5 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the
6 following:

7 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** It is the intent of the legislature to
8 provide the necessary access to quality upper division and graduate
9 higher education opportunities for the citizens of Spokane. The
10 legislature intends that the Spokane branch campus of Washington State
11 University, offering upper-division and graduate programs, be located
12 at the Riverpoint Higher Education Park and that Washington State
13 University be the administrative and fiscal agent for the Riverpoint
14 Higher Education Park. In addition, those programs offered by Eastern
15 Washington University that meet the rules and guidelines established by
16 the higher education coordinating board's program approval process may
17 serve students at the Riverpoint Higher Education Park. The
18 legislature intends to streamline the program planning and approval
19 process in Spokane by eliminating the joint center for higher
20 education; thereby treating the Spokane higher education community like
21 other public higher education communities in Washington that receive
22 program approval from the higher education coordinating board.
23 However, the legislature encourages partnerships, collaboration, and
24 avoidance of program duplication through regular communication among
25 the presidents of Spokane's public and private institutions of higher
26 education. The legislature further intends that the residential
27 mission of Eastern Washington University in Cheney be strengthened and
28 that Eastern Washington University focus on the excellence of its
29 primary campus in Cheney.

30 In addition, the legislature finds that the Spokane intercollegiate
31 research and technology institute is a vital and necessary element in
32 the academic and economic future of eastern Washington. The
33 legislature also finds that it is in the interest of the state of
34 Washington to support and promote applied research and technology in
35 areas of the state that, because of geographic or historic
36 circumstances, have not developed fully balanced economies. It is the

1 intent of the legislature that institutions of higher education and the
2 department of community, trade, and economic development work
3 cooperatively with the private sector in the development and
4 implementation of a technology transfer and integration program to
5 promote the economic development and enhance the quality of life in
6 eastern Washington.

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** (1) The higher education coordinating board
8 shall manage an assessment that determines the current higher education
9 resources of the greater Spokane area and the current and future
10 capital and programmatic higher education needs of the Spokane area,
11 including the balance among anticipated, unmet, and fully met higher
12 education needs. This assessment shall be coordinated with an economic
13 analysis of the greater Spokane area.

14 (2) The higher education coordinating board, in coordination with
15 the office of financial management, the employment security department,
16 and the department of community, trade, and economic development, shall
17 oversee the administration of an economic assessment of the greater
18 Spokane area. This assessment shall reference previous economic
19 studies of the greater Spokane area and include:

20 (a) Input from Spokane area civic leaders as well as the higher
21 education and business communities;

22 (b) An evaluation of the current economic situation in the greater
23 Spokane area and potential sectors and subsectors for significant job
24 expansion;

25 (c) An analysis of the possible transformation of the economic base
26 toward high technology and opportunities for industries producing
27 higher wages; and

28 (d) An evaluation of the basic and applied research resources and
29 needs of the present and future economy of the area.

30 (3) The assessments in subsections (1) and (2) of this section
31 shall be completed by July 1, 1998, and a final report submitted to the
32 higher education and fiscal committees of the legislature by October 1,
33 1998.

34 (4) By December 1, 1998, based on the findings of the assessments
35 in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, the higher education
36 coordinating board shall evaluate and develop a plan for the
37 disposition of the Eastern Washington University Spokane Center
38 Building.

1 (5)(a) By December 1, 1998, based on the findings of the
2 assessments in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, Washington
3 State University shall develop and deliver to the higher education
4 coordinating board for approval a plan for the management of the
5 Riverpoint Higher Education Park, excluding the land and the Spokane
6 Intercollegiate Research and Technology Institute, that includes:

- 7 (i) Capital facilities maintenance and development;
- 8 (ii) Coordination of upper-division course offerings; and
- 9 (iii) The coordination of graduate programs in Spokane.

