Where a 16 17 person required to register under this section is in custody of the state department of corrections, the state department of social and 18 19 health services, a local division of youth services, or a local jail or 20 juvenile detention facility as a result of a sex offense or kidnapping offense, the person shall also register at the time of release from 21 custody with an official designated by the agency that has jurisdiction 22 23 over the person.
- (2) The person shall provide ((the county sheriff with)) the following information when registering: (a) Name; (b) address; (c) date and place of birth; (d) place of employment; (e) crime for which convicted; (f) date and place of conviction; (g) aliases used; ((and)) (h) social security number; (i) photograph; and (j) fingerprints.
- (3)(a) Offenders shall register within the following deadlines.

 For purposes of this section the term "conviction" refers to adult convictions and juvenile adjudications for sex offenses or kidnapping offenses:
- (i) OFFENDERS IN CUSTODY. (A) Sex offenders who committed a sex offense on, before, or after February 28, 1990, and who, on or after July 28, 1991, are in custody, as a result of that offense, of the state department of corrections, the state department of social and

health services, a local division of youth services, or a local jail or juvenile detention facility, and (B) kidnapping offenders who on or 2 after July 27, 1997, are in custody of the state department of 3 4 corrections, the state department of social and health services, a local division of youth services, or a local jail or juvenile detention 5 facility, must register at the time of release from custody with an 6 7 official designated by the agency that has jurisdiction over the 8 offender. The agency shall within three days forward the registration 9 information to the county sheriff for the county of the offender's anticipated residence. The offender must also register within twenty-10 four hours from the time of release with the county sheriff for the 11 county of the person's residence, or if the person is not a resident of 12 Washington, the county of the person's school, or place of employment 13 14 or vocation. The agency that has jurisdiction over the offender shall 15 provide notice to the offender of the duty to register. Failure to register at the time of release and within twenty-four hours of release 16 17 constitutes a violation of this section and is punishable as provided in subsection $((\frac{7}{1}))$ (8) of this section. 18

When the agency with jurisdiction intends to release an offender with a duty to register under this section, and the agency has knowledge that the offender is eligible for developmental disability services from the department of social and health services, the agency shall notify the division of developmental disabilities of the release. Notice shall occur not more than thirty days before the offender is to be released. The agency and the division shall assist the offender in meeting the initial registration requirement under this section. Failure to provide such assistance shall not constitute a defense for any violation of this section.

OFFENDERS NOTIN CUSTODY OR LOCAL (ii) BUT UNDER STATE JURISDICTION. Sex offenders who, on July 28, 1991, are not in custody but are under the jurisdiction of the indeterminate sentence review board or under the department of correction's active supervision, as defined by the department of corrections, the state department of social and health services, or a local division of youth services, for sex offenses committed before, on, or after February 28, 1990, must register within ten days of July 28, 1991. Kidnapping offenders who, on July 27, 1997, are not in custody but are under the jurisdiction of the indeterminate sentence review board or under the department of correction's active supervision, as defined by the department of

corrections, the state department of social and health services, or a local division of youth services, for kidnapping offenses committed 2 before, on, or after July 27, 1997, must register within ten days of 3 July 27, 1997. A change in supervision status of a sex offender who 4 5 was required to register under this subsection (3)(a)(ii) as of July 28, 1991, or a kidnapping offender required to register as of July 27, 6 7 1997, shall not relieve the offender of the duty to register or to 8 reregister following a change in residence. The obligation to register 9 shall only cease pursuant to RCW 9A.44.140.

10 (iii) OFFENDERS UNDER FEDERAL JURISDICTION. Sex offenders who, on or after July 23, 1995, and kidnapping offenders who, on or after July 11 27, 1997, as a result of that offense are in the custody of the United 12 13 States bureau of prisons or other federal or military correctional agency for sex offenses committed before, on, or after February 28, 14 15 1990, or kidnapping offenses committed on, before, or after July 27, 1997, must register within twenty-four hours from the time of release 16 with the county sheriff for the county of the person's residence, or if 17 the person is not a resident of Washington, the county of the person's 18 19 school, or place of employment or vocation. Sex offenders who, on July 20 23, 1995, are not in custody but are under the jurisdiction of the United States bureau of prisons, United States courts, United States 21 22 parole commission, or military parole board for sex offenses committed before, on, or after February 28, 1990, must register within ten days 23 of July 23, 1995. Kidnapping offenders who, on July 27, 1997, are not 24 25 in custody but are under the jurisdiction of the United States bureau 26 of prisons, United States courts, United States parole commission, or 27 military parole board for kidnapping offenses committed before, on, or after July 27, 1997, must register within ten days of July 27, 1997. 28 A change in supervision status of a sex offender who was required to 29 30 register under this subsection (3)(a)(iii) as of July 23, 1995, or a kidnapping offender required to register as of July 27, 1997 shall not 31 32 relieve the offender of the duty to register or to reregister following a change in residence, or if the person is not a resident of 33 34 Washington, the county of the person's school, or place of employment 35 or vocation. The obligation to register shall only cease pursuant to RCW 9A.44.140. 36

(iv) OFFENDERS WHO ARE CONVICTED BUT NOT CONFINED. Sex offenders who are convicted of a sex offense on or after July 28, 1991, for a sex offense that was committed on or after February 28, 1990, and

kidnapping offenders who are convicted on or after July 27, 1997, for a kidnapping offense that was committed on or after July 27, 1997, but who are not sentenced to serve a term of confinement immediately upon sentencing, shall report to the county sheriff to register immediately upon completion of being sentenced.

