superintendent to be in
- 18 all respects governed by the provisions of this title and state board
- 19 of education rules and regulations relating to teachers' institutes
- 20 held by educational service district superintendents.
- 21 PART II
- 22 MINORITY TEACHER RECRUITMENT PROGRAM
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 201. The Washington state minority teacher
- 24 recruitment program shall include a career opportunities plan providing
- 25 for tuition assistance to classified school district classroom
- 26 assistants who are members of groups traditionally underrepresented in
- 27 the teaching profession in Washington. Such money as is appropriated
- 28 by the legislature for this program shall be awarded pursuant to rules

- 1 established by the state board of education. The tuition assistance
- 2 awarded to any eligible person shall not exceed the rate of tuition at
- 3 the nearest regional or state university, whichever is closer.
- 4 PART III
- 5 PARAPROFESSIONAL TRAINING
- 6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 301. (1) The superintendent of public
- 7 instruction may grant funds to educational service districts or school
- 8 districts, or both, to develop a twenty-five hour training program for
- 9 classroom assistants.
- 10 (2) As used in this section and section 201 of this act, a
- 11 "classroom assistant" is an individual, with at least a high school
- 12 diploma or its equivalent, who assists teachers in the classroom with
- 13 preparing materials, working with small groups, grading papers, and
- 14 supervising of students at recess, in the lunchroom, on the bus, and in
- 15 other ways as assigned by the classroom teachers.
- 16 (3) Districts shall submit an application outlining the content of
- 17 the training and the number of classroom assistants and certificated
- 18 instructional staff who will participate. Training shall include, but
- 19 not be limited to, a review of the rules and procedures of the school,
- 20 operation of equipment, the psychology and development of children, and
- 21 discipline policies and procedures. Training shall also be provided to
- 22 certificated instructional staff on methods of working with and
- 23 supervising a classroom assistant.
- 24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 302.** RCW 28A.410.140 and 1989 c 253 s 1 are
- 25 each repealed.

26 PART IV

- 2 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 401.** (1) The legislature recognizes that:
- 3 (a) Strong teacher preparation programs are vital to the success of
- 4 the state's entire education system;
- 5 (b) Clinical field experiences, particularly student teaching, are
- 6 critical to the developmental preparation of teacher candidates and to
- 7 the success of teacher preparation programs;
- 8 (c) Schools, school districts, educational service districts, and
- 9 institutions of higher education benefit mutually from cooperative
- 10 relationships that provide teacher candidates with appropriate,
- 11 necessary, and successful student teaching experiences that establish
- 12 continuity between the theory and practice of teaching;
- 13 (d) Positive student teaching experiences result from the careful
- 14 match between cooperating teachers and student teachers;
- 15 (e) Teacher candidates should have student teaching opportunities
- 16 and other field experiences that are reflective of the diversity
- 17 existing among schools and school districts state-wide; and
- 18 (f) School districts state-wide should have access to student
- 19 teachers.
- 20 (2) Therefore, in support of quality, professional, research-based
- 21 training of prospective teachers, it is the intent of the legislature
- 22 to continue its support of evolving partnerships among schools, school
- 23 districts, educational service districts, community colleges, and
- 24 colleges and universities, that are:
- 25 (a) Benefiting the teaching profession;
- 26 (b) Enhancing the ability of all new teachers to assume initial
- 27 teaching responsibilities with greater confidence and a higher level of
- 28 training;

- 1 (c) Providing important and positive mentoring opportunities for
- 2 experienced teachers; and
- 3 (d) Strengthening cooperation and communication between the
- 4 precollegiate and collegiate sectors of the state education system.
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 402.** Unless the context clearly requires
- 6 otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout sections
- 7 403 through 409 of this act.
- 8 (1) "Cooperating organizations" means that at least one school
- 9 district, one college or university, and one educational service
- 10 district are involved jointly with the development of a student
- 11 teaching center.
- 12 (2) "Cooperating teacher" means a teacher who holds a continuing
- 13 certificate and supervises and coaches a student teacher.
- 14 (3) "Field experience" means opportunities for observation,
- 15 tutoring, microteaching, extended practicums, and clinical and
- 16 laboratory experiences which do not fall within the meaning of student
- 17 teaching.
- 18 (4) "School setting" means a classroom in a public, common school
- 19 in the state of Washington.
- 20 (5) "Student teacher" means a candidate for initial teacher
- 21 certification who is in a state board of education-approved, or
- 22 regionally or nationally accredited teacher preparation program in a
- 23 school setting as part of the field-based component of their
- 24 preparation program.
- 25 (6) "Student teaching" means the full quarter or semester in a
- 26 school setting during which the student teacher observes the
- 27 cooperating teacher, participates in instructional activities, and
- 28 assumes both part-time and full-time teaching responsibilities under
- 29 the supervision of the cooperating teacher.