10 (b) In developing the plan in (a) of this subsection, Washington
11 State University shall:

12 (i) Assume that Eastern Washington University students enrolled in
13 Eastern Washington University courses will pay Eastern Washington
14 University tuition rates; and

15 (ii) Emphasize and implement a maximum level of collaboration and
16 partnerships by Eastern Washington University, Washington State
17 University, and private institutions of higher education at the
18 Riverpoint Higher Education Park.

19 (c) Washington State University shall submit a preliminary higher
20 education services plan for the Riverpoint Higher Education Park to the
21 higher education coordinating board by September 1, 1998, and a final
22 plan to the higher education coordinating board and the office of
23 financial management by October 15, 1998. The plan shall incorporate,
24 but not be limited to:

25 (i) Relocation of all Spokane-based upper-division and graduate
26 course offerings and academic programs offered by public universities
27 in the city of Spokane to the Riverpoint Higher Education Park, using
28 existing and planned structures at the Riverpoint Higher Education
29 Park, except that the nursing courses and programs located in the
30 intercollegiate center for nursing education facility shall remain at
31 that location; and

32 (ii) A plan to establish an intercollegiate health sciences
33 consortium that would be modeled on the intercollegiate center for
34 nursing education. The intercollegiate health sciences consortium
35 shall include, but not be limited to, programs offered through the
36 intercollegiate center for nursing education and public and private
37 institutions of higher education. Programs offered by Eastern
38 Washington University in physical therapy, communication disorders,

1 nursing, and dental hygiene shall continue to be offered by Eastern
2 Washington University in Spokane.

3 (6) Washington State University, in consultation with the higher
4 education coordinating board, shall write a new mission statement and
5 operations plan for its Spokane branch campus. The draft mission
6 statement and plan shall be submitted to the higher education
7 coordinating board by September 1, 1998, and a final mission statement
8 and plan shall be submitted to the higher education coordinating board
9 for approval by October 15, 1998. The academic mission and plan shall
10 include, but not be limited to the following elements:

11 (a) Identifying those academic centers of excellence on which
12 Washington State University Spokane branch campus should focus, build,
13 and expand in order to enhance its upper-division and graduate
14 enrollment;

15 (b) Reflecting that programs in physical therapy, communications
16 disorders, nursing, and dental hygiene continue to be offered through
17 Eastern Washington University in Spokane;

18 (c) Including a requirement that Washington State University
19 identify and report to the higher education coordinating board programs
20 that should be offered in Spokane because of documented demand, unique
21 partnerships, demonstrated efficiency, and other considerations. The
22 draft of the report shall be submitted to the higher education
23 coordinating board by September 1, 1998, and the final report shall be
24 submitted to the higher education coordinating board by October 15,
25 1998;

26 (d) Ensuring that undergraduate programs that are offered at
27 Washington State University Spokane branch campus do not duplicate
28 undergraduate programs offered by Eastern Washington University at
29 Cheney;

30 (e) Describing and targeting Washington State University Spokane
31 branch campus's primary student audience;

32 (f) Ensuring that Washington State University Spokane branch
33 campus's admission standards complement the primary student audience;

34 (g) Describing circumstances under which it is appropriate for
35 Washington State University Spokane branch campus programs to serve
36 nonprimary students;

37 (h) Establishing projected enrollment levels for Washington State
38 University Spokane branch campus that reflect the needs of a upper-
39 division and graduate level branch campus and that account for the

1 demographic qualities and growth patterns associated with the areas
2 from which the branch campus draws its students;

3 (i) Describing how Washington State University Spokane branch
4 campus's enrollment levels will be consistent with state enrollment
5 levels;

6 (j) Developing financial projections for serving these projected
7 enrollment levels; and

8 (k) Analyzing and reviewing all capital and capacity information
9 regarding the Washington State University Spokane branch campus, with
10 particular attention to the current state of the existing physical
11 plant and to the realistic enrollment capacity of the campus.

