1 AN ACT Relating to government performance and accountability; and
2 creating a new section.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that the effective
5 delivery of state services is essential as the state faces increasing
6 constraints on revenue and expenditures. At the same time, the public
7 expects and deserves quality services and improved accountability. It
8 is therefore prudent for the state to identify strategies to include
9 customers and empower agencies and their employees to more effectively
10 deliver services. The state should also determine whether a more
11 flexible and understandable budget process, and systems to identify
12 expected results for state programs and measure performance towards
13 achieving those results, will improve service delivery.

14 The legislature declares its commitment to identify and eliminate
15 barriers to innovation and improvement, and to create incentives for
16 performance in state government.

17 Through the work of the governor, the office of financial
18 management, and statutory and standing committees of the senate and
19 house of representatives, strategies will be jointly developed to allow

1 state agencies greater freedom in the allocation of their financial and
2 human resources to achieve improved performance, accountability, and
3 service delivery. State agency personnel, and particularly front-line
4 employees, will play a vital role in identifying workable strategies.
5 Where appropriate, expertise from business and industry shall also be
6 employed. These strategies, which may be initially implemented through
7 pilot projects or other trial processes, shall incorporate
8 methodologies to evaluate their effectiveness.

9 The legislature shall work with the governor, the state auditor,
10 and the office of financial management to incorporate existing efforts
11 of state agencies, the governor's commission on efficiency and
12 accountability, and the state productivity board into this coordinated
13 effort.