- 1 (7) "Student teaching center" means the program established to
- 2 provide student teachers in a geographic region of the state with
- 3 special support and training as part of their teacher preparation
- 4 program.
- 5 (8) "Supervisor or university supervisor" means the regular or
- 6 adjunct faculty member, or college or university-approved designee, who
- 7 assists and supervises the work of cooperating teachers and student
- 8 teachers.
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 403.** (1) Cooperating teachers shall provide
- 10 a source of continuing and sustained assistance, coaching, and support
- 11 for student teachers, and may participate with supervisors in
- 12 evaluating student teachers, and shall submit recommendations to the
- 13 institutions of higher education respecting the competency of the
- 14 student teacher. Cooperating teachers shall collaborate with their
- 15 school principals respecting the support, training, and assistance they
- 16 provide to student teachers.
- 17 (2) All student teachers from an institution of higher education
- 18 whose preparation program has been approved by the state board of
- 19 education, or has been regionally or nationally accredited, shall be
- 20 provided a cooperating teacher.
- 21 (3) Cooperating teachers will be appointed by school districts in
- 22 a joint selection process with the institutions of higher education.
- 23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 404.** Salary stipends for cooperating teachers
- 24 shall be paid through supplemental contracts under RCW 28A.400.200(4)
- 25 and as provided in the state operating appropriations act.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 405. The provisions of sections 403 and 404
- 27 of this act shall apply to sections 406 through 409 of this act.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 406.** The state board of education, from
- 2 appropriated funds, shall establish a network of student teaching
- 3 centers to support the continuing development of the field-based
- 4 component of teacher preparation programs. At least one center shall
- 5 be established in every educational service district region. The
- 6 purpose of the training centers is to:
- 7 (1) Expand opportunities for student teacher placements in school
- 8 districts state-wide, with an emphasis on those populations and
- 9 locations that are unserved or underserved;
- 10 (2) Provide cooperating teachers for all student teachers during
- 11 their student internship for up to two academic quarters;
- 12 (3) Enhance the student teaching component of teacher preparation
- 13 programs, including a placement of student teachers in special
- 14 education and multi-ethnic school settings; and
- 15 (4) Expand access to each other and opportunities for collaboration
- 16 in teacher education between colleges and universities and school
- 17 districts.
- 18 <u>NEW SECTION</u>. **Sec. 407**. Funds for the student teaching centers
- 19 shall be allocated by the superintendent of public instruction to each
- 20 educational service district on the basis of the pro rata share of
- 21 student teaching placements in the educational service district. The
- 22 fiscal agent for each center shall be either an educational service
- 23 district or a state institution of higher education. Fiscal agents
- 24 shall document to the state board of education the following
- 25 information:
- 26 (1) The existing or proposed center was developed jointly through
- 27 a process including participation by at least one school district, one
- 28 college or university, and one educational service district;

- 1 (2) Primary administration for each center shall be the
- 2 responsibility of one or more of the cooperating organizations;
- 3 (3) Assurance that the training center program provides appropriate
- 4 and necessary training in observation, supervision, and assistance
- 5 skills and techniques for:
- 6 (a) Cooperating teachers;
- 7 (b) Other school building personnel; and
- 8 (c) School district employees.
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 408.** The student teaching centers shall be an
- 10 alternative means of placing teachers into school districts throughout
- 11 the state. Nothing in sections 401 through 409 of this act or RCW
- 12 28A.405.450 precludes a higher education institution that is not a
- 13 participant in a training center from placing student teachers into a
- 14 district that may be participating formally with other institutions in
- 15 a student teaching center program, or placing student teachers into
- 16 districts pursuant to an agreement between the institution and
- 17 district.
- 18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 409.** Field experiences may be provided
- 19 through a student teaching center. The cost of providing such
- 20 experiences and opportunities shall be the sole responsibility of the
- 21 participants cooperating in the operation of the center.
- 22 **Sec. 410.** RCW 28A.405.450 and 1990 c 33 s 403 are each amended to
- 23 read as follows:
- 24 The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules to
- 25 establish and operate a teacher assistance program. For the purposes of
- 26 this section, the terms "mentor teachers," "beginning teachers," and
- 27 "experienced teachers" may include any person possessing any one of the