12 (7) Eastern Washington University, in consultation with the higher
13 education coordinating board, shall write a new mission statement and
14 operations plan for Eastern Washington University as a comprehensive,
15 Cheney-based public institution of higher education. The draft mission
16 statement and plan shall be submitted to the higher education
17 coordinating board by September 1, 1998, and a final mission statement
18 and plan shall be submitted to the higher education coordinating board
19 for approval by October 15, 1998. The academic mission and plan shall
20 include, but not be limited to the following elements:

21 (a) Identifying those academic centers of excellence on which
22 Eastern Washington University should focus, build, and expand in order
23 to enhance its enrollment and reaffirm its reputation for academic
24 excellence;

25 (b) Reflecting that programs in physical therapy, communications
26 disorders, nursing, and dental hygiene continue to be offered through
27 Eastern Washington University in Spokane;

28 (c) Including a requirement that Eastern Washington University
29 identify and report to the higher education coordinating board program
30 offerings in Spokane that should be returned to the Cheney campus,
31 discontinued, or continued to be offered in Spokane because of
32 documented demand, unique partnerships, demonstrated efficiency, and
33 other considerations. The draft of the report shall be submitted to
34 the higher education coordinating board by September 1, 1998, and the
35 final report shall be submitted to the higher education coordinating
36 board by October 15, 1998;

37 (d) Ensuring that every effort is made to protect the academic
38 interests of and minimize adverse impacts on Eastern Washington
39 University students;

1 (e) Describing and targeting Eastern Washington University's
2 primary student audience;

3 (f) Ensuring that Eastern Washington University's admission
4 standards complement the primary student audience;

5 (g) Describing circumstances under which it is appropriate for
6 Eastern Washington University programs to serve nonprimary students;

7 (h) Establishing projected enrollment levels for Eastern Washington
8 University that reflect the needs of a comprehensive university and
9 that account for the demographic qualities and growth patterns
10 associated with the areas from which Eastern Washington University
11 draws its students;

12 (i) Describing how Eastern Washington University's enrollment
13 levels will be consistent with state enrollment levels;

14 (j) Developing financial projections for serving these reconfigured
15 enrollment levels; and

16 (k) Analyzing and reviewing all capital and capacity information
17 regarding the Eastern Washington University Cheney campus, with
18 particular attention to the current state of the existing physical
19 plant and to the realistic enrollment capacity of the campus.

20 (8) By December 1, 1998, the higher education coordinating board
21 shall evaluate the mission statements and operations plans required in
22 this section and submit a report to the higher education and fiscal
23 committees of the legislature.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** (1) On July 1, 1998, title to or all
25 interest in real estate and other assets, including but not limited to
26 assignable contracts, cash, equipment, buildings, facilities, and
27 appurtenances related to Riverpoint park, except for the area of real
28 property defined as the approximate two and one-half acres bounded by
29 the Spokane river, Trent Avenue, and Riverpoint Boulevard that is
30 reserved for the Spokane intercollegiate research and technology
31 institute and its expansion, shall be transferred from the joint center
32 for higher education to Washington State University.

33 (2) All interest in real estate and other assets, including but not
34 limited to assignable contracts, cash, equipment, buildings,
35 facilities, and appurtenances related to the Spokane intercollegiate
36 research and technology institute held as of July 1, 1998, shall vest
37 in the Spokane intercollegiate institute of technology. The area of
38 the real property related to the Spokane intercollegiate institute of

1 technology is defined as the approximate two and one-half acres bounded
2 by the Spokane river, Trent Avenue, and Riverpoint Boulevard.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.35 RCW
4 to read as follows:

5 Housing or a housing allowance may only be provided for the
6 president of a public four-year institution of higher education who
7 resides in the location where the institution is designated under RCW
8 28B.20.010, 28B.30.010, 28B.35.010, and 28B.40.010.

