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- 5 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 6 following:
- 7 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. This act shall be known as the college 8 promise act.
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** It is the intent of the legislature to 10 restructure and fully fund the state's system of financial aid. The 11 restructured financial aid system shall be known as college promise.
- 12 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) The higher education coordinating board shall restructure the state's financial aid programs 13 14 comprehensive and coordinated system of assistance known as college 15 promise. College promise shall expand and modify three existing programs for needy students: The state need grant program under RCW 16 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824; the state work study program under 17 18 chapter 28B.12 RCW; and the educational opportunity grant program under 19 chapter 28B.101 RCW. In addition, college promise may include a 20 demonstration project to assist needy students whose parents did not 21 complete a degree or certificate from an institution of higher 22 education. College promise shall be implemented beginning in the 1995-96 academic year. 23
- (2) By January 1, 1994, the higher education coordinating board, in consultation with the house of representatives and senate higher education and fiscal committees, and the institutions of higher education, shall develop a detailed implementation plan for college promise. In preparing the plan, the board shall follow the goals and priorities set forth in sections 4 and 5 of this act. The plan shall include, but not be limited to:
- 31 (a) Specific program eligibility measures and application 32 procedures for the new populations of state financial aid recipients 33 identified in section 5 of this act;

- 1 (b) Specific need analysis criteria and asset protection 2 allowances;
- 3 (c) Estimates of how many state residents, both those who are 4 currently enrolled in a college or university, and those not currently 5 enrolled, would be eligible and would apply for aid under the expanded eligibility criteria identified in section 5 of this act. 6 The 7 estimates, developed in consultation with the office of financial 8 management, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, and 9 other agencies as appropriate, shall take into account state economic 10 and demographic factors and other appropriate information;
- (d) Estimates of where the new aid applicants identified under (c) of this subsection would choose to enroll by type of institution and level of program; and
- (e) Estimates of the costs for each state financial aid program, 14 15 including the state need grant program under RCW 28B.10.790 through 16 28B.10.824; the state work study program under chapter 28B.12 RCW; and 17 the educational opportunity grant program under chapter 28B.101 RCW to accommodate any new aid applicants estimated under (c) of this 18 19 subsection, as offset by nonstate sources of aid. Separate cost 20 estimates shall be made for each of the new aid populations identified under section 5 of this act. 21
- 22 (3) It is the intent of the legislature that the cost estimates 23 completed under subsection (2) of this section shall be the basis for 24 determining funding levels for state financial aid programs for each 25 year of the 1995-97 biennium.
- 26 (4) The methodologies used to estimate costs under subsection (2) 27 of this section shall be used for the annual cost estimates required 28 under section 6 of this act.
- (5) The plan completed under subsection (2) of this section shall be deemed approved on June 30, 1994, unless legislation is enacted to alter the policies set forth in the plan. The board shall also propose to the legislature any changes to the laws governing state financial aid programs that it deems necessary to accomplish the purposes of college promise.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. In restructuring the state's financial aid programs, the higher education coordinating board shall follow these goals:

- 1 (1) For all need-based financial aid programs under RCW 28B.10.790 2 through 28B.10.824 and chapters 28B.12 and 28B.101 RCW:
 - (a) Through a mix of federal, state, and other resources:
- 4 (i) Limit the debt of an undergraduate student to no more than one-5 half of a student's cost of attendance; and
- 6 (ii) Provide more self-help opportunities than grant aid to middle7 income students, and approximately equal amounts of self-help
 8 opportunities and grant aid to low-income and lower middle-income
 9 students. Self-help opportunities include work study and loans;
- (b) In determining eligibility for state financial aid programs, shelter home equity on a family's principal place of residence, and shelter a reasonable portion of savings and farm or business net worth, each insofar as is permissible under state and federal law;
- 14 (c) Consistent with federal law, simplify the financial aid 15 application process;
- (d) Strive to preserve a range of educational options for needy students, including choice of institutions and programs;
- 18 (e) Recognize otherwise unfunded equipment and assistance needed to 19 accommodate students with disabilities reasonably; and
- 20 (f) Deliver clear and timely information to current and future 21 postsecondary students about the costs of attending college and 22 available financial aid.
 - (2) For the state need grant program under RCW 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824: As funds are available, expand the program to include new populations of resident students in the following priority order, ensuring that undergraduate students with the most demonstrated financial need receive full grants before less needy students receive any grant:
 - (a) Low-income undergraduates;

