- 7 "Sec. 1. RCW 28A.300.138 and 1993 c 336 s 301 are each amended to 8 read as follows:
- 9 (1)(a) To the extent funds are appropriated, the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall provide student learning improvement grants for the 1994-95 through 1996-97 school years. The purpose of the grants is to provide funds for additional time and resources for site-based planning activities and staff development and planning intended to improve student learning for all students, including students with diverse needs, consistent with the student
- 17 (b) State evaluations and findings on the schools for the twentyfirst century program, as well as national research, indicate that 18 extra time for site-based planning activities and staff development and 19 planning for school improvement efforts is critical to the success of 20 21 such efforts. It is the intent of the legislature that school districts use the funds under this section to provide time and 22 23 resources for site-based planning activities and staff development and planning that is in addition to locally funded extra time and resources 24 25 provided for purposes of improving student learning. Districts are strongly encouraged not to supplant local funds with state funds 26 27 provided under this section.
- 28 (2) To be eligible for student learning improvement grants, school 29 district boards of directors shall:
- 30 (a) Adopt a policy regarding the ((sharing of instructional 31 decisions with)) involvement of school staff, parents, and community 32 members in instructional decisions;
- 33 (b) Submit school-based applications that have been developed by 34 school building personnel, parents, and community members. Each 35 application shall:

- 1 (i) Enumerate specific activities to be carried out as part of the 2 grant;
- 3 (ii) Identify the technical resources desired and availability of 4 those resources;
 - (iii) Include a proposed budget; and

- 6 (iv) Indicate that the application was approved by the school 7 principal and representatives of teachers, <u>classified employees</u>, 8 parents, and the community.
- 9 (3) The school board shall conduct at least one public hearing on schools' plans for using the grants before the board approves the plans. Boards may hear and approve more than one school's plan at a hearing. The board shall only submit applications for grants to the superintendent of public instruction if the board has approved the plans.
- 15 (4) If the application is consistent with the purposes of the grant
 16 program and the requirements of subsections (2) and (3) of this section
 17 are met, the superintendent of public instruction shall approve the
 18 grant application.
- 19 (5) To the extent funds are appropriated, and for allocation purposes only, the amount of grants for the 1994-95, 1995-96, and 1996-20 97 school years shall be based on time equivalent to ((no fewer than 21 three days and not more than five days)) up to four days depending upon 22 the number of grant applications received and on the number of full-23 24 time equivalent certificated staff((, classified instructional aides, 25 and classified secretaries)) who work in the school ((at the time of 26 application. For the 1995-96 and 1996-97 school years, the equivalent of five days annually shall be provided. The allocation per full-time 27 equivalent staff shall be determined in the biennial operating 28 29 appropriations act)). Funds from the grant may be used to pay for staff development and planning for certificated and classified staff and 30 site-based planning activities. Site-based planning activities and 31 staff development and planning conducted pursuant to this section also 32 may be conducted during the months of July and August preceding each 33 34 school year for which the school has received a grant. Expenses occurring as a result of these summer site-based planning activities 35 and staff development and planning may be paid from the school year 36 37 School districts shall use all funds received under this section solely for grants to schools and shall not use any portion of 38 39 the funds for indirect costs.

