In its development of a design for a project, the board shall consult five or more historically black colleges that may include, but need not be limited to Morehouse College, Howard University, Spelman College, Grambling State University, and Tuskegee University.
- (3) In its project design, the board shall consider ways to encourage participants in the pilot project to return to Washington after their studies to use their education to benefit all of Washington's citizens.
- (4) The board shall report is findings and recommendations to the governor and the house of representatives and senate committees on higher education by November 30, 1997.—
