SECOND SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5753

State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

Read first time March 11, 1991.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to upland wildlife habitats and populations;
- 2 amending RCW 77.32.350; adding new sections to chapter 77.12 RCW; and
- 3 creating new sections.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that the state's
- 6 upland wildlife habitats are in transition. As the state's population
- 7 increases, preservation of the state's upland wildlife habitat will
- 8 require greater protection and maintenance. Emphasis on upland game
- 9 bird production will allow for enhanced recreational opportunities.
- 10 The legislature further finds that there is a growing need for
- 11 management of habitat areas, both public and private, throughout the
- 12 state to provide the necessary upland wildlife habitat base to support
- 13 increased natural production of upland birds; and that providing for
- 14 better coordination of landowner involvement in habitat programs for

- 1 restoration or creation of habitats through joint partnerships of
- 2 private and public sectors is necessary to achieve that end.
- 3 The legislature recognizes that the department of wildlife is
- 4 establishing an upland wildlife habitat advisory council in support of
- 5 the Washington state ecosystem project, and that membership on this
- 6 council will reflect the various interested parties. It is the intent
- 7 of the legislature that the department of wildlife shall work
- 8 cooperatively with this council in furtherance of the study and report
- 9 required by section 2 of this act, in addition to any other issues that
- 10 shall be considered by the council.
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The department of wildlife shall prepare
- 12 a study and report to the legislature on the study by January 1992.
- 13 The study shall address program progress and supporting information
- 14 relating to upland bird populations, production, or restoration in the
- 15 following areas:
- 16 (1) Increases in both private and public habitat acquisitions
- 17 directly related to the joint federal and state ecosystems project.
- 18 (2) Increased partnerships between the department of wildlife,
- 19 other county, state, and federal agencies, landowners, conservation
- 20 organizations, and the citizens of the state.
- 21 (3) Restoration of critical upland habitats and their associated
- 22 wildlife through strategic fee-title acquisition and complimentary
- 23 enhancement of private lands through technical assistance and incentive
- 24 programs.
- 25 (4) Implementation of good neighbor policies relating to the
- 26 stewardship of acquired or restored upland bird lands and the process
- 27 by which they are acquired or restored.
- 28 (5) Recommendations regarding future efforts necessary to further
- 29 promote the ecosystems program.

- 1 (6) Status of upland bird populations and recreational
- 2 opportunities.
- 3 (7) Improvements and associated cost to both eastern and western
- 4 Washington upland bird programs.
- 5 (8) Enhanced use of citizen volunteers and others, to assist the
- 6 department with the upland wildlife restoration program.
- 7 (9) Existing game bird farms on Whidbey Island and Lewis county,
- 8 including the feasibility of enhancement of those farms and the need
- 9 for additional game bird farms in both western and eastern Washington.
- 10 (10) The status of upland bird release programs in other states.
- 11 (11) The development of a program to encourage and assist
- 12 agricultural and range landowners to maintain sufficient upland
- 13 wildlife habitat on agricultural and range lands for increased upland
- 14 bird populations.
- 15 (12) Development of an enforcement plan or program that would
- 16 enhance the enforcement of unlawful taking of upland birds and provide
- 17 for stricter adherence to bag limits.
- 18 (13) Conduct an upland wildlife habitat assessment for eastern
- 19 Washington that will include operation and maintenance costs for
- 20 acquired or managed properties.
- 21 (14) Provide information demonstrating upland bird population
- 22 trends and hunter harvest data in Washington state over the past twenty
- 23 years.
- 24 (15) Recommend supplemental licensing and fees for the hunting of
- 25 upland birds in both eastern and western Washington that will support
- 26 the upland bird hunting program and more fully fund the pheasant
- 27 release program.
- 28 **Sec. 3.** RCW 77.32.350 and 1990 c 84 s 6 are each amended to read
- 29 as follows:

- 1 In addition to a basic hunting license, a supplemental license,
- 2 permit, or stamp is required to hunt for quail, partridge, pheasant, or
- 3 migratory waterfowl, to hunt with a raptor, or to hunt wild animals
- 4 with a dog.
- 5 (1) A hound permit is required to hunt wild animals, except rabbits
- 6 and hares, with a dog. The fee for this permit is ten dollars.
- 7 (2) An eastern Washington upland game bird permit is required to
- 8 hunt for quail, partridge, and pheasant in eastern Washington. The fee
- 9 for this permit is eight dollars.
- 10 (3) A western Washington upland game bird permit is required to
- 11 hunt for quail, partridge, and pheasant in western Washington. The fee
- 12 for this permit is ((fifteen dollars)) thirty-five dollars effective
- 13 thirty days following the effective date of this act. Effective
- 14 January 1, 1992, the permit shall be available as a season option, an
- 15 <u>early season option</u>, a late season option, a juvenile full season
- 16 option or a two-day option. The fee for this permit is:
- 17 <u>(a) For the full season option, thirty-five dollars;</u>
- 18 (b) For the early season option, twenty-five dollars;
- 19 <u>(c) For the late season option, twenty-five dollars;</u>
- 20 (d) For the juvenile full season or the two-day option, twenty
- 21 <u>dollars</u>.
- 22 For the purposes of this subsection a juvenile is defined as a
- 23 person under fifteen years of age upon the opening date of the western
- 24 Washington pheasant season.
- 25 (4) A falconry license is required to possess or hunt with a
- 26 raptor, including seasons established exclusively for hunting in that
- 27 manner. The fee for this license is thirty dollars.
- 28 (5) A migratory waterfowl stamp affixed to a basic hunting license
- 29 is required for all persons sixteen years of age or older to hunt
- 30 migratory waterfowl. The fee for the stamp is five dollars.

- 1 (6) The migratory waterfowl stamp shall be validated by the
- 2 signature of the licensee written across the face of the stamp.
- 3 (7) The migratory waterfowl stamps required by this section expire
- 4 on March 31st following the date of issuance.
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The wildlife commission shall establish
- 6 by rule an enforcement punchcard to be used for the hunting of
- 7 pheasants in western Washington.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** If specific funding for the purposes of
- 9 this act, referencing this act by bill number, is not provided by June
- 10 30, 1991, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act shall be null and
- 11 void.
- 12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** Sections 1 and 4 of this act are each
- 13 added to chapter 77.12 RCW.
