- AN ACT Relating to improving education; amending RCW 28A.150.260
- 2 and 82.08.020; creating a new section; making an appropriation;
- 3 providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 28A.150.260 and 1990 c 33 s 108 are each amended to
- 6 read as follows:
- 7 The basic education allocation for each annual average full time
- 8 equivalent student shall be determined in accordance with the following
- 9 procedures:
- 10 (1) The governor shall and the superintendent of public instruction
- 11 may recommend to the legislature a formula based on a ratio of students
- 12 to staff for the distribution of a basic education allocation for each
- 13 annual average full time equivalent student enrolled in a common
- 14 school. The distribution formula shall have the primary objective of
- 15 equalizing educational opportunities and shall provide appropriate

- 1 recognition of the following costs among the various districts within
- 2 the state:
- 3 (a) Certificated instructional staff and their related costs;
- 4 (b) Certificated administrative staff and their related costs;
- 5 (c) Classified staff and their related costs;
- 6 (d) Nonsalary costs;
- 7 (e) Extraordinary costs of remote and necessary schools and small
- 8 high schools, including costs of additional certificated and classified
- 9 staff; and
- 10 (f) The attendance of students pursuant to RCW 28A.335.160 and
- 11 28A.225.250 who do not reside within the servicing school district.
- 12 (2)(a) This formula for distribution of basic education funds shall
- 13 be reviewed biennially by the superintendent and governor. The
- 14 recommended formula shall be subject to approval, amendment or
- 15 rejection by the legislature. The formula shall be for allocation
- 16 purposes only. While the legislature intends that the allocations for
- 17 additional instructional staff be used to increase the ratio of such
- 18 staff to students, nothing in this section shall require districts to
- 19 reduce the number of administrative staff below existing levels.
- 20 (b) The formula adopted by the legislature for the 1987-88 school
- 21 year shall reflect the following ratios at a minimum: (i) Forty-eight
- 22 certificated instructional staff to one thousand annual average full
- 23 time equivalent students enrolled in grades kindergarten through three;
- 24 (ii) forty-six certificated instructional staff to one thousand annual
- 25 average full time equivalent students enrolled in grades four through
- 26 twelve; (iii) four certificated administrative staff to one thousand
- 27 annual average full time equivalent students enrolled in grades
- 28 kindergarten through twelve; and (iv) sixteen and sixty-seven one-
- 29 hundredths classified personnel to one thousand annual average full

- 1 time equivalent students enrolled in grades kindergarten through
 2 twelve.
- 3 (c) Commencing with the 1988-89 school year, the formula adopted by
- 4 the legislature shall reflect the following ratios at a minimum: (i)
- 5 Forty-nine certificated instructional staff to one thousand annual
- 6 average full time equivalent students enrolled in grades kindergarten
- 7 through three; (ii) forty-six certificated instructional staff to one
- 8 thousand annual average full time equivalent students in grades four
- 9 through twelve; (iii) four certificated administrative staff to one
- 10 thousand annual average full time equivalent students in grades
- 11 kindergarten through twelve; and (iv) sixteen and sixty-seven one-
- 12 hundredths classified personnel to one thousand annual average full
- 13 time equivalent students enrolled in grades kindergarten through
- 14 twelve.
- 15 (d) Commencing with the 1991-92 school year, the formula adopted by
- 16 the legislature shall reflect the following ratios at a minimum: (i)
- 17 Fifty-three and three-tenths certificated instructional staff to one
- 18 thousand annual average full time equivalent students enrolled in
- 19 grades kindergarten through three; (ii) forty-seven certificated
- 20 <u>instructional staff to one thousand annual average full time equivalent</u>
- 21 students enrolled in grades four through twelve; (iii) four
- 22 <u>certificated administrative staff to one thousand annual average full</u>
- 23 time equivalent students in grades kindergarten through twelve; and
- 24 (iv) sixteen and sixty-seven one-hundredths classified personnel to one
- 25 thousand annual average full time equivalent students enrolled in
- 26 grades kindergarten through twelve.
- 27 (e) In the event the legislature rejects the distribution formula
- 28 recommended by the governor, without adopting a new distribution
- 29 formula, the distribution formula for the previous school year shall
- 30 remain in effect: PROVIDED, That the distribution formula developed

pursuant to this section shall be for state apportionment 1 2 equalization purposes only and shall not be construed as mandating specific operational functions of local school districts other than 3 4 program requirements identified in RCW 28A.150.220 The enrollment of any district shall be the annual 5 28A.150.100. 6 average number of full time equivalent students and part time students as provided in RCW 28A.150.350, enrolled on the first school day of 7 each month and shall exclude full time equivalent handicapped students 8 9 recognized for the purposes of allocation of state funds for programs 10 under RCW 28A.155.010 through 28A.155.100. The definition of full time equivalent student shall be determined by rules and regulations of the 11 superintendent of public instruction: PROVIDED, That the definition 12 13 shall be included as part of the superintendent's biennial budget 14 PROVIDED, FURTHER, That any revision of the present 15 definition shall not take effect until approved by the house appropriations committee and the senate ways and means committee: 16 17 PROVIDED, FURTHER, That the office of financial management shall make 18 a monthly review of the superintendent's reported full time equivalent 19 students in the common schools in conjunction with RCW 43.62.050. (3)(a) Certificated instructional staff shall include those persons

