- TO THE HONORABLE MIKE LOWRY, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON,
  THE HONORABLE JUDITH A. BILLINGS, SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION,
- 3 AND THE CHAIR, WASHINGTON COMMISSION ON STUDENT LEARNING:
- We, your Memorialists, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Washington, in legislative session assembled, respectfully represent and petition as follows:
- WHEREAS, There is a national consensus that public education in our state and nation is often not adequate to prepare our students for attaining productive and independent lives in the 21st Century; and
- 11 transmit to upcoming generations the knowledge of the past as the 12 lessons of history create a perspective on human existence and an

WHEREAS, Logic, common sense, and experience mandate that we

- 13 understanding of the world in which we live ... "To know nothing of
- 14 what happened before you were born is to remain forever a child"; and
- WHEREAS, We must ensure that our children are given a meaningful
- 16 opportunity to be grounded in the knowledge, understanding, and
- 17 appreciation of our culture and those ideas and events that produced
- 18 the birth of our country and its rise to becoming the greatest nation
- 19 in the world ... "A popular Government, without popular information, or
- 20 the means of acquiring it, is but a prologue to a farce or a tragedy,
- 21 or perhaps, both. Knowledge will forever govern ignorance, and a

- 1 people who mean to be their own governors, must arm themselves with the
- 2 power which knowledge gives."; and
- WHEREAS, The "restructuring or "reforming" of our schools, using
- 4 experimental programs that have not been proven to be cost-effective
- 5 and beneficial in creating a literate society, can defeat the true
- 6 reform of education called for by parents and other citizens and prove
- 7 an unwise expenditure of limited tax dollars; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Consideration of scholarly, scientific research, and
- 9 schools with a proven record of excellence, can lead us to responsible,
- 10 valid decisions on education reform; and
- 11 WHEREAS, An adequate curriculum should include the implicit
- 12 teaching of:
- 13 (1) Self-reliance, self-discipline, and respect for self and
- 14 others;
- 15 (2) Personal responsibility;
- 16 (3) Good citizenship;
- 17 (4) Good character;
- 18 (5) Respect for, and obedience to, legitimate authority;
- 19 (6) The importance of the work ethic and integrity in achieving
- 20 personal goals;
- 21 (7) The existence of absolute values of right and wrong;
- 22 (8) Total abstinence from destructive behaviors;
- 23 (9) The importance of the family as the basis of society; and
- 24 (10) The importance of establishing a stable marriage before
- 25 childbearing; and
- 26 WHEREAS, An adequate curriculum should include the explicit
- 27 teaching of:
- 28 (1) A solid core academic curriculum that can truly be described as
- 29 being rich in content, tough, solid, and stringent;
- 30 (2) Reading skills taught using the intensive phonics method, a
- 31 method that research has proven best develops reading literacy and
- 32 dramatically decreases the need for remediation;
- 33 (3) Reading comprehension using selections that are challenging and
- 34 exciting with compelling and appropriate narrative, i.e., myths,
- 35 fables, tales of heroes, drama, prose, poetry, as well as examples of
- 36 graceful and elegant use of the English language;
- 37 (4) Classical literature, which embodies the wisdom of the ages and
- 38 teaches our cultural heritage;
- 39 (5) Essay and theme writing;

- 2 (7) Basic arithmetic skills with an emphasis on mental and written 3 computation and memorization as well strategies for solving complicated 4 math problems;
- 5 (8) Math and the sciences with basic concepts taught in the 6 elementary grades;
  - (9) Geography, beginning with the United States;
- 8 (10) History and civics including American history, Western 9 civilization, principles of American democracy, and world history;
- 10 (11) Economics, with an emphasis on the benefits of the free market 11 economic system in comparison to other economic systems;
- 12 (12) Foreign languages;
- 13 (13) Computer literacy;
- 14 (14) Fine arts; and
- 15 (15) Physical education, fitness, and health; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Our goal is "To make the best that has been thought and 17 known in the world current everywhere.";
- NOW, THEREFORE, Your Memorialists respectfully pray that the Honorable Mike Lowry, Governor of the State of Washington, the Honorable Judith A. Billings, the Superintendent of Public Instruction,
- 21 and the Chair, Washington Commission on Student Learning, ensure that
- 22 educational reform of the public schools is consistent with this
- 23 resolution so that Washington students have a meaningful opportunity to
- 24 achieve a position of academic excellence that would place Washington
- 25 students first in the nation; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be immediately transmitted to the Honorable Mike Lowry, Governor of the
- 28 state of Washington, the Honorable Judith A. Billings, Superintendent
- 29 of Public Instruction, and the Chair, Washington Commission on Student
- 30 Learning.
