SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 8410

State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

- 1 WHEREAS, The Legislature recognizes the vital importance that all
- 2 law enforcement officers play in protecting the citizenry of
- 3 Washington; and
- 4 WHEREAS, These women and men have borne a standard that all
- 5 citizens within the state look up to; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Other states within the Union have recognized the need to
- 7 establish parity amongst their law enforcement personnel; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The fiftieth convening of the Legislature directed the
- 9 State Department of Personnel to "survey the compensation practices of
- 10 comparable in-state and out-of-state law enforcement agencies"; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Other factors that were incorporated within the survey
- 12 were a comparison of "the degree to which duties, skills, and working
- 13 conditions are shared by classifications such as wildlife agents,
- 14 fisheries agents, and members of the Washington State Patrol, all of
- 15 whom have police powers . . . "; and

- 1 WHEREAS, The Legislature has recognized that fish, wildlife, and
- 2 state patrol officers have consistently followed requirements for
- 3 certification set forth by the Legislature; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The Washington State Department of Personnel has developed
- 5 analysis showing that our state fisheries patrol and wildlife officers
- 6 have, in comparison with their comparable associates from the state
- 7 patrol, not been fully compensated according to the Willis Study
- 8 conducted by the Department of Personnel; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Enforcement of the law in conjunction with efficiently
- 10 managing the resource will help to ensure a fishery for future
- 11 generations; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The Legislature recognizes the need to pay a commensurate
- 13 salary, based on factors sited within the Willis Study, to the State of
- 14 Washington fishery patrol and wildlife officers;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, By the Senate of the State of
- 16 Washington, the House of Representatives concurring, that the
- 17 Legislature recommends that the findings of the Willis Study, completed
- 18 on November 2, 1989, by the State Department of Personnel, be
- 19 incorporated into the new salary schedule to accurately reflect the
- 20 points and percentage differences of all levels, rank, and longevity.
