Title: An act relating to residential habilitation centers.

Background: Six residential habilitation centers which provide services to people with developmental disabilities are permanently established in statute.

Summary of Bill: The section of the revised code of Washington which permanently establishes six residential habilitation centers is repealed.

Effective Date: The bill contains an emergency clause and takes effect immediately.

Testimony Against: (Human Services) The permanent establishment of six residential habilitation centers should not be repealed.
