  - (3) For full time nonresident undergraduate students and all other full time nonresident students not in graduate study programs, the total tuition fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be one hundred fifteen and seven-tenths percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be one hundred thirty-one and three-tenths percent of the per student undergraduate educational costs at the regional universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be two hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty cents. Beginning with the 1995-96 academic year, the building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total tuition fees. For the 1994-95 academic year, services and activities fees shall not exceed one hundred thirty-one dollars per student. - (e) Recognize otherwise unfunded equipment and assistance needed to reasonably accommodate students with disabilities; and

- 1 (f) Deliver clear and timely information to current and future 2 postsecondary students about the costs of attending college and 3 available assistance.
- (2) For the state need grant program under RCW 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824: As funds are available, expand the program to include new populations of resident students in the following priority order, ensuring that undergraduate students with the most demonstrated financial need receive full grants before less needy students receive any grant:

- 11 (b) Lower middle-income undergraduates;
- 12 (c) Middle-income undergraduates; and
- 13 (d) Resident graduate and professional students, following the 14 income priorities established for undergraduate students.
- 15 (3) For the state work study program under chapter 28B.12 RCW: 16 Increase employment opportunities including off-campus job 17 opportunities with off-campus community service employers.
- 18 (4) For students whose parents did not complete a higher education 19 degree or certificate: Determine the feasibility of providing grants 20 to needy first generation scholars.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 36. In implementing the goals for expanding 21 tuition assistance to needy undergraduate students, the board shall be 22 23 guided by the following matrix. The matrix defines income levels, and for each level, the funding priority, and the assistance mix goal. 24 25 Income levels shall be adjusted annually for family size and changes in the state's median income. It is the intent of the legislature these 26 goals not impair the ability of tuition assistance administrators to 27 adjust assistance packages to meet the needs of students. However, it 28 29 is the further intent of the legislature that tuition assistance administrators, insofar as possible attempt to implement these goals. 30

By September 1st of each even-numbered NEW SECTION. 14 year, the higher education coordinating board shall adopt an estimate of the amount of funding, annualized for each fiscal year, that will be 15 16 needed during the ensuing biennium to fully fund each of the state's 17 student tuition assistance programs including but not limited to: RCW 28B.10.210 through 28B.10.220, 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824, chapters 18 19 28B.12, 28B.101, and 28B.102 RCW, and, if funded, the first generation 20 scholars demonstration project. The board shall report its findings to 21 the governor, and the house of representatives and senate fiscal and higher education committees. 22

- NEW SECTION. Sec. 38. NEW SECTION. Sec. 43. This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take effect July 1, 1993."

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
