- 7 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that:
- 8 (a) Each of the state's public baccalaureate institutions plays 9 different but complementary roles in the state's system of higher
- 10 education;
- 11 (b) Although each community college has different strengths and
- 12 special programs, the community colleges as a whole have a common role
- 13 and mission;
- 14 (c) College and university governing boards are in a unique
- 15 position to assess the special needs of their institutions' students,
- 16 faculty, staff, programs, and facilities;
- 17 (d) State and institutional financial aid programs should help
- 18 needy low and middle-income students pay the costs of tuition
- 19 increases;
- 20 (e) The primary purpose of the state's public system of higher

- 29 rates, within specified limits, for different categories of students
- 30 and for graduate programs;
- 31 (b) Permit the state board for community and technical colleges to
- 32 adjust tuition rates, within specified limits, for the community
- 33 colleges as a whole;
- 34 (c) Revise the statutory funding mechanism for the state's
- 35 financial aid programs in order to substantially increase the amount of

- 1 state funding for programs that assist needy low and middle-income 2 students;
- 3 (d) Ensure that any tuition increases for resident undergraduate 4 students are limited, and, in conjunction with state financial aid 5 programs, do not obstruct access to higher education for low and 6 middle-income students; and
- 7 (e) Direct the colleges and universities to use part of the revenue 8 from tuition increases over a specified level to help needy low and 9 middle-income resident students pay the costs associated with the 10 tuition increase.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.15 RCW to read as follows:
- (1) As used in this section, "excess credit" means any credit taken by either a resident undergraduate student or a resident student who is not enrolled in a first professional, graduate, or law program if the student has accumulated more than one hundred twenty-five percent of the number of credits required to complete the student's baccalaureate degree program.
- 19 (2)(a) Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, state 20 universities, regional universities, and The Evergreen State College 21 may collect a surcharge from any resident student who is enrolled for 22 excess credit. The amount of the surcharge may vary by credit or 23 percentage thresholds, or may be based on special circumstances, each 24 as established by the institution.
- 25 (b) Students who are required to take continuing education credits 26 as a condition of licensure or state law are exempt from the excess 27 credit surcharge for any credits taken as a result of the requirements.
- 28 (3) A surcharge for excess credits shall not exceed twenty-five 29 percent of the tuition fees rates for full-time resident undergraduate 30 students at the college or university.

- The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include the fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at the state's colleges and universities but shall not include <u>surcharges for</u> excess credit under section 2 of this act, or fees for short courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, marine station

work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension courses, 2 individual instruction and student deposits disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and universities shall 3 4 have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, health, technology and student activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income 5 derived from any or all revenue producing lands, buildings and 6 7 facilities of the colleges or universities heretofore or hereafter 8 acquired, constructed or installed, including but not limited to income 9 from rooms, dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing 10 or student activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or the appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be 11 established by any college or university board of trustees or regents 12 13 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any 14 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account 15 containing only operating fees revenue and related interest: PROVIDED, 16 That a minimum of three and one-half percent of operating fees shall be 17 retained by the institutions, except the technical colleges, for the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. Local operating fee accounts shall not be 18 19 subject to appropriation by the legislature or allotment procedures 20 under chapter 43.88 RCW.

23 It is the intent of the legislature that needy students not be 24 deprived of access to higher education due to increases in educational 25 costs or consequent increases in tuition and fees. It is the sense of 26 the legislature that state appropriations for student financial aid be 27 adjusted in an amount which together with funds estimated to be available in the form of basic educational opportunity grants as 28 29 authorized under Section 411 of the federal Higher Education Act of 30 1965 as now or hereafter amended will equal twenty-four percent of any change in revenue estimated to occur as a result of revisions in 31 tuition and fee levels under the provisions of ((this 1977 amendatory 32 act)) chapter 322, Laws of 1977 ex. sess. 33

 $((\frac{4}{1}))$ (3) For each of the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic years, except as provided under subsections (4) and (5) of this section, the tuition fees rates in subsection (2) of this section shall increase annually based on the five-year rolling average of the per capita personal income growth rate contained in the even-year September Washington economic and revenue forecast by the office of the forecast council, or by four percent, whichever is the lower amount. Increases in tuition fees under this subsection shall be incorporated in the base tuition fees rates for the next academic year.

(4) During each of the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic years, the governing boards of the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and, for the community colleges as a whole, the state board for community and technical colleges, may increase tuition fees rates for nonresident students and for resident students enrolled in programs leading to the degree of juris doctor, up to six percent each year in addition to the tuition fees rates computed under subsection (3) of this section. Any increase in tuition fees adopted under this subsection shall be incorporated in the base tuition fees rates for the next academic year.

(5) As a pilot program during the 1997-99 biennium, only for programs and classes at the Cheney campus, the governing board of Eastern Washington University, for each of the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic years, may increase tuition fees rates for resident students by up to the five-year rolling average of the per capita personal income growth rate contained in the even-year September Washington economic and revenue forecast by the office of the forecast council, or by four percent, whichever is the lower amount, and may increase tuition fees rates for nonresident students by up to six percent in addition to the tuition fees rates for resident students.

(6) For tuition increases of more than four percent in any year, the institution shall use at least ten percent of the revenue received from the difference between a four percent increase and the actual percentage increase to assist needy low and middle-income resident students enrolled in the same tuition category or graduate or law program. This requirement is in addition to the deposit requirements of the institutional financial aid fund under RCW 28B.15.820.

- 1 (7) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall not apply 2 to <u>summer term or to</u> high school students enrolling in community 3 colleges under RCW 28A.600.300 through 28A.600.395.
- 4 Sec. 7. RCW 28B.15.069 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 9 s 5 are each amended 5 to read as follows:
- 6 (1) As used in this section, each of the following subsections is 7 a separate tuition category:
- 8 (a) Resident undergraduate students and all other resident students 9 not in first professional, graduate, or law programs;
- 10 (b) Nonresident undergraduate students and all other nonresident 11 students not in graduate or law programs;
 - (c) Resident graduate and law students;

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- (d) Nonresident graduate and law students;
- (e) Resident first professional students; and
- 15 (f) Nonresident students in first professional programs.
- (2) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, as used in this section "first professional programs" means programs leading to one of the following degrees: Doctor of medicine, doctor of dental surgery, or doctor of veterinary medicine.
- (3) ((For the 1995-96 and 1996-97 academic years,)) The building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the building fee is of total tuition for each tuition category in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.
- (4) The governing boards of each institution of higher education, 26 27 except for the technical colleges, shall charge to and collect from each student a services and activities fee. A governing board may 28 29 increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed 30 the annual percentage increase in student tuition fees for the 31 applicable tuition category: PROVIDED, That such percentage increase 32 33 shall not apply to that portion of the services and activities fee 34 previously committed to the repayment of bonded debt. The services and activities fee committee provided for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a 35 request to the governing board for a fee increase. 36