(v) OFFENDERS WHO ARE NEW RESIDENTS OR RETURNING WASHINGTON 6 7 Sex offenders and kidnapping offenders who move to RESIDENTS. 8 Washington state from another state or a foreign country that are not 9 under the jurisdiction of the state department of corrections, the 10 indeterminate sentence review board, or the state department of social and health services at the time of moving to Washington, must register 11 within thirty days of establishing residence or reestablishing 12 13 residence if the person is a former Washington resident. The duty to register under this subsection applies to sex offenders convicted under 14 15 the laws of another state or a foreign country, federal or military 16 statutes, or Washington state for offenses committed on or after 17 February 28, 1990, and to kidnapping offenders convicted under the laws of another state or a foreign country, federal or military statutes, or 18 19 Washington state for offenses committed on or after July 27, 1997. Sex 20 offenders and kidnapping offenders from other states or a foreign country who, when they move to Washington, are under the jurisdiction 21 of the department of corrections, the indeterminate sentence review 22 23 board, or the department of social and health services must register 24 within twenty-four hours of moving to Washington. The agency that has 25 jurisdiction over the offender shall notify the offender of the 26 registration requirements before the offender moves to Washington.

27 (vi) OFFENDERS FOUND NOT GUILTY BY REASON OF INSANITY. or juvenile who has been found not quilty by reason of insanity under 28 29 chapter 10.77 RCW of (A) committing a sex offense on, before, or after 30 February 28, 1990, and who, on or after July 23, 1995, is in custody, as a result of that finding, of the state department of social and 31 health services, or (B) committing a kidnapping offense on, before, or 32 33 after July 27, 1997, and who on or after July 27, 1997, is in custody, 34 as a result of that finding, of the state department of social and 35 health services, must register within twenty-four hours from the time of release with the county sheriff for the county of the person's 36 37 The state department of social and health services shall provide notice to the adult or juvenile in its custody of the duty to 38 39 register. Any adult or juvenile who has been found not guilty by

- reason of insanity of committing a sex offense on, before, or after 2 February 28, 1990, but who was released before July 23, 1995, or any adult or juvenile who has been found not guilty by reason of insanity 3 of committing a kidnapping offense but who was released before July 27, 4 5 1997, shall be required to register within twenty-four hours of receiving notice of this registration requirement. The state 6 7 department of social and health services shall make reasonable attempts within available resources to notify sex offenders who were released 8 before July 23, 1995, and kidnapping offenders who were released before 9 10 July 27, 1997. Failure to register within twenty-four hours of 11 release, or of receiving notice, constitutes a violation of this 12 section and is punishable as provided in subsection $((\frac{7}{1}))$ of this 13 section.
- (b) Failure to register within the time required under this section constitutes a per se violation of this section and is punishable as provided in subsection (((7))) (8) of this section. The county sheriff shall not be required to determine whether the person is living within the county.
- 19 (c) An arrest on charges of failure to register, service of an information, or a complaint for a violation of this section, or 20 arraignment on charges for a violation of this section, constitutes 21 actual notice of the duty to register. Any person charged with the 22 crime of failure to register under this section who asserts as a 23 24 defense the lack of notice of the duty to register shall register 25 immediately following actual notice of the duty through arrest, 26 service, or arraignment. The person must also send written notice within ten days of the change of address in the new county to the county sheriff with whom the person last registered. sheriff with whom the person last registered shall promptly forward the information concerning the change of address to the county sheriff for the county of the person's new residence. If any person required to register pursuant to this section moves out of Washington state, the person must also send written notice within ten days of moving to the new state or a foreign country to the county sheriff with whom the person last registered in Washington state. Upon receipt of notice of change of address to a new state, the county sheriff shall promptly forward the information regarding the change of address to the agency designated by the new state as the state's offender registration agency.

(b) It is an affirmative defense to a charge that the person failed to send a notice at least fourteen days in advance of moving as required under (a) of this subsection that the person did not know the location of his or her new residence at least fourteen days before moving. The defendant must establish the defense by a preponderance of the evidence and, to prevail on the defense, must also prove by a preponderance that the defendant sent the required notice within twenty-four hours of determining the new address.