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- (b) Lower middle-income undergraduates;
- 31 (c) Middle-income undergraduates; and
- 32 (d) Resident graduate and professional students, following the 33 income priorities established for undergraduate students.
- 34 (3) For the state work study program under chapter 28B.12 RCW: 35 Increase employment opportunities including off-campus job 36 opportunities with off-campus community service employers.
- 37 (4) For students whose parents did not complete a higher education 38 degree or certificate: Determine the feasibility of providing grants 39 to needy first generation scholars.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. In implementing the goals for expanding 1 financial aid to needy undergraduate students, the board shall be 2 3 guided by the following matrix. The matrix defines income levels, and 4 for each level, the funding priority, and the assistance mix goal. 5 Income levels shall be adjusted annually for family size and changes in the state's median income. It is the intent of the legislature these 6 7 goals not impair the ability of financial aid officers to adjust aid 8 packages to meet the needs of students. However, it is the further 9 intent of the legislature that financial aid officers, insofar as 10 possible attempt to implement these goals.

29 NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. By September 1st of each even-numbered year, the higher education coordinating board shall adopt an estimate of the 30 amount of funding, annualized for each fiscal year, that will be needed 31 during the ensuing biennium to fully fund each of the state's student 32 33 financial aid programs including but not limited to: RCW 28B.10.210 through 28B.10.220, 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824, chapters 28B.12, 34 28B.101, and 28B.102 RCW, and, if funded, the first generation scholars 35 demonstration project. The board shall report its findings to the 36 37 governor, and the house of representatives and senate fiscal and higher 38 education committees.

- NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. In administering the state student financial aid program, also known as the state need grant program, under RCW 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824, the higher education coordinating board shall proceed substantially as follows unless it determines that a modification is required in order to conform with federal law or to improve the administration of the program, consistent with the purposes of this chapter.
- 8 (1) Define and assist additional populations of needy students as 9 funding becomes available, in the priorities described in section 20 of 10 this act, and using income level classification definitions as 11 described in section 5 of this act.
- 12 (2) In calculating eligibility for aid, where not otherwise 13 inconsistent with federal or state law, shelter home equity on a 14 family's principal place of residence and shelter a reasonable amount 15 of savings and a reasonable portion of farm or business net worth, in 16 order to equitably evaluate family ability to pay.
- 17 (3) To the extent feasible, adjust the student budget of a needy 18 student with disabilities to reflect otherwise unfunded equipment or 19 assistance needed to reasonably accommodate the student in a 20 postsecondary education or training program.
- 21 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28B.101.040 and 1990 c 288 s 6 are each amended to 22 read as follows:
- 23 Grants may be used by eligible participants to attend any public or 24 private college or university in the state of Washington that is 25 accredited by an accrediting association recognized by rule of the higher education coordinating board and that has an existing unused 26 Grants shall not be used to attend any branch campus or 27 capacity. educational program established under chapter 28B.45 RCW. 28 The 29 participant shall not be eligible for a grant if it will be used for any programs that include religious worship, exercise, or instruction 30 or to pursue a degree in theology. Each participating student may 31 receive up to two thousand five hundred dollars per academic year, not 32 33 to exceed the student's demonstrated financial need for the course of 34 study.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.80 RCW to read as follows:

With the exception of institutions of higher education as defined 1 2 in RCW 28B.10.016, any institution of postsecondary education that 3 enrolls students receiving state-funded financial aid shall: (1) For 4 Washington residents, match the total amount of the state financial aid 5 grant funds received by all enrolled students at that institution from the state need grant and equal opportunity grant programs, with an 6 7 equal amount of institutionally raised grant funds from nongovernmental 8 sources, and (2) enter into new or honor existing transfer agreements 9 with institutions of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016. 10 The higher education coordinating board shall adopt rules to implement these requirements. The rules shall ensure that all institutional 11 matching grant funds go to students who are needy as defined in RCW 12 28B.10.802(3) and who are residents of the state of Washington. 13 14 "Residents of the state of Washington" means that the students would be 15 eligible to pay resident tuition rates under RCW 28B.15.011 through 16 28B.15.013 if they were enrolled at a state institution of higher 17 education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016.

