- 5 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 6 following:
- 7 "Sec. 1. RCW 28A.150.220 and 1990 c 33 s 105 are each amended to 8 read as follows:
- 9 (1) For the purposes of this section and RCW 28A.150.250 and 10 28A.150.260:
- (a) The term "total program hour offering" shall mean those hours 11 12 when students are provided the opportunity to engage in educational activity planned by and under the direction of school district staff, 13 14 as directed by the administration and board of directors of the district, inclusive of intermissions for class changes, recess and 15 16 teacher/parent-quardian conferences which are planned and scheduled by 17 the district for the purpose of discussing students' educational needs or progress, and exclusive of time actually spent for meals. 18
- (b) "Instruction in work skills" shall include instruction in one or more of the following areas: Industrial arts, home and family life education, business and office education, distributive education, agricultural education, health occupations education, vocational education, trade and industrial education, technical education and career education.
- 25 (2) Satisfaction of the basic education goal identified in RCW 26 28A.150.210 shall be considered to be implemented by the following 27 program requirements:
- (a) Each school district shall make available to students in kindergarten at least a total program offering of four hundred fifty hours. The program shall include reading, arithmetic, language skills and such other subjects and such activities as the school district shall determine to be appropriate for the education of the school district's students enrolled in such program;
- 34 (b) Each school district shall make available to students in grades 35 one through three, at least a total program hour offering of two 36 thousand seven hundred hours. A minimum of ninety-five percent of the

- total program hour offerings shall be in the basic skills areas of reading/language arts (which may include foreign languages, including 2 3 American Indian languages), mathematics, social studies, science, 4 music, art, health and physical education. The remaining five percent 5 of the total program hour offerings may include such subjects and activities as the school district shall determine to be appropriate for 6 7 the education of the school district's students in such grades;
- 8 (c) Each school district shall make available to students in grades 9 four through six at least a total program hour offering of two thousand nine hundred seventy hours. A minimum of ninety percent of the total program hour offerings shall be in the basic skills areas of reading/language arts (which may include foreign languages, including 12 American Indian languages), mathematics, social studies, science, 13 music, art, health and physical education. The remaining ten percent of the total program hour offerings may include such subjects and activities as the school district shall determine to be appropriate for the education of the school district's students in such grades; 17

- (d) Each school district shall make available to students in grades 19 seven through eight, at least a total program hour offering of one thousand nine hundred eighty hours. A minimum of eighty-five percent of the total program hour offerings shall be in the basic skills areas of reading/language arts (which may include foreign languages, including American Indian languages), mathematics, social studies, 23 science, music, art, health and physical education. A minimum of ten percent of the total program hour offerings shall be in the area of 26 work skills. The remaining five percent of the total program hour offerings may include such subjects and activities as the school district shall determine to be appropriate for the education of the school district's students in such grades;
  - (e) Each school district shall make available to students in grades nine through twelve at least a total program hour offering of four thousand three hundred twenty hours. A minimum of sixty percent of the total program hour offerings shall be in the basic skills areas of language arts, foreign languages, which may be American Indian languages, mathematics, social studies, science, music, art, health and physical education. A minimum of twenty percent of the total program hour offerings shall be in the area of work skills. The remaining twenty percent of the total program hour offerings may include traffic safety or such subjects and activities as the school district shall

- determine to be appropriate for the education of the school district's students in such grades, with not less than one-half thereof in basic skills and/or work skills: PROVIDED, That each school district shall have the option of including grade nine within the program hour offering requirements of grades seven and eight so long as such requirements for grades seven through nine are increased to two thousand nine hundred seventy hours and such requirements for grades ten through twelve are decreased to three thousand two hundred forty hours.
- 10 (3) In order to provide flexibility to the local school districts
  11 in the setting of their curricula, and in order to maintain the intent
  12 of this legislation, which is to stress the instruction of basic skills
  13 and work skills, any local school district may establish minimum course
  14 mix percentages that deviate by up to five percentage points above or
  15 below those minimums required by subsection (2) of this section, so
  16 long as the total program hour requirement is still met.

- (4) Nothing contained in subsection (2) of this section shall be construed to require individual students to attend school for any particular number of hours per day or to take any particular courses.
- (5) Each school district's kindergarten through twelfth grade basic educational program shall be accessible to all students who are five years of age, as provided by RCW 28A.225.160, and less than twenty-one years of age and shall consist of a minimum of one hundred eighty school days per school year in such grades as are conducted by a school district, and one hundred eighty half-days of instruction, or equivalent, in kindergarten: PROVIDED, That effective May 1, 1979, a school district may schedule the last five school days of the one hundred and eighty day school year for noninstructional purposes in the case of students who are graduating from high school, including, but not limited to, the observance of graduation and early release from school upon the request of a student, and all such students may be claimed as a full time equivalent student to the extent they could otherwise have been so claimed for the purposes of RCW 28A.150.250 and 28A.150.260.
- (6) The state board of education shall adopt rules to implement and ensure compliance with the program requirements imposed by this section, RCW 28A.150.250 and 28A.150.260, and such related supplemental program approval requirements as the state board may establish: PROVIDED, That each school district board of directors shall establish

the basis and means for determining and monitoring the district's compliance with the basic skills and work skills percentage and course requirements of this section. The certification of the board of directors and the superintendent of a school district that the district is in compliance with such basic skills and work skills requirements may be accepted by the superintendent of public instruction and the state board of education.