20 employed by a school district who are nonsupervisory employees within 21 the meaning of RCW 41.59.020(8): PROVIDED, That in exceptional cases, 22 people of unusual competence but without certification may teach 23 24 students so long as a certificated person exercises general 25 supervision: PROVIDED, FURTHER, That the hiring of such noncertificated people shall not occur during a labor dispute and such 26 noncertificated people shall not be hired to replace certificated 27 28 employees during a labor dispute.

29 (b) Certificated administrative staff shall include all those
30 persons who are chief executive officers, chief administrative
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- officers, confidential employees, supervisors, principals, or assistant principals within the meaning of RCW 41.59.020(4).
- 3 (4) Each annual average full time equivalent certificated classroom 4 teacher's direct classroom contact hours shall average at least twentyfive hours per week. Direct classroom contact hours shall be exclusive 5 6 of time required to be spent for preparation, conferences, or any other nonclassroom instruction duties. Up to two hundred minutes per week 7 may be deducted from the twenty-five contact hour requirement, at the 8 9 discretion of the school district board of directors, to accommodate 10 authorized teacher/parent-quardian conferences, recess, passing time between classes, and informal instructional activity. Implementing 11 rules to be adopted by the state board of education pursuant to RCW 12 13 28A.150.220(6) shall provide that compliance with the direct contact 14 hour requirement shall be based upon teachers' normally assigned weekly 15 instructional schedules, as assigned by the district administration. Additional record-keeping by classroom teachers as a means of 16 17 accounting for contact hours shall not be required. However, upon 18 request from the board of directors of any school district, the 19 provisions relating to direct classroom contact hours for individual 20 teachers in that district may be waived by the state board of education if the waiver is necessary to implement a locally approved plan for 21 educational excellence and the waiver is limited to those individual 22 teachers approved in the local plan for educational excellence. 23 The 24 state board of education shall develop criteria to evaluate the need 25 for the waiver. Granting of the waiver shall depend upon verification (a) The students' classroom instructional time will not be 26 27 reduced; and (b) the teacher's expertise is critical to the success of the local plan for excellence. 28

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** (1) The superintendent of public
- 2 instruction shall develop a salary schedule for the 1991-92 and 1992-93
- 3 school years that increases salaries for instructional staff by 5.4
- 4 percent, effective September 1, 1991, and 10.46 percent, effective
- 5 September 1, 1992. The superintendent shall use the 1990-91 state-wide
- 6 salary allocation schedule for instructional staff, under section 504,
- 7 chapter 16, Laws of 1990 1st ex. sess. (uncodified), as the base for
- 8 calculating the salary schedule.
- 9 (2) For the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years, effective September
- 10 1, 1991, and September 1, 1992, respectively, the allocation for each
- 11 certificated administrative staff unit shall be increased by 5.4
- 12 percent and 10.46 percent, respectively, of the state-wide average
- 13 certificated administrative salary shown on LEAP Document 12 as
- 14 increased by 2.5 percent and multiplied by incremental fringe benefits.
- 15 (3) For the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years, effective September
- 16 1, 1991, and September 1, 1992, respectively, the allocation for each
- 17 classified staff unit shall be increased by 5.4 percent and 10.46
- 18 percent, respectively, of the 1988-89 state-wide average classified
- 19 salary shown on LEAP Document 12 as increased by 8.16 percent and
- 20 multiplied by incremental fringe benefits.
- 21 **Sec. 3.** RCW 82.08.020 and 1985 c 32 s 1 are each amended to read
- 22 as follows:
- 23 (1) There is levied and there shall be collected a tax on each
- 24 retail sale in this state equal to six and ((five-tenths)) six-tenths
- 25 percent of the selling price.
- 26 (2) The tax imposed under this chapter shall apply to successive
- 27 retail sales of the same property.
- 28 (3) The rate provided in this section applies to taxes imposed
- 29 under chapter 82.12 RCW as provided in RCW 82.12.020.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** (1) The sum of one hundred nineteen
- 2 million dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is
- 3 appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1993, from the general
- 4 fund to the superintendent of public instruction for the purposes of
- 5 this act.
- 6 (2) The appropriation under subsection (1) of this section is in
- 7 addition to the appropriations for salary increases and class size
- 8 reductions in Senate Bill No. 5396 or House Bill No. 1330 or
- 9 substantially similar legislation. The appropriation may not be used
- 10 to supplant funding from any other appropriation for salary increases.
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** Sections 3 and 4 of this act are
- 12 necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health,
- 13 or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public
- 14 institutions, and shall take effect July 1, 1991.
