13 treasurer's service account appropriation is provided solely for the
14 information systems project known as "upgrade mainframe." Authority to
15 expend this amount is conditioned on compliance with section 902 of
16 this act.

17 (2) \$4,990,000 of the general fund--state appropriation is provided
18 solely for the state treasurer to contract with a financial institution
19 for the establishment and administration of an escrow account. Funds

34 shall designate a qualified nonprofit organization to receive
35 disbursements from the account. The designation shall cover the period
36 for which funds are provided.

37 (b) Disbursements shall be made quarterly beginning January 1,
38 1995, at the request of the nonprofit organization, not to exceed

1 \$1,750,000 in fiscal year 1995, increased by three percent per year
2 thereafter.

3 (c) Beginning January 1996, the designated nonprofit organization
4 shall prepare an annual independent audit, an annual financial
5 statement, and an annual report, including benchmarks that measure the
6 success of the nonprofit organization in meeting the intent of the
7 program.

8 (d) Placement and operation of equipment within legislative
9 facilities shall be subject to terms and conditions established by both
10 houses of the legislature and ratified by a two-thirds vote of both
11 houses of the legislature by concurrent resolution.

12 (e) Disbursement of these funds from the account to the nonprofit
13 organization is contingent upon the nonprofit organization receiving
14 commitments for, or the actual receipt of, \$500,000, in cash or in
15 kind, to procure the equipment necessary to carry out the functions of
16 the designated nonprofit organization. The nonprofit organization
17 shall be required to raise contributions or commitments to make
18 contributions, in cash or in kind, in an amount equal to forty percent
19 of the appropriation in this subsection (2).

6 after each succeeding fiscal year thereafter, the state treasurer shall
7 determine the tax receipts deposited into the water quality account for
8 the preceding fiscal year. If the tax receipts deposited into the
9 account in each of the fiscal years 1988 and 1989 are less than forty
10 million dollars, the state treasurer shall transfer sufficient moneys
11 from general state revenues into the water quality account to bring the
12 total receipts in each fiscal year up to forty million dollars.

13 For the biennium ending June 30, 1991, if the tax receipts
14 deposited into the water quality account and the earnings on investment
15 of balances credited to the account are less than ninety million
16 dollars, the treasurer shall transfer sufficient moneys from general
17 state revenues into the water quality account to bring the total
18 revenue up to ninety million dollars. The determination and transfer
19 shall be made by July 31, 1991.

20 For fiscal year(~~s~~) 1992 (~~and 1993~~) and for fiscal years 1995
21 and 1996 and thereafter, if the tax receipts deposited into the water
22 quality account for each fiscal year are less than forty-five million
23 dollars, the treasurer shall transfer sufficient moneys from general
24 state revenues into the water quality account to bring the total
25 revenue up to forty-five million dollars. Determinations and transfers
26 shall be made by July 31 for the preceding fiscal year.

27 **Sec. 903.** RCW 90.56.510 and 1993 c 162 s 2 are each amended to
28 read as follows:

29 (1) The oil spill administration account is created in the state
30 treasury. All receipts from RCW 82.23B.020(2) shall be deposited in
31 the account. Moneys from the account may be spent only after
32 appropriation. The account is subject to allotment procedures under
33 chapter 43.88 RCW. On July 1 of each odd-numbered year, if receipts
34 deposited in the account from the tax imposed by RCW 82.23B.020(2) for
35 the previous fiscal biennium exceed the amount appropriated from the
36 account for the previous fiscal biennium, the state treasurer shall
37 transfer the amount of receipts exceeding the appropriation to the oil

1 spill response account. If, on the first day of any calendar month,

3 five million dollars and the balance of the oil spill administration
4 account exceeds the unexpended appropriation for the current biennium,
5 then the tax under RCW 82.23B.020(2) shall be suspended on the first

8 six months of the biennium. If the tax imposed under RCW 82.23B.020(2)
9 is suspended during two consecutive biennia, the department shall by
10 November 1st after the end of the second biennium, recommend to the

12 (~~period 1991-93~~) biennium ending June 30, 1995, the state treasurer
13 may transfer funds from the oil spill response account to the oil spill
14 administration account in amounts necessary to support appropriations
15 made from the oil spill administration account in the omnibus
16 appropriations act adopted not later than June 30, 1994.

17 (2) Expenditures from the oil spill administration account shall be
18 used exclusively for the administrative costs related to the purposes
19 of this chapter, and chapters 90.48, 88.40, and 88.46 RCW. Starting
20 with the 1995-1997 biennium, the legislature shall give activities of
21 state agencies related to prevention of oil spills priority in funding
22 from the oil spill administration account. Costs of administration
23 include the costs of:

- 24 (a) Routine responses not covered under RCW 90.56.500;
25 (b) Management and staff development activities;
26 (c) Development of rules and policies and the state-wide plan
27 provided for in RCW 90.56.060;
28 (d) Facility and vessel plan review and approval, drills,
29 inspections, investigations, enforcement, and litigation;
30 (e) Interagency coordination and public outreach and education;
31 (f) Collection and administration of the tax provided for in
32 chapter 82.23B RCW; and
33 (g) Appropriate travel, goods and services, contracts, and
34 equipment.

35 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 904.** If any provision of this act or its
36 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
37 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
38 persons or circumstances is not affected.