- 1 (6) The state schools for the deaf and blind may apply for grants 2 under this section.
- 3 (7) The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt timelines 4 and rules as necessary under chapter 34.05 RCW to administer the The superintendent may modify application requirements for 5 schools that have schools for the twenty-first century projects under 6 RCW 28A.630.100. ((A copy of the proposed rules shall be submitted to 7 8 the joint select committee on education restructuring established in 9 RCW 28A.630.950 at least forty-five days prior to adoption of the 10 rules.))
- 11 (8) The superintendent of public instruction shall report annually to the legislature by December 1st the following information:
- 13 (a) The use of the funds granted under this section;
- (b) An estimate of any increase in staff development and planning in the 1994-95, 1995-96, and 1996-97 school years respectively, above that in the 1993-94 school year; and
- (c) An estimate of any increase in site-based planning activities in the 1994-95, 1995-96, and 1996-97 school years respectively, above that in the 1993-94 school year.
- 20 <u>(9)</u> Funding under this section shall not become a part of the 21 state's basic program of education obligation as set forth under 22 Article IX of the state Constitution.
- 23 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.650.015 and 1993 c 336 s 703 are each amended to 24 read as follows:
- 25 (1) The superintendent of public instruction, to the extent funds are appropriated, shall develop and implement a Washington state K-12 26 education technology plan. The technology plan, which shall be 27 completed by ((December 15, 1993)) September 1, 1994, and updated on at 28 29 least a biennial basis, shall be developed to coordinate and expand the 30 use of education technology in the common schools of the state. plan shall be consistent with applicable provisions of chapter 43.105 31 32 RCW. The plan, at a minimum, shall address:
- 33 (a) The provision of technical assistance to schools and school 34 districts for the planning, implementation, and training of staff in 35 the use of technology in curricular and administrative functions;
- 36 (b) The continued development of a network to connect school 37 districts, institutions of higher learning, and other sources of on-38 line information; and

- 1 (c) Methods to equitably increase the use of education technology 2 by students and school personnel throughout the state.
- 3 (2) The superintendent of public instruction shall appoint an 4 educational technology advisory committee to assist in the development and implementation of the technology plan in subsection (1) of this 5 The committee shall include, but is not limited to, persons 6 7 representing: The state board of education, the commission on student 8 learning, the department of information services, educational service 9 districts, school directors, school administrators, school principals, teachers, classified staff, higher education faculty, 10 students, business, labor, scientists and mathematicians, the higher 11 education coordinating board, the work force training and education 12 13 coordinating board, and the state library.
- 14 **Sec. 3.** 1993 c 336 s 704 (uncodified) is amended to read as 15 follows:
- 16 In conjunction with the plan required in section 703 of this act, the superintendent of public instruction shall prepare recommendations 17 18 to the legislature regarding the development of a grant program for 19 school districts for the purchase and installation of computers, computer software, telephones, and other types of education technology. 20 The recommendations shall address methods to ensure equitable access to 21 22 technology by students throughout the state, and methods to ensure that 23 school districts have prepared technology implementation plans before 24 applying for grant funds. The recommendations, with proposed 25 legislation, shall be submitted to the appropriate committees of the legislature by ((December 15, 1993)) September 1, 1994. 26
- 27 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28A.630.952 and 1993 c 336 s 1003 are each amended to 28 read as follows:
- 29 (1) In addition to the duties in RCW 28A.630.951, the joint select committee on education restructuring shall review all laws pertaining 30 31 K - 12public education and to educator preparation 32 certification((, except those that protect the health, safety, and 33 civil rights of students and staff,)) with the intent of identifying laws that inhibit the achievement of the new system of performance-34 35 based education. The select committee shall report to the legislature by November 15, 1994. The laws pertaining to home schooling and 36 37 private schools shall not be reviewed in this study.

- 1 (2) The joint select committee on education restructuring shall 2 review current school district data reporting requirements for the 3 purposes of accountability and meeting state information needs. The 4 joint select committee shall report to the legislature by January 5 ((1995)) 1996 on:
- 6 (a) What data is necessary to compare how school districts are
 7 performing before the essential academic learning requirements and the
 8 assessment system are implemented with how school districts are
 9 performing after the essential academic learning requirements and the
 10 assessment system are implemented; and
- (b) What data is necessary pertaining to school district reports under the accountability systems developed by the commission on student larning under RCW 28A.630.885(3)(h).
- 14 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28A.170.060 and 1989 c 271 s 113 are each amended to 15 read as follows:
- The superintendent of public instruction((, through the state 16 clearinghouse for education information,)) shall 17 collect 18 disseminate to all school districts and other interested parties information about effective substance abuse programs and the penalties 19 for manufacturing, selling, delivering, or possessing controlled 20 substances on or within one thousand feet of a school or school bus 21 route stop under RCW 69.50.435 and distributing a controlled substance 22 23 to a person under the age of eighteen under RCW 69.50.406.
- 24 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28A.175.070 and 1987 c 518 s 219 are each amended to 25 read as follows:
- The superintendent of public instruction((, through the state clearinghouse for education information,)) shall collect and disseminate to all school districts and other interested parties information about effective student motivation, retention, and retrieval programs.
- 31 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28A.230.070 and 1988 c 206 s 402 are each amended to 32 read as follows:
- 33 (1) The life-threatening dangers of acquired immunodeficiency 34 syndrome (AIDS) and its prevention shall be taught in the public 35 schools of this state. AIDS prevention education shall be limited to 36 the discussion of the life-threatening dangers of the disease, its