9 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.10.029 and 1996 c 110 s 5 are each amended to read
10 as follows:

11 (1) An institution of higher education may exercise independently
12 those powers otherwise granted to the director of general
13 administration in chapter 43.19 RCW in connection with the purchase and
14 disposition of all material, supplies, services, and equipment needed
15 for the support, maintenance, and use of the respective institution of
16 higher education. Property disposition policies followed by
17 institutions of higher education shall be consistent with policies
18 followed by the department of general administration. Purchasing
19 policies and procedures followed by institutions of higher education
20 shall be in compliance with chapters 39.19, 39.29, and 43.03 RCW, and
21 RCW 43.19.1901, 43.19.1906, 43.19.1911, 43.19.1917, 43.19.1937,
22 43.19.534, 43.19.685, 43.19.700 through 43.19.704, and 43.19.550
23 through 43.19.637. The community and technical colleges shall comply
24 with RCW 43.19.450. Except for the University of Washington,
25 institutions of higher education shall comply with RCW 43.19.1935,
26 43.19.19363, and 43.19.19368. If an institution of higher education
27 can satisfactorily demonstrate to the director of the office of
28 financial management that the cost of compliance is greater than the
29 value of benefits from any of the following statutes, then it shall be
30 exempt from them: RCW 43.19.685; 43.19.534; and 43.19.637. Any
31 institution of higher education that chooses to exercise independent
32 purchasing authority for a commodity or group of commodities shall
33 notify the director of general administration. Thereafter the director
34 of general administration shall not be required to provide those
35 services for that institution for the duration of the general
36 administration contract term for that commodity or group of
37 commodities.

1 (2) An institution of higher education may exercise independently
2 those powers otherwise granted to the public printer in chapter 43.78
3 RCW in connection with the production or purchase of any printing and
4 binding needed by the respective institution of higher education.
5 Purchasing policies and procedures followed by institutions of higher
6 education shall be in compliance with chapter 39.19 RCW. Any
7 institution of higher education that chooses to exercise independent
8 printing production or purchasing authority shall notify the public
9 printer. Thereafter the public printer shall not be required to
10 provide those services for that institution.

11 ~~((3) For the purposes of this section, an "institution of higher
12 education" shall include the joint center for higher education created
13 in chapter 28B.25 RCW when the joint center for higher education is
14 contracting with another institution of higher education that is acting
15 as the sole agent for purchasing and disposing of material, supplies,
16 services, and equipment, and for procuring printing or binding
17 services.))~~

18 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.45.050 and 1991 c 205 s 11 are each amended to
19 read as follows:

20 Washington State University ~~((and Eastern Washington University
21 are))~~ is responsible for ~~((providing))~~ ensuring the expansion of upper-
22 division and graduate level higher education programs to the citizens
23 of ((the)) Spokane ((area)), under rules or guidelines adopted by the
24 ~~((joint center for higher education. However, before any degree is~~
25 ~~authorized under this section it shall be subject to the review and~~
26 ~~approval of the))~~ higher education coordinating board. The rules
27 adopted by the higher education coordinating board shall: (1) Avoid
28 program duplication; and (2) encourage collaboration between Washington
29 State University and Eastern Washington University on the delivery of
30 graduate level programs in Spokane. Washington State University shall
31 meet ((its)) that responsibility through the operation of a branch
32 campus in ((the)) Spokane ((area. Eastern Washington University shall
33 ~~meet its responsibility through the operation of programs and~~
34 ~~facilities in Spokane)).~~

35 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.130.020 and 1997 c 273 s 2 are each amended to
36 read as follows:

