State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to children in poverty; adding a new chapter to
- 2 Title 74 RCW; creating a new section; and making an appropriation.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** It is the intent of the legislature to
- 5 provide effective, timely aid and intervention to poor children and
- 6 families throughout the state of Washington, thus improving their
- 7 quality of life and reducing future costs to society in general, by
- 8 means of direct assistance to community action agencies. The
- 9 legislature finds that:
- 10 (1) It is well-established that children living in poverty are
- 11 inherently at risk, and that the future costs to society arising from
- 12 the many problems directly related to child and family poverty are
- 13 enormous.
- 14 (2) Recent economic and social trends related to the erosion of
- 15 traditional family structures, massive but uneven patterns of growth,

- 1 economic crisis in the Washington timber region, and pervasive rural
- 2 and urban problems of unemployment, homelessness, discrimination, and
- 3 poverty are rapidly increasing the number of poor children living in
- 4 the state of Washington.
- 5 (3) Timely, positive intervention in the lives of poor children is
- 6 extremely valuable and cost-effective, and can often prevent the
- 7 development of dysfunctional behaviors that are harmful and costly to
- 8 society in general, as is demonstrated by the fact that it currently
- 9 costs taxpayers as much to maintain a prisoner for one year as to
- 10 educate a child for twelve years.
- 11 (4) The problem of youth and family poverty is in the first
- 12 instance a community problem, and existing efforts by community action
- 13 agencies to enhance the quality of life for poor children and families
- 14 have demonstrated the value of a comprehensive, locally oriented
- 15 approach; and
- 16 (5) Community action agencies currently lack sufficient resources
- 17 to adequately address the immense challenges posed by child and family
- 18 poverty, and it is thus necessary and prudent for the state of
- 19 Washington to begin redressing the omissions of the past by acting in
- 20 the best interests of present and future generations of Washington's
- 21 children.
- 22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** Unless the context clearly requires
- 23 otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout this
- 24 chapter.
- 25 (1) "Department" means the department of community development.
- 26 (2) "Community action agencies" means the state-wide network of
- 27 community action agencies, organized on a local level, currently
- 28 providing direct assistance and referral services to low-income
- 29 families, as referred to in RCW 43.63A.105.

- 1 (3) "Eligible at-risk families" means those families whose incomes
- 2 are at or below one hundred twenty-five percent of the federal poverty
- 3 level, as defined by the federal energy assistance program, containing
- 4 one or more children ten years of age or younger.
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** The department is directed to provide
- 6 substantial, material assistance to community action agencies, by means
- 7 of community services block grants, distributed in accordance to
- 8 established formula and administered under the name of "community child
- 9 poverty project," to aid Washington's poor children and families
- 10 through the active implementation of the following policy goals:
- 11 (1) The comprehensive identification by community action agencies
- 12 of eligible at-risk families;
- 13 (2) Aiding community action agencies in providing emergency
- 14 services and referrals to eligible at-risk families, as well as helping
- 15 these families to attain long-term stability and self-sufficiency, with
- 16 special emphasis upon enhanced funding for food banks, energy
- 17 assistance, and job-related assistance, training, and child care;
- 18 (3) The development and administration of needs assessments by
- 19 community action agencies to one hundred thousand eligible at-risk
- 20 families, and the assignment of individual family resource specialists
- 21 to at least five thousand of these families not currently being served
- 22 by case managers;
- 23 (4) The involvement of other local agencies in providing assistance
- 24 to eligible at-risk families by means of subcontracts between community
- 25 action agencies and other local agencies, with the proviso that the
- 26 subcontracts must be funded by previously awarded block grants and
- 27 reported to the legislature under the provisions of section 5 of this
- 28 act;

- 1 (5) The development and distribution of a comprehensive, community-
- 2 oriented child and family resource guide to aid in the identification
- 3 and referral of needed services for poor children and families at the
- 4 county and community level; and
- 5 (6) The recognition of the paramountcy of local control and local
- 6 citizen participation in the development of the child poverty project,
- 7 and an equal recognition of the need to limit program and bureaucratic
- 8 costs to the taxpayers while maximizing the actual assistance provided
- 9 to poor children and families.
- 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The child poverty project coordinating
- 11 council, composed of representatives from community action agencies
- 12 from across Washington, is hereby created to develop and implement the
- 13 child poverty project under the policy goals outlined in section 3 of
- 14 this act, and under the general review and oversight of the department.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** The child poverty project coordinating
- 16 council shall commission a full assessment of the child poverty
- 17 project, to be submitted to the legislature no later than January 31,
- 18 1993.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** The sum of eight million dollars, or as
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the biennium
- 21 ending June 30, 1993, from the general fund to the department of
- 22 community development for the purposes of this act. Of these funds,
- 23 two hundred fifty thousand dollars shall be set aside for the
- 24 assessment required by section 4 of this act, and a further one hundred
- 25 fifty thousand dollars shall be set aside for costs incurred by the
- 26 department for its share in the support and administration of the child
- 27 poverty project.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** This chapter may be known and cited as
- 2 the child poverty assessment and assistance act.
- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** Sections 1 through 5 of this act shall
- 4 constitute a new chapter in Title 74 RCW.
