2 **ESHB 2026** - S AMD

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On page 1, after line 16, insert the following:

"NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. The legislature recognizes that the use of 8 9 other drugs during pregnancy can cause and psychological, and social problems for women and infants. 10 11 legislature further recognizes that communities are increasingly concerned about this problem and the associated costs to the mothers, 12 13 infants, and society as a whole. The legislature recognizes that the department of health and other agencies are focusing on primary 14 prevention activities to reduce the use of alcohol or drugs during 15 16 pregnancy but few efforts have focused on secondary prevention efforts 17 aimed at intervening in the lives of women already involved in the use of alcohol or other drugs during pregnancy. The legislature recognizes 18 that the best way to prevent problems for chemically dependent pregnant 19 20 women and their resulting children is to engage the women in alcohol or 21 drug treatment. The legislature acknowledges that professionals find pretreatment services to clients to be important in 22 engaging women in alcohol or drug treatment. The legislature further 23 recognizes that pretreatment services should be provided at locations 24 25 where chemically dependent women are likely to be found, including 26 correctional facilities, public health clinics, and domestic violence or homeless shelters. Therefore the legislature intends to prevent the 27 detrimental effects of alcohol or other drug use to women and their 28 resulting infants by promoting the establishment of local programs to 29 help facilitate a woman's entry into alcohol or other drug treatment. 30 31 These programs shall provide secondary prevention services provision of opportunities for immediate treatment so that women who 32 33 seek help are welcomed rather than ostracized.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter.

- 1 (1) "Alcoholism" means a disease, characterized by a dependency on 2 alcoholic beverages, loss of control over the amount and circumstances 3 of alcohol use, symptoms of tolerance, physiological or psychological 4 withdrawal, or both, if use is reduced or discontinued and impairment 5 of health or disruption of social or economic functioning.
- 6 (2) "Approved treatment program" means a discrete program of 7 chemical dependency treatment provided by a treatment program certified 8 by the department of social and health services as meeting standards 9 adopted under this chapter.
- 10 (3) "Assessment" means an interview with an individual to determine 11 if he or she is chemically dependent and in need of referral to an 12 approved treatment program.
- 13 (4) "Chemically dependent individual" means someone suffering from 14 alcoholism or drug addiction, or dependence on alcohol or one or more 15 other psychoactive chemicals.
- 16 (5) "Department" means the department of social and health 17 services.
- 18 (6) "Domestic violence" is a categorization of offenses, as defined 19 in RCW 10.99.020, committed by one family or household member against 20 another.
- 21 (7) "Domestic violence program" means a shelter or other program 22 which provides services to victims of domestic violence.
- (8) "Drug addiction" means a disease characterized by a dependency on psychoactive chemicals, loss of control over the amount and circumstances of use, symptoms of tolerance, physiological or psychological withdrawal, or both, if use is reduced or discontinued, and impairment of health or disruptions of social or economic functioning.
- 29 (9) "Family or household members" means a family or household 30 member as defined in RCW 10.99.020.
- 31 (10) "Pretreatment" means the period of time prior to an 32 individual's enrollment in alcohol or drug treatment.
- (11) "Pretreatment services" means activities taking place prior to treatment that include identification of individuals using alcohol or drugs, education, assessment of their use, evaluation of need for treatment, referral to an approved treatment program, and advocacy on a client's behalf with social service agencies or others to ensure and coordinate a client's entry into treatment.

- 1 (12) "Primary prevention" means providing information about the 2 effects of alcohol or drug use to individuals so they will avoid using 3 these substances.
- 4 (13) "Secondary prevention" means identifying and obtaining an 5 assessment on individuals using alcohol or other drugs for referral to 6 treatment when indicated.
- 7 (14) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of social 8 and health services.
- 9 (15) "Treatment" means the broad range of emergency detoxification, 10 residential, and outpatient services and care, including diagnostic 11 evaluation, chemical dependency education and counseling, medical, 12 psychiatric, psychological, and social service care, vocational 13 rehabilitation, and career counseling, that may be extended to 14 chemically dependent individuals and their families.
- 15 (16) "Treatment program" means an organization, institution, or 16 corporation, public or private, engaged in the care, treatment, or 17 rehabilitation of chemically dependent individuals.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. The secretary shall develop and promote state-wide secondary prevention strategies designed to increase the use of alcohol and drug treatment services by women of child-bearing age, before, during, and immediately after pregnancy. These efforts are conducted through the division of alcohol and substance abuse. The secretary shall:
- (1) Promote development of four pilot demonstration projects in the state to be called pretreatment projects for women of child bearing age. Two of the pilot projects are in urban areas and two are in rural areas.
- (2) Ensure that two of the projects are located in public health department clinics that provide maternity services, one is located in a county correctional facility, and one is located with a domestic violence program.
- 32 (3) Hire four certified chemical dependency counselors to work as 33 substance abuse educators in each of the four demonstration projects. 34 The counselors may rotate between more than one clinic, correctional 35 facility, or domestic violence program. The counselor for the domestic 36 violence program shall also be trained in domestic violence issues.
- 37 (4) Ensure that the duties and activities of the certified chemical 38 dependency counselors include, at a minimum, the following:

- 1 (a) Identifying substance-using pregnant women in the health 2 clinics, correctional facilities, and domestic violence programs;
- 3 (b) Educating the women and agency staff on the effects of alcohol 4 or drugs on health, pregnancy, and unborn children;
 - (c) Determining the extent of the women's substance use;
- 6 (d) Evaluating the women's need for treatment;
- 7 (e) Making referrals for chemical dependency treatment if 8 indicated;
- 9 (f) Facilitating the women's entry into treatment; and
- 10 (g) Advocating on the client's behalf with other social service 11 agencies or others to ensure and coordinate clients into treatment.
- 12 (5) Ensure that administrative costs of the department are limited
- 13 to ten percent of the funds appropriated for the project.
- 14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** The sum of fifty thousand dollars, or as
- 15 much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the biennium
- 16 ending June 30, 1995, from the general fund to the department of social
- 17 and health services for the purposes of sections 2 through 5 of this
- 18 act.

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- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** Sections 4 and 5 of this act are each added
- 20 to Title 70 RCW."

- 27 remainder of the title and insert "adding new sections to Title 70 RCW;
- 28 creating new sections; and making an appropriation."

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