spread, and prevention. Students shall receive such education at least once each school year beginning no later than the fifth grade.

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- 3 (2) Each district board of directors shall adopt an AIDS prevention 4 education program which is developed in consultation with teachers, 5 administrators, parents, and other community members including, but not limited to, persons from medical, public health, and mental health 6 7 organizations and agencies so long as the curricula and materials 8 developed for use in the AIDS education program either (a) are the 9 model curricula and resources under subsection (3) of this section, or 10 (b) are developed by the school district and approved for medical accuracy by the office on AIDS established in RCW 70.24.250. 11 district elects to use curricula developed by the school district, the 12 district shall submit to the office on AIDS a copy of its curricula and 13 an affidavit of medical accuracy stating that the material in the 14 15 district-developed curricula has been compared to the model curricula 16 for medical accuracy and that in the opinion of the district the 17 district-developed materials are medically accurate. Upon submission of the affidavit and curricula, the district may use these materials 18 19 until the approval procedure to be conducted by the office of AIDS has 20 been completed.
- (3) Model curricula and other resources available from the superintendent of public instruction ((through the state clearinghouse 22 for educational information)) may be reviewed by the school district 23 board of directors, in addition to materials designed locally, in developing the district's AIDS education program. The model curricula shall be reviewed for medical accuracy by the office on AIDS established in RCW 70.24.250 within the department of social and health services.
- 29 (4) Each school district shall, at least one month before teaching 30 AIDS prevention education in any classroom, conduct at least one 31 presentation during weekend and evening hours for the parents and guardians of students concerning the curricula and materials that will 32 be used for such education. The parents and guardians shall be 33 34 notified by the school district of the presentation and that the curricula and materials are available for inspection. No student may 35 be required to participate in AIDS prevention education if the 36 37 student's parent or guardian, having attended one of the district presentations, objects in writing to the participation. 38

- 1 (5) The office of the superintendent of public instruction with the 2 assistance of the office on AIDS shall update AIDS education curriculum 3 material as newly discovered medical facts make it necessary.
- 4 (6) The curriculum for AIDS prevention education shall be designed 5 to teach students which behaviors place a person dangerously at risk of 6 infection with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and methods to 7 avoid such risk including, at least:
- 8 (a) The dangers of drug abuse, especially that involving the use of 9 hypodermic needles; and
 - (b) The dangers of sexual intercourse, with or without condoms.

- (7) The program of AIDS prevention education shall stress the life-11 threatening dangers of contracting AIDS and shall stress that 12 abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain means for the 13 prevention of the spread or contraction of the AIDS virus through 14 15 sexual contact. It shall also teach that condoms and other artificial means of birth control are not a certain means of preventing the spread 16 17 of the AIDS virus and reliance on condoms puts a person at risk for exposure to the disease. 18
- 19 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28A.300.150 and 1987 c 489 s 2 are each amended to 20 read as follows:
- 21 The superintendent of public instruction shall collect and 22 disseminate to school districts information on child abuse and neglect 23 prevention curriculum ((through the state clearinghouse for education 24 information)). The superintendent of public instruction and the 25 departments of social and health services and community, trade, and 26 economic development shall share relevant information.
- 27 **Sec. 9.** RCW 28A.150.230 and 1991 c 61 s 1 are each amended to read 28 as follows:
- 29 (1) It is the intent and purpose of this section to guarantee that each common school district board of directors, whether or not acting 30 through its respective administrative staff, be held accountable for 31 32 the proper operation of their district to the local community and its electorate. In accordance with the provisions of Title 28A RCW, as now 33 or hereafter amended, each common school district board of directors 34 35 shall be vested with the final responsibility for the setting of policies ensuring quality in the content and extent of its educational 36 37 program and that such program provide students with the opportunity to