1 (1) The governing board of an institution of higher education as
2 defined in RCW 28B.10.016 may impose either a voluntary or a mandatory
3 transportation fee on employees and on students at the institution.
4 The board of (~~the joint center for higher education under chapter~~
5 ~~28B.25 RCW~~) regents of Washington State University may impose either
6 a voluntary or a mandatory transportation fee on faculty and staff
7 working at the Riverpoint higher education park and on students
8 attending classes there. The transportation fee shall be used solely
9 to fund transportation demand management programs that reduce the
10 demand for campus and neighborhood parking, and promote alternatives to
11 single-occupant vehicle driving. If the board charges a mandatory
12 transportation fee to students, it shall charge a mandatory
13 transportation fee to employees. The transportation fee for employees
14 may exceed, but shall not be lower than the transportation fee charged
15 to students. The transportation fee for employees may be deducted from
16 the employees' paychecks. The transportation fee for students may be
17 imposed annually, or each academic term. For students attending
18 community colleges and technical colleges, the mandatory transportation
19 fee shall not exceed sixty percent of the maximum rate permitted for
20 services and activities fees at community colleges, unless, through a
21 vote, a majority of students consent to increase the transportation
22 fee. For students attending four-year institutions of higher education
23 or classes at the Riverpoint higher education park, the mandatory
24 transportation fee shall not exceed thirty-five percent of the maximum
25 rate permitted for services and activities fees at the institution
26 where the student is enrolled unless, through a vote, a majority of
27 students consents to increase the transportation fee. The board may
28 make a limited number of exceptions to the fee based on a policy
29 adopted by the board.

30 (2) The board of (~~the joint center for higher education under~~
31 ~~chapter 28B.25 RCW~~) regents of Washington State University shall not
32 impose a transportation fee on any student who is already paying a
33 transportation fee to the institution of higher education in which the
34 student is enrolled.

35 **Sec. 8.** RCW 43.01.236 and 1997 c 273 s 3 are each amended to read
36 as follows:

1 All institutions of higher education as defined under RCW
2 28B.10.016 (~~and the joint center for higher education under chapter~~
3 ~~28B.25 RCW~~) are exempt from the requirements under RCW 43.01.240.

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** SPOKANE INTERCOLLEGIATE RESEARCH AND
5 TECHNOLOGY INSTITUTE. (1) The Spokane intercollegiate research and
6 technology institute is created.

7 (2) The institute shall be operated and administered as a multi-
8 institutional education and research center, housing appropriate
9 programs conducted in Spokane under the authority of institutions of
10 higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016. Washington independent
11 and private institutions of higher education may participate as full
12 partners in any academic and research activities of the institute.

13 (3) The institute shall house education and research programs
14 specifically designed to meet the needs of eastern Washington.

15 (4) The establishment of any education program at the institute and
16 the lease, purchase, or construction of any site or facility for the
17 institute is subject to the approval of the higher education
18 coordinating board under RCW 28B.80.340.

19 (5) The institute shall be headquartered in Spokane.

20 (6) The mission of the institute is to perform and commercialize
21 research that benefits the intermediate and long-term economic vitality
22 of eastern Washington and to develop and strengthen university-industry
23 relationships through the conduct of research that is primarily of
24 interest to eastern Washington-based companies or state economic
25 development programs. The institute shall:

26 (a) Perform and facilitate research supportive of state science and
27 technology objectives, particularly as they relate to eastern
28 Washington industries;

29 (b) Provide leading edge collaborative research and technology
30 transfer opportunities primarily to eastern Washington industries;

31 (c) Provide substantial opportunities for training undergraduate
32 and graduate students through direct involvement in research and
33 industry interactions;

34 (d) Emphasize and develop nonstate support of the institute's
35 research activities; and

36 (e) Provide a forum for effective interaction between the state's
37 technology-based industries and its academic institutions through

1 promotion of faculty collaboration with industry, particularly within
2 eastern Washington.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 10.** ADMINISTRATION--BOARD OF DIRECTORS. (1)

4 The institute shall be administered by the board of directors.

5 (2) The board shall consist of the following members:

6 (a) Nine members of the general public. Of the general public
7 membership, at least six shall be individuals who are associated with
8 or employed by technology-based or manufacturing-based industries and
9 have broad business experience and an understanding of high technology;

10 (b) The executive director of the Washington technology center or
11 the director's designee;

12 (c) The provost of Washington State University or the provost's
13 designee;

14 (d) The provost of Eastern Washington University or the provost's
15 designee;

16 (e) The provost of Central Washington University or the provost's
17 designee;

18 (f) The provost of the University of Washington or the provost's
19 designee;

20 (g) An academic representative from the Spokane community colleges;

21 (h) One member from Gonzaga University; and

22 (i) One member from Whitworth College.