- 1 various certificates issued by the superintendent of public instruction
- 2 under RCW 28A.410.010. The program shall provide for:
- 3 (1) Assistance by mentor teachers who will provide a source of
- 4 continuing and sustained support to beginning teachers, or experienced
- 5 teachers, or both, both in and outside the classroom. A mentor teacher
- 6 may not be involved in evaluations under RCW 28A.405.100 of a teacher
- 7 who receives assistance from said mentor teacher under the teacher
- 8 assistance program established under this section. The mentor teachers
- 9 shall also periodically inform their principals respecting the contents
- 10 of training sessions and other program activities;
- 11 (2) Stipends for mentor teachers and beginning teachers which shall
- 12 not be deemed compensation for the purposes of salary lid compliance
- 13 under RCW 28A.58.095: PROVIDED, That stipends shall not be subject to
- 14 the continuing contract provisions of this title;
- 15 (3) Workshops for the training of mentor and beginning teachers;
- 16 (4) The use of substitutes to give mentor teachers, beginning
- 17 teachers, and experienced teachers opportunities to jointly observe and
- 18 evaluate teaching situations and to give mentor teachers opportunities
- 19 to observe and assist beginning and experienced teachers in the
- 20 classroom;
- 21 (5) Mentor teachers who are superior teachers based on their
- 22 evaluations, pursuant to RCW 28A.405.010 through 28A.405.240, and who
- 23 hold valid continuing certificates;
- 24 (6) Mentor teachers shall be selected by the district. If a
- 25 bargaining unit, certified pursuant to RCW 41.59.090 exists within the
- 26 district, classroom teachers representing the bargaining unit shall
- 27 participate in the mentor teacher selection process; and
- 28 (7) Periodic consultation by the superintendent of public
- 29 instruction or the superintendent's designee with representatives of
- 30 educational organizations and associations, including educational

- 1 service districts and public and private institutions of higher
- 2 education, for the purposes of improving communication and cooperation
- 3 and program review((; and
- 4 (8) A report to the legislature describing the results of the
- 5 program to be delivered not later than December 31, 1987)).
- 6 PART V
- 7 SPECIAL NEEDS TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM
- 8 NEW SECTION. Sec. 501. (1) The legislature recognizes that
- 9 changing conditions affect the supply and demand for classified and
- 10 certificated instructional staff in the K-12 schools of Washington.
- 11 The legislature further recognizes that the demands for staff in
- 12 specific subject matter or instructional specialty areas may vary among
- 13 regions in the state. In recognition of such demands the special needs
- 14 tuition assistance program shall be established.
- 15 (2) The special needs tuition assistance program shall include the
- 16 following:
- 17 (a) Each educational service district board shall, in consultation
- 18 with its improvement of teaching coordinating council established
- 19 pursuant to RCW 28A.415.010, recommend to the state board of education
- 20 on a yearly basis the subject matter or instructional specialty area or
- 21 areas in which staffing shortages exist.
- (b) The state board of education shall review the educational
- 23 service district board recommendations. Upon state board approval the
- 24 superintendent of public instruction shall make available to the
- 25 educational service district, an amount to be determined by dividing
- 26 the number of K-12 students enrolled in school districts in the
- 27 educational service district by the total number of K-12 students

- 1 enrolled in the state, such funds as the legislature may appropriate
- 2 for the purposes of the special needs tuition assistance program.
- 3 (c) Each educational service district board shall establish
- 4 policies and procedures for application and award of tuition
- 5 assistance. Such tuition assistance shall be provided solely for
- 6 courses in the subject matter or instructional specialty area or areas
- 7 approved by the state board of education for the educational service
- 8 district.
- 9 PART VI
- 10 MISCELLANEOUS
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 601.** The superintendent of public instruction
- 12 shall collect data related to programs delegated to educational service
- 13 district improvement of teaching centers.
- 14 NEW SECTION. Sec. 602. The state board of education and the
- 15 superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules as necessary
- 16 under chapter 34.05 RCW to carry out the purposes of sections 101, 201,
- 17 301, 401 through 409, 501, and 601 of this act.
- 18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 603.** RCW 28A.625.420 and 1990 1st ex.s. c 10
- 19 s 7 are each repealed.
- 20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 604.** Sections 101, 201, 301, 401, 401 through
- 21 409, 501, 601, and 602 of this act are each added to chapter 28A.415
- 22 RCW.
- 23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 605.** RCW 28A.305.260, 28A.305.270, and
- 24 28A.405.450 are each recodified as sections in chapter 28A.415 RCW.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 606.** Part headings as used in this act
- 2 constitute no part of the law.
- 3 NEW SECTION. Sec. 607. The code reviser shall correct all
- 4 references in the revised code of Washington to the sections of the
- 5 code that are recodified by section 605 of this act.
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 608.** The sum of eleven million twenty-three
- 7 thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is
- 8 appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1993, from the general
- 9 fund to the superintendent of public instruction for the purposes of
- 10 this act.