- 1 achieve those skills which are generally recognized as requisite to 2 learning.
- 3 (2) In conformance with the provisions of Title 28A RCW, as now or 4 hereafter amended, it shall be the responsibility of each common school 5 district board of directors to adopt policies to:
- 6 (a) Establish performance criteria and an evaluation process for 7 its certificated personnel, including administrative staff, and for all 8 programs constituting a part of such district's curriculum;
- 9 (b) Determine the final assignment of staff, certificated or 10 classified, according to board enumerated classroom and program needs;
- 11 (c) Determine the amount of instructional hours necessary for any 12 student to acquire a quality education in such district, in not less 13 than an amount otherwise required in RCW 28A.150.220, or rules and 14 regulations of the state board of education;
- 15 (d) Determine the allocation of staff time, whether certificated or 16 classified;
- (e) Establish final curriculum standards consistent with law and rules and regulations of the state board of education, relevant to the particular needs of district students or the unusual characteristics of the district, and ensuring a quality education for each student in the district; and
- (f) Evaluate teaching materials, including text books, teaching aids, handouts, or other printed material, in public hearing upon complaint by parents, guardians or custodians of students who consider dissemination of such material to students objectionable.

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- (((3) In keeping with the accountability purpose expressed in this section and to insure that the local community and electorate have access to information on the educational programs in the school districts, each school district's board of directors shall annually publish a descriptive guide to the district's common schools. This guide shall be made available at each school in the district for examination by the public. The guide shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
- 34 (a) Criteria used for written evaluations of staff members pursuant 35 to RCW 28A.405.100;
- 36 (b) A summary of program objectives pursuant to RCW 28A.320.210;
- 37 (c) Results of comparable testing for all schools within the 38 district; and
 - (d) Budget information which will include the following:

- 8 instructional support, building and central administration, and support
- 9 services, including itemization of such personnel by program;
- 10 (iv) Total number of full time equivalent personnel itemized by
- 11 classroom teachers, instructional support, building and central
- 12 administration, and support services, including itemization of such
- 13 personnel by program; and
- 14 (v) Special levy budget request presented by program and
- 15 expenditure for purposes over and above those requirements identified
- 16 in RCW 28A.150.220.))
- 17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 10.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.150
- 18 RCW, to be codified immediately following RCW 28A.150.210, to read as
- 19 follows:
- 20 The legislature also recognizes that certain basic values and
- 21 character traits are essential to individual liberty, fulfillment, and
- 22 happiness. However, these values and traits are not intended to be
- 23 assessed or be standards for graduation. The legislature intends that
- 24 local communities have the responsibility for determining how these
- 25 values and character traits are learned as determined by consensus at
- 26 the local level. These values and traits include the importance of:
- 27 (1) Honesty, integrity, and trust;

- 36 follows:

