21 for superior court judges temporarily assigned to other counties that
22 are experiencing large and sudden surges in criminal filings.
23 Reimbursement shall be limited to per diem and travel expenses of
24 assigned judges.

25 (2) \$1,744,000 of the public safety and education account
26 appropriation is provided solely to install the district court
27 information system (DISCIS) at forty-two district court sites. When
28 providing equipment upgrades to an existing site, an equal amount of
29 local matching funds shall be provided by the local jurisdictions.

30 (3) \$217,000 of the public safety and education account
31 appropriation is provided solely to contract with the state board for
32 community college education to pay for court interpreter training
33 classes in at least six community colleges for a total of at least 200
34 financially needy students, who shall be charged reduced tuition based
35 on level of need. Other students may be served by charging the full
36 tuition needed to recover costs.

1 (4) \$688,000 of the general fund appropriation is provided solely
2 to implement chapter 127, Laws of 1991 (Second Substitute Senate Bill
3 No. 5127, foster care citizen review).

4 (5) \$6,507,000 of the public safety and education account
5 appropriation and \$850,000 of the drug enforcement and education
6 account appropriation are provided solely for the continuation of
7 treatment-alternatives-to-street-crimes (TASC) programs in Pierce,

HUMAN SERVICES

Sec. 201. 1991 sp.s. c 16 s 201 is amended to read as follows:

FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL AND HEALTH SERVICES

(1) (~~Appropriations made in this act to the department of social and health services shall initially be allotted as required by this act. Subsequent allotment modifications shall not include transfers of moneys between sections of this act except as expressly provided in this act, nor shall allotment modifications permit moneys that are provided solely for a specified purpose to be used for other than that purpose~~) The appropriations in sections 201 through 218 of chapter 16, Laws of 1991 1st sp. sess., as amended, shall be expended for the programs and in the amounts listed in those sections. However, after May 1, 1993, unless specifically prohibited by this act, the department may transfer moneys among programs and among amounts provided under conditions and limitations after approval by the director of financial management. The director of financial management shall notify the appropriate fiscal committees of the senate and house of representatives in writing prior to approving any deviation from the appropriation levels and any deviation from conditions and limitations.

(2) The department of social and health services shall not initiate any services that will require expenditure of state general fund moneys unless expressly authorized in this act or other law, or unless the services were provided on March 1, 1991. The department may seek, receive, and spend, under RCW 43.79.260 through 43.79.282, federal moneys not anticipated in this act as long as the federal funding does not require expenditure of state moneys for the program in excess of amounts anticipated in this act. If the department receives unanticipated unrestricted federal moneys, those moneys shall be spent for services authorized in this act, and an equal amount of appropriated state general fund moneys shall lapse. As used in this subsection, "unrestricted federal moneys" includes block grants and other funds that federal law does not require to be spent on specifically defined projects or matched on a formula basis by state funds.

1 (3) Appropriations in this act derived from the \$31,600,000 federal
2 child care block grant and the Title IV-A grant are subject to the
3 following conditions and limitations:

4 (a) \$13,290,000 is provided solely for vendor rate increases for
5 child care facilities. Increases by cluster shall result in rates set
6 at a uniform percentile of child care provider rates across clusters.
7 Rates set by other methods shall result in the same percentage increase
8 as the state-wide average increase for rates set by cluster. The
9 department shall transfer rate increase funds among child care programs
10 as necessary to maintain a uniform rate policy.

11 (b) \$1,000,000 is provided solely to contract with eligible
12 providers for specialized child care and respite care for children of
13 homeless parents. Providers shall demonstrate that licensed child-care
14 facilities are available to provide specialized child care for children
15 under six years of age. Respite child-care providers shall demonstrate
16 that respite child care is available for children under six years of
17 age and shall submit to a felony background check through the state
18 patrol. Child-care services provided by shelters shall be subject to
19 department of community development rules on applicant eligibility
20 criteria. The total allocation to providers within a county shall be
21 not less than twenty-five thousand dollars per fiscal year in counties
22 that had at least one hundred children under the age of five served in
23 emergency shelters for the preceding year as reported by the department
24 of community development and not less than ten thousand dollars for all
25 other counties. If Substitute Senate Bill No. 5653 (homeless child
26 care) is enacted by July 31, 1991, the amount provided in this
27 subsection is provided solely to implement the bill.

28 (c) \$450,000 of this amount shall be deposited in the child care
29 facility revolving fund for loans or grants to assist persons,
30 businesses, or organizations to start or operate a licensed child care
31 facility to the extent permitted by federal law, pursuant to chapter
32 248, Laws of 1991 (Substitute Senate Bill No. 5583, child care facility
33 fund).

