Background: School district personnel include certificated— and classified—personnel. The Superintendent of Public Instruction issues four types of certificates:

- teacher certificates;
- · administrator certificates for principals, superintendents, or program administrators;
- educational staff associate certificates for personnel such as counselors, librarians, school nurses, and psychologists; and
- · vocational certificates for vocational education instructors.

Classified personnel include clerks, custodians, bus drivers, educational assistants, maintenance employees, food service workers, and supervisors. The Superintendent of Public Instruction does not certify classified personnel.

Currently, the terms classified— and noncertificated— are used synonymously in the education code.

Summary of Bill: References to noncertificated— staff are changed to classified.—

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Not requested.

Effective Date: Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed. However, section 2 of this act takes effect September 1, 2000 unless a law is enacted stating that a school accountability and academic assessment system is not in place.

Testimony For: Replacing the term noncertificated— with classified— explains what we are rather than what we aren't. The name change will not have a significant effect on the current laws.