- Section 302 ((of this act)), chapter 141, Laws of 1992 shall expire

 September 1, ((1998. However, this section shall not take effect if,

 by September 1, 1998)) 2000, unless by September 1, 2000, a law is

 enacted stating that a school accountability and academic assessment

 system is not in place.
- 6 **Sec. 12.** 1993 c 336 s 1007 (uncodified) is amended to read as 7 follows:
- 8 (1) A legislative fiscal study committee is hereby created. The 9 committee shall be comprised of three members from each caucus of the 10 senate, appointed by the president of the senate, and three members 11 from each caucus of the house of representatives, appointed by the 12 speaker of the house of representatives. In consultation with the 13 office of the superintendent of public instruction, the committee shall 14 study the common school funding system.
- 15 (2) By ((January 16)) <u>December 15</u>, 1995, the committee shall report 16 to the full legislature on its findings and any recommendations for a 17 new funding model for the common school system.
- 18 (3) This section shall expire ((January 16)) <u>December 31</u>, 1995.
- 19 **Sec. 13.** RCW 28A.630.885 and 1993 c 336 s 202 and 1993 c 334 s 1 20 are each reenacted to read as follows:
- (1) The Washington commission on student learning is hereby 21 22 established. The primary purposes of the commission are to identify 23 the knowledge and skills all public school students need to know and be 24 able to do based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210, to 25 develop student assessment and school accountability systems, and to take other steps necessary to develop a performance-based education 26 27 system. The commission shall include three members of the state board 28 of education, three members appointed by the governor before July 1, 29 1992, and five members appointed no later than June 1, 1993, by the governor elected in the November 1992 election. 30 The governor shall appoint a chair from the commission members, and fill any vacancies in 31 32 gubernatorial appointments that may occur. The state board of education shall fill any vacancies of state board of education 33 appointments that may occur. In making the appointments, educators, 34 business leaders, and parents shall be represented, and nominations 35 36 from state-wide education, business, and parent organizations shall be 37 requested. Efforts shall be made to ensure that the commission

- reflects the racial and ethnic diversity of the state's K-12 student population and that the major geographic regions in the state are represented. Appointees shall be qualified individuals who are supportive of educational restructuring, who have a positive record of service, and who will devote sufficient time to the responsibilities of the commission to ensure that the objectives of the commission are achieved.
- 8 (2) The commission shall establish advisory committees. Membership 9 of the advisory committees shall include, but not necessarily be 10 limited to, professionals from the office of the superintendent of 11 public instruction and the state board of education, and other state 12 and local educational practitioners and student assessment specialists.
- 13 (3) The commission, with the assistance of the advisory committees, 14 shall:
- 15 (a) Develop essential academic learning requirements based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210. Essential academic learning 16 requirements shall be developed, to the extent possible, for each of 17 the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210. Goals one and two shall 18 19 be considered primary. Essential academic learning requirements for RCW 28A.150.210(1), goal one, and the mathematics component of RCW 20 28A.150.210(2), goal two, shall be completed no later than March 1, 21 Essential academic learning requirements that incorporate the 22 remainder of RCW 28A.150.210 (2), (3), and (4), goals two, three, and 23 24 four, shall be completed no later than March 1, 1996. To the maximum 25 extent possible, the commission shall integrate goal four and the 26 knowledge and skill areas in the other goals in the development of the 27 essential academic learning requirements;
- 28 (b)(i) The commission shall present to the state board of education 29 and superintendent of public instruction a state-wide academic 30 assessment system for use in the elementary, middle, and high school 31 years designed to determine if each student has mastered the essential academic learning requirements identified in (a) of this subsection. 32 The academic assessment system shall include a variety of assessment 33 34 methods, including performance-based measures that are criterion-Performance standards for determining if a student has 35 referenced. successfully completed an assessment shall be initially determined by 36 37 the commission in consultation with the advisory committees required in 38 subsection (2) of this section.

- (ii) The assessment system shall be designed so that the results under the assessment system are used by educators as tools to evaluate instructional practices, and to initiate appropriate educational support for students who have not mastered the essential academic learning requirements at the appropriate periods in the student's educational development.
- 7 (iii) Assessments measuring the essential academic learning 8 requirements developed for RCW 28A.150.210(1), goal one, and the 9 mathematics component of RCW 28A.150.210(2), goal two, shall be 10 initially implemented by the state board of education superintendent of public instruction no later than the 1996-97 school 11 year, unless the legislature takes action to delay or prevent 12 implementation of the assessment system and essential academic learning 13 requirements. Assessments measuring the essential academic learning 14 15 requirements developed for RCW 28A.150.210 (2), (3), and (4), goals 16 two, three, and four, shall be initially implemented by the state board 17 of education and superintendent of public instruction no later than the 1997-98 school year, unless the legislature takes action to delay or 18 19 prevent implementation of the assessment system and essential academic 20 learning requirements. To the maximum extent possible, the commission shall integrate knowledge and skill areas in development of the 21 22 assessments.
- (iv) Before the 2000-2001 school year, participation by school districts in the assessment system shall be optional. School districts that desire to participate before the 2000-2001 school year shall notify the superintendent of public instruction in a manner determined by the superintendent. Beginning in the 2000-2001 school year, all school districts shall be required to participate in the assessment system.
- (v) The state board of education and superintendent of public instruction may modify the essential academic learning requirements and academic assessment system, as needed, in subsequent school years.
- (vi) The commission shall develop assessments that are directly related to the essential academic learning requirements, and are not biased toward persons with different learning styles, racial or ethnic backgrounds, or on the basis of gender;
- 37 (c) After a determination is made by the state board of education 38 that the high school assessment system has been implemented and that it 39 is sufficiently reliable and valid, successful completion of the high