23 (3) The term of office for each board member, excluding the
24 executive director of the Washington technology center, the provosts of
25 Washington State University, Eastern Washington University, Central
26 Washington University, and the University of Washington, shall be three
27 years. The executive director of the institute shall be an ex officio,
28 nonvoting member of the board. Board members shall be appointed by the
29 governor. Initial appointments shall be for staggered terms to ensure
30 the long-term continuity of the board. The board shall meet at least
31 quarterly.

32 (4) The duties of the board include:

33 (a) Developing the general operating policies for the institute;

34 (b) Appointing the executive director of the institute;

35 (c) Approving the annual operating budget of the institute;

36 (d) Establishing priorities for the selection and funding of
37 research projects that guarantee the greatest potential return on the
38 state's investment;

1 (e) Approving and allocating funding for research projects
2 conducted by the institute;

3 (f) In cooperation with the department of community, trade, and
4 economic development, developing a biennial work plan and five-year
5 strategic plan for the institute that are consistent with the state-
6 wide technology development and commercialization goals;

7 (g) Coordinating with public, independent, and private institutions
8 of higher education, and other participating institutions of higher
9 education in the development of training, research, and development
10 programs to be conducted at the institute that are targeted to meet
11 industrial needs;

12 (h) Assisting the department of community, trade, and economic
13 development in the department's efforts to develop state science and
14 technology public policies and coordinate publicly funded programs;

15 (i) Reviewing annual progress reports on funded research projects;

16 (j) Providing an annual report to the governor and the legislature
17 detailing the activities and performance of the institute; and

18 (k) Submitting annually to the department of community, trade, and
19 economic development an updated strategic plan and a statement of
20 performance measured against the mission, roles, and contractual
21 obligations of the institute.

22 (5) The board may enter into contracts to fulfill its
23 responsibilities and purposes under this chapter.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** SUPPORT FROM PARTICIPATING INSTITUTIONS.
25 Staff support for programs will be provided from among the cooperating
26 institutions through cooperative agreements. Cooperating institutions
27 are Washington State University as the senior research partner, Eastern
28 Washington University, Central Washington University, the University of
29 Washington, Gonzaga University, Whitworth College, and other
30 participating institutions of higher education.

31 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** OPERATING STAFF. The director of the
32 Spokane intercollegiate research and technology institute may hire
33 staff as necessary to operate the institution. The director may enter
34 into cooperative agreements for programs and research with public and
35 private organizations including state and nonstate funding agencies
36 consistent with policies of the Spokane intercollegiate research and
37 technology institute.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 13.** ROLE OF DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY, TRADE, AND
2 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. The department of community, trade, and economic
3 development shall contract with the institute for the expenditure of
4 state-appropriated funds for the operation of the institute. The
5 department of community, trade, and economic development shall provide
6 guidance to the institute regarding expenditure of state-appropriated
7 funds and the development of the institute's strategic plan. The
8 director of the department of community, trade, and economic
9 development shall not withhold funds appropriated for the institute if
10 the institute complies with the provisions of its contract with the
11 department of community, trade, and economic development. The
12 department is responsible to the legislature for the contractual
13 performance of the institute.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 14.** AVAILABILITY OF FACILITIES TO OTHER
15 INSTITUTIONS. The facilities of the institute shall be made available
16 to other institutions of higher education within the state when this
17 would benefit specific program needs.

18 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 15.** AUTHORITY TO RECEIVE AND EXPEND FEDERAL
19 FUNDS. The board may receive and expend federal funds and any private
20 gifts or grants to further the purpose of the institute. The funds are
21 to be expended in accordance with federal and state law and any
22 conditions contingent in the grant of those funds.

23 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 16.** CAPTIONS NOT LAW. Captions used in this
24 chapter are not any part of the law.