18 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.12.040 and 1985 c 370 s 58 are each amended to 19 read as follows:

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The higher education coordinating board shall develop and administer the college work-study program and shall be authorized to enter into agreements with employers and eligible institutions for the operation of the program. These agreements shall include such provisions as the higher education coordinating board may deem necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes of this chapter.

With the exception of off-campus community service placements, the share from ((funds)) moneys disbursed under the college work-study program of the compensation of students employed under such program in accordance with such agreements shall not exceed eighty percent of the total such compensation paid such students.

By rule, the board shall define community service placements and may determine any salary matching requirements for any community service employers.

NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.80 RCW to read as follows:

The higher education coordinating board may design a demonstration project to assist needy first generation college students to obtain

either a community or technical college degree or certificate, or a 1 2 baccalaureate degree. Through the project, a needy student, as defined in RCW 28B.10.802(3), who attends a Washington institution of higher 3 4 education that is accredited by an accrediting association recognized by the board by rule, and whose parents did not complete a degree or 5 certificate from an institution of higher education, may receive a 6 grant of up to fifteen hundred dollars per year, not to exceed the 7 8 student's documented need. The grant may be renewable each year, if 9 the student makes satisfactory academic progress. Grants awarded to 10 any one student shall not exceed a cumulative total of nine thousand dollars for an individual pursuing a baccalaureate degree or five 11 thousand dollars for a student pursuing a community or technical 12 13 college degree or certificate. Before seeking funding for the program, the board shall submit to the governor and the legislature a plan for 14 15 implementing the project. The plan shall include a provision for 16 verification of student eligibility to participate in the demonstration 17 project.

18 **Sec. 12.** RCW 28B.15.600 and 1991 c 164 s 5 are each amended to 19 read as follows:

The boards of regents of the state's universities and the boards of 20 trustees of the regional universities and The Evergreen State College 21 and community colleges may refund or cancel in full the tuition and 22 23 services and activities fees if the student withdraws from a university 24 or college course or program prior to the sixth day of instruction of 25 the quarter or semester for which said fees have been paid or are due. If the student withdraws on or after the sixth day of instruction, said 26 boards of regents and trustees may refund or cancel up to one-half of 27 said fees, provided such withdrawal occurs within the first thirty 28 29 calendar days following the beginning of instruction. However, if 30 required by federal law in order to maintain eligibility for federal funding of programs at the university or college, the regents or 31 trustees of the respective universities and colleges may adopt a refund 32 33 policy that meets the minimum requirements of such federal law, and 34 such policy may treat all students attending the institution in the same manner. The regents or trustees of the respective universities 35 36 and colleges may adopt rules for the refund of tuition and fees for 37 courses or programs that begin after the start of the regular quarter 38 or semester. Said boards of regents and trustees may adopt rules to

- 1 comply with RCW 28B.15.623 and may extend the refund or cancellation
- 2 period for students who withdraw for medical reasons or who are called
- 3 into the military service of the United States.
- 4 Said boards of regents and trustees may refund other fees pursuant
- 5 to such rules as they may prescribe.
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 13.** If any provision of this act or its
- 7 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
- 8 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
- 9 persons or circumstances is not affected.
- 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 14.** Sections 2 through 7 of this act are each
- 11 added to chapter 28B.10 RCW."
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- On page 1, line 1 of the title, after "education;" strike the
- 16 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28B.101.040,
- 17 28B.12.040, and 28B.15.600; adding new sections to chapter 28B.10 RCW;
- 18 adding new sections to chapter 28B.80 RCW; and creating a new section."

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