- (7) Handicapped education programs, vocational-technical institute programs, state institution and state residential school programs, all of which programs are conducted for the common school age, kindergarten through secondary school program students encompassed by this section, shall be exempt from the basic skills and work skills percentage and course requirements of this section in order that the unique needs, abilities or limitations of such students may be met.
- 15 (8) Any school district may petition the state board of education 16 for a reduction in the total program hour offering requirements for one 17 or more of the grade level groupings specified in this section. state board of education shall grant all such petitions that are 18 19 accompanied by an assurance that the minimum total program hour 20 offering requirements in one or more other grade level groupings will be exceeded concurrently by no less than the number of hours of the 21 22 reduction.
- 23 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.150.220 and 1992 c 141 s 503 are each amended to 24 read as follows:
- 25 (1) Satisfaction of the basic education program requirements 26 identified in RCW 28A.150.210 shall be considered to be implemented by 27 the following program:
- (a) Each school district shall make available to students enrolled in kindergarten at least a total instructional offering of four hundred fifty hours. The program shall include instruction in the essential academic learning requirements under RCW 28A.630.885 and such other subjects and such activities as the school district shall determine to be appropriate for the education of the school district's students enrolled in such program;
- 35 (b) Each school district shall make available to students enrolled 36 in grades one through twelve, at least a district-wide annual average 37 total instructional hour offering of one thousand hours. The state 38 board of education may define alternatives to classroom instructional

- time for students in grades nine through twelve enrolled in alternative 1 learning experiences. The state board of education shall establish 2 3 rules to determine annual average instructional hours for districts 4 including fewer than twelve grades. The program shall include the essential academic learning requirements under RCW 28A.630.885 and such 5 other subjects and such activities as the school district shall 6 7 determine to be appropriate for the education of the school district's 8 students enrolled in such group;
- 9 (c) If the essential academic learning requirements include a
  10 foreign language requirement, the requirement may be met by students
  11 receiving instruction in one or more American Indian languages.

- (2) Nothing contained in subsection (1) of this section shall be construed to require individual students to attend school for any particular number of hours per day or to take any particular courses.
- 15 (3) Each school district's kindergarten through twelfth grade basic 16 educational program shall be accessible to all students who are five years of age, as provided by RCW 28A.225.160, and less than twenty-one 17 years of age and shall consist of a minimum of one hundred eighty 18 19 school days per school year in such grades as are conducted by a school 20 district, and one hundred eighty half-days of instruction, or equivalent, in kindergarten: PROVIDED, That effective May 1, 1979, a 21 school district may schedule the last five school days of the one 22 hundred and eighty day school year for noninstructional purposes in the 23 24 case of students who are graduating from high school, including, but 25 not limited to, the observance of graduation and early release from 26 school upon the request of a student, and all such students may be claimed as a full time equivalent student to the extent they could 27 28 otherwise have been so claimed for the purposes of RCW 28A.150.250 and 29 28A.150.260.
- 30 (4) The state board of education shall adopt rules to implement and 31 ensure compliance with the program requirements imposed by this 32 section, RCW 28A.150.250 and 28A.150.260, and such related supplemental 33 program approval requirements as the state board may establish.
- 34 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28A.230.090 and 1992 c 141 s 402 and 1992 c 60 s 1 are 35 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
  - (1) The state board of education shall establish high school graduation requirements or equivalencies for students. <u>Any course in</u> Washington state history and government used to fulfill high school

graduation requirements is encouraged to include information on the culture, history, and government of the American Indian peoples who were the first inhabitants of the state.

- (2) In recognition of the statutory authority of the state board of education to establish and enforce minimum high school graduation requirements, the state board shall periodically reevaluate the graduation requirements and shall report such findings to the legislature in a timely manner as determined by the state board.
- 9 (3) Pursuant to any foreign language requirement established by the 10 state board of education or a local school district, or both, for 11 purposes of high school graduation, students who receive instruction in 12 American sign language or one or more American Indian languages shall 13 be considered to have satisfied the state or local school district 14 foreign language graduation requirement.
- 15 (4) If requested by the student and his or her family, a student 16 who has completed high school courses before attending high school 17 shall be given high school credit which shall be applied to fulfilling 18 high school graduation requirements if:
- 19 (a) The course was taken with high school students, if the academic 20 level of the course exceeds the requirements for seventh and eighth 21 grade classes, and the student has successfully passed by completing 22 the same course requirements and examinations as the high school 23 students enrolled in the class; or
  - (b) The academic level of the course exceeds the requirements for seventh and eighth grade classes and the course would qualify for high school credit, because the course is similar or equivalent to a course offered at a high school in the district as determined by the school district board of directors.
- (5) Students who have taken and successfully completed high school courses under the circumstances in subsection (4) of this section shall not be required to take an additional competency examination or perform any other additional assignment to receive credit. Subsection (4) of this section shall also apply to students enrolled in high school on April 11, 1990, who took the courses before attending high school.
- 35 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28A.600.060 and 1991 c 116 s 22 are each amended to 36 read as follows:
- The recipients of the Washington state honors awards shall be selected based on student achievement in both verbal and quantitative

- 1 areas, as measured by a test or tests of general achievement selected
- 2 by the superintendent of public instruction, and shall include student
- 3 performance in the academic core areas of English, mathematics,
- 4 science, social studies, and foreign languages, which may be American
- 5 <u>Indian languages</u>. The performance level in such academic core subjects
- 6 shall be determined by grade point averages, numbers of credits earned,
- 7 and courses enrolled in during the beginning of the senior year.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** Section 2 of this act shall take effect
- 9 September 1, 1998. However, section 2 of this act shall not take
- 10 effect if, by September 1, 1998, a law is enacted stating that a school
- 11 accountability and academic assessment system is not in place."