(5) A sex offender subject to registration requirements under this section who applies to change his or her name under RCW 4.24.130 or any other law shall submit a copy of the application to the county sheriff of the county of the person's residence and to the state patrol not fewer than five days before the entry of an order granting the name change. No sex offender under the requirement to register under this section at the time of application shall be granted an order changing his or her name if the court finds that doing so will interfere with legitimate law enforcement interests, except that no order shall be denied when the name change is requested for religious or legitimate cultural reasons or in recognition of marriage or dissolution of marriage. A sex offender under the requirement to register under this section who receives an order changing his or her name shall submit a copy of the order to the county sheriff of the county of the person's

 - (d) "Student" means a person who is enrolled, on a full-time or part-time basis, in any public or private educational institution. An educational institution includes any secondary school, trade or professional institution, or institution of higher education.

This authorization applies to information 10 regarding: (a) Any person adjudicated or convicted of a sex offense as 11 defined in RCW ((9.94A.030)) 9A.44.130 or a kidnapping offense as 12 defined by RCW 9A.44.130; (b) any person under the jurisdiction of the 13 14 indeterminate sentence review board as the result of a sex offense or 15 kidnapping offense; (c) any person committed as a sexually violent predator under chapter 71.09 RCW or as a sexual psychopath under 16 chapter 71.06 RCW; (d) any person found not guilty of a sex offense or 17 18 kidnapping offense by reason of insanity under chapter 10.77 RCW; and 19 (e) any person found incompetent to stand trial for a sex offense or kidnapping offense and subsequently committed under chapter 71.05 or 20 71.34 RCW. 21
- (2) The extent of the public disclosure of relevant and necessary information shall be rationally related to: (a) The level of risk posed by the offender to the community; (b) the locations where the offender resides, expects to reside, or is regularly found; and (c) the needs of the affected community members for information to enhance their individual and collective safety.
- (3) Local law enforcement agencies shall consider the following 28 29 guidelines in determining the extent of a public disclosure made under 30 this section: (a) For offenders classified as risk level I, the agency shall share information with other appropriate law enforcement agencies 31 and may disclose, upon request, relevant, necessary, and accurate 32 33 information to any victim or witness to the offense and to any 34 individual community member who lives near the residence where the offender resides, expects to reside, or is regularly found; (b) for 35 36 offenders classified as risk level II, the agency may also disclose 37 relevant, necessary, and accurate information to public and private 38 schools, child day care centers, family day care providers, businesses

and organizations that serve primarily children, women, or vulnerable adults, and neighbors and community groups near the residence where the offender resides, expects to reside, or is regularly found; and (c) for offenders classified as risk level III, the agency may also disclose relevant, necessary, and accurate information to the public at large.

- 6 (4) Local law enforcement agencies that disseminate information 7 pursuant to this section shall: (a) Review available risk level 8 classifications made by the department of corrections, the department of social and health services, and the indeterminate sentence review 9 10 board; (b) assign risk level classifications to all ((sex)) offenders about whom information will be disseminated; and (c) make a good faith 11 effort to notify the public and residents at least fourteen days before 12 13 the offender is released from confinement or, where an offender moves from another jurisdiction, as soon as possible after the agency learns 14 15 of the offender's move, except that in no case may this notification provision be construed to require an extension of an offender's release 16 17 date. The juvenile court shall provide local law enforcement officials with all relevant information on offenders allowed to remain in the 18 19 community in a timely manner.
- (5) An appointed or elected public official, public employee, or 20 public agency as defined in RCW 4.24.470 is immune from civil liability 21 for damages for any discretionary risk level classification decisions 22 23 or release of relevant and necessary information, unless it is shown 24 that the official, employee, or agency acted with gross negligence or 25 in bad faith. The immunity in this section applies to risk level 26 classification decisions and the release of relevant and necessary 27 information regarding any individual for whom disclosure is authorized. The decision of a local law enforcement agency or official to classify 28 ((a sex)) an offender to a risk level other than the one assigned by 29 30 the department of corrections, the department of social and health services, or the indeterminate sentence review board, or the release of 31 any relevant and necessary information based on that different 32 33 classification shall not, by itself, be considered gross negligence or 34 bad faith. The immunity provided under this section applies to the 35 release of relevant and necessary information to other public officials, public employees, or public agencies, and to the general 36 public. 37
- 38 (6) Except as may otherwise be provided by law, nothing in this 39 section shall impose any liability upon a public official, public

- 1 employee, or public agency for failing to release information 2 authorized under this section.
- 3 (7) Nothing in this section implies that information regarding 4 persons designated in subsection (1) of this section is confidential 5 except as may otherwise be provided by law.
- (8) When a local law enforcement agency or official classifies ((a sex)) an offender differently than the offender is classified by the department of corrections, the department of social and health services, or the indeterminate sentence review board, the law enforcement agency or official shall notify the appropriate department or the board and submit its reasons supporting the change in classification.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. If any provision of this act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected."