34 (d) \$100,000 is provided solely for licensing and regulation
35 activities of the department of social and health services.

36 (e) \$100,000 is provided solely for data collection, evaluation,
37 and reporting activities of the department of social and health
38 services.

1 (f) \$4,609,000 is provided solely to increase child care slots for
2 low-income families.

8 solely to implement chapter 283, Laws of 1991 (Second Substitute Senate
9 Bill No. 5341, foster parent liability insurance).

11 solely for volunteers of America of Spokane's crosswalk project.

12 (6) \$3,300,000 of the general fund--state appropriation is provided

18 care facility. The facility shall provide residential care for up to

20 children served by the facility must be in need of special care as a
21 result of substance abuse by their mothers. The facility also shall
22 provide on-site training to biological, adoptive, or foster parents.
23 The facility shall provide at least three months of consultation and
24 support to parents accepting placement of children from the facility.
25 The facility may recruit new and current foster and adoptive parents
26 for infants served by the facility. The department shall not require
27 case management as a condition of the contract. The department shall
28 solicit proposals from current pediatric interim care providers. The
29 department shall select a provider from among the current pediatric
30 interim care providers through an accelerated selection process by
31 August 15, 1991. The contract shall be awarded by August 15, 1991.

32 (8) \$700,000 of the general fund--state appropriation and \$299,000
33 of the drug enforcement and education account appropriation are
34 provided solely for up to three nonfacility based programs for the
35 training, consultation, support, and recruitment of biological, foster,
36 and adoptive parents of children through age three in need of special
37 care as a result of substance abuse by their mothers, except that each
38 program may serve up to three medically fragile nonsubstance-abuse-
39 affected children. In selecting nonfacility based programs, preference

1 shall be given to programs whose federal or private funding sources

PART IX
MISCELLANEOUS

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NEW SECTION. **Sec. 901.** APPLICABILITY OF OTHER PROVISIONS. This act is subject to the provisions, definitions, conditions, and limitations of chapter 16, Laws of 1991 sp. sess., as amended by chapter 232, Laws of 1992, chapter 238, Laws of 1992, and this act.

NEW SECTION. **Sec. 902.** A new section is added to chapter 16, Laws of 1991 sp.s. to read as follows:

SPENDING CONTROLS. (1) All agencies, including those headed by elected officials and appointed boards or commissions, shall control costs to ensure that operating expenditures for capital outlays and noncapitalized fixed assets for the period beginning April 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1993, will not exceed the sum of that agency's monthly allotments for capital outlays and noncapitalized fixed assets for that same time period.

(2) All agencies, including those headed by elected officials and appointed boards or commissions, shall control costs to ensure that expenditures of state general fund appropriations for the period beginning April 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1993, will not exceed the sum of that agency's monthly allotments of state general fund expenditures for that same time period.

(3) All agencies over one hundred employees, including those headed by elected officials and appointed boards or commissions, are directed to place into reserve status one percent of their April through June allotments for salaries. It is intended that these savings be achieved through the fiscal limitations imposed in the Governor's January 13, 1993, directive. Expenditure control mechanisms are assumed to include attrition, administrative efficiencies, and reductions in nonessential travel and purchases. The office of financial management shall issue agency savings targets and instructions for allotment amendment submittals.

Exceptions for the limitations described in subsections (1) through (3) of this section may be granted by the office of financial management only in cases of preexisting legal obligations or emergency conditions.

1 For the purposes of this section, "allotments" are considered to be
2 the January 31, 1993, office of financial management approved
3 expenditure plan as revised for any 1993 supplemental appropriations.

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 903.** A new section is added to chapter 43.105
5 RCW to read as follows:

6 UNAUTHORIZED DATA PROCESSING EXPENDITURES. No state agency may
7 expend any moneys for major information technology projects subject to
8 review by the department of information services under RCW 43.105.190
9 unless specifically authorized by the legislature. An intentional or
10 negligent violation of this section constitutes a violation of RCW
11 43.88.290 and shall subject the head of the agency to forfeiture of
12 office and other civil penalties as provided under RCW 43.88.300.

13 If the director of information services intentionally or
14 negligently approved an expenditure in violation of this section, then
15 all sanctions described in this section and RCW 43.88.300 shall also
16 apply to the director of information services.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 904.** SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this
18 act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid,
19 the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
20 persons or circumstances is not affected.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 905.** EMERGENCY CLAUSE. This act is necessary
22 for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety,
23 or support of the state government and its existing public
24 institutions, and shall take effect immediately.