school assessment shall lead to a certificate of mastery. The 1 certificate of mastery shall be obtained by most students at about the 2 age of sixteen, and is evidence that the student has successfully 3 4 mastered the essential academic learning requirements during his or her educational career. The certificate of mastery shall be required for 5 graduation but shall not be the only requirement for graduation. 6 7 commission shall make recommendations to the state board of education 8 regarding the relationship between the certificate of mastery and high 9 school graduation requirements. Upon achieving the certificate of mastery, schools shall provide students with the opportunity to 10 and educational objectives 11 continue to pursue career educational pathways that emphasize integration of academic and 12 vocational education. Educational pathways may include, but are not 13 limited to, programs such as work-based learning, school-to-work 14 15 transition, tech prep, vocational-technical education, running start, 16 and preparation for technical college, community college, or university 17 education;

- (d) Consider methods to address the unique needs of special 18 19 education students when developing the assessments in (b) and (c) of 20 this subsection;
- (e) Consider methods to address the unique needs of highly capable 21 students when developing the assessments in (b) and (c) of this 22 23 subsection;

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- 24 (f) Develop recommendations on the time, support, and resources, including technical assistance, needed by schools and school districts 26 to help students achieve the essential academic learning requirements. These recommendations shall include an estimate for the legislature, superintendent of public instruction, and governor on the expected cost of implementing the academic assessment system; 29
- 30 (g) Develop recommendations for consideration by the higher 31 education coordinating board for adopting college and university entrance requirements for public school students that are consistent 32 33 with the essential academic learning requirements and the certificate 34 of mastery;
- (h) By December 1, 1998, recommend to the legislature, governor, 35 state board of education, and superintendent of public instruction: 36
- 37 (i) A state-wide accountability system to monitor and evaluate accurately and fairly the level of learning occurring in individual 38 39 schools and school districts. The accountability system shall be

- 1 designed to recognize the characteristics of the student population of
- 2 schools and school districts such as gender, race, ethnicity,
- 3 socioeconomic status, and other factors. The system shall include
- 4 school-site, school district, and state-level accountability reports;
- 5 (ii) A school assistance program to help schools and school
- 6 districts that are having difficulty helping students meet the
- 7 essential academic learning requirements;
- 8 (iii) A system to intervene in schools and school districts in
- 9 which significant numbers of students persistently fail to learn the
- 10 essential academic learning requirements; and
- 11 (iv) An awards program to provide incentives to school staff to
- 12 help their students learn the essential academic learning requirements,
- 13 with each school being assessed individually against its own baseline.
- 14 Incentives shall be based on the rate of percentage change of students
- 15 achieving the essential academic learning requirements. School staff
- 16 shall determine how the awards will be spent.
- 17 It is the intent of the legislature to begin implementation of
- 18 programs in this subsection (3)(h) on September 1, 2000;
- 19 (i) Report annually by December 1st to the legislature, the
- 20 governor, the superintendent of public instruction, and the state board
- 21 of education on the progress, findings, and recommendations of the
- 22 commission; and
- 23 (j) Make recommendations to the legislature and take other actions
- 24 necessary or desirable to help students meet the student learning
- 25 goals.
