- 8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** Statement of purpose. The legislature finds
- 10 that the growth management act, chapter 36.70A RCW, together with its
- 11 pendant implementing administrative boards, agencies, rules, and
- 12 regulations, has effectively replaced local government control over
- 13 local land use policy with centralized state level control, contrary to
- 14 our tradition of local control over local issues. This act is intended
- 15 to revoke the growth management act, chapter 36.70A RCW, and dissolve
- 16 all administrative boards and agencies created pursuant to that
- 17 chapter, invalidate administrative rules adopted under the authority of
- 18 that chapter, prohibit the recovery by the state of any moneys
- 19 distributed pursuant to the authority of that chapter, and relieve
- 20 local governments of all burdens and obligations imposed upon them by
- 21 that chapter. The legislature continues to encourage local governments
- 22 to plan for their anticipated growth, but intends that each local
- 23 government lay such plans as in its own judgment best fit its own
- 24 unique local needs and circumstances.

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9 **Sec. 5.** RCW 35.58.2795 and 1994 c 158 s 6 are each amended to read 10 as follows:

By April 1st of each year, the legislative authority of each 11 12 municipality, as defined in RCW 35.58.272, and each regional transit 13 authority shall prepare a six-year transit development plan for that 14 calendar year and the ensuing five years. ((The program shall be 15 consistent with the comprehensive plans adopted by counties, cities, and towns, pursuant to chapter 35.63, 35A.63, or 36.70 RCW, the 16 inherent authority of a first class city or charter county derived from 17 18 its charter, or chapter 36.70A RCW.)) The program shall contain 19 information as to how the municipality intends to meet state and local long-range priorities for public transportation, capital improvements, 20 significant operating changes planned for the system, and how the 21 municipality intends to fund program needs. The six-year plan for each 22 23 municipality and regional transit authority shall specifically set 24 forth those projects of regional significance for inclusion in the 25 transportation improvement program within that region. municipality and regional transit authority shall file the six-year 26 program with the state department of transportation, the transportation 27 improvement board, and cities, counties, and regional planning councils 28 29 within which the municipality is located.

In developing its program, the municipality and the regional transit authority shall consider those policy recommendations affecting public transportation contained in the state transportation policy plan approved by the state transportation commission and, where appropriate, adopted by the legislature. The municipality shall conduct one or more public hearings while developing its program and for each annual update.

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Sec. 6. RCW 35.77.010 and 1994 c 179 s 1 and 1994 c 158 s 7 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

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(1) The legislative body of each city and town, pursuant to one or more public hearings thereon, shall prepare and adopt a comprehensive transportation program for the ensuing six calendar years. ((If the city or town has adopted a comprehensive plan pursuant to chapter 35.63 or 35A.63 RCW, the inherent authority of a first class city derived from its charter, or chapter 36.70A RCW, the program shall be consistent with this comprehensive plan.))

10 The program shall be filed with the secretary of transportation not more than thirty days after its adoption. 11 Annually thereafter the legislative body of each city and town shall review the work 12 13 accomplished under the program and determine current city transportation needs. Based on these findings each such legislative 14 15 body shall prepare and after public hearings thereon adopt a revised 16 and extended comprehensive transportation program before July 1st of 17 each year, and each one-year extension and revision shall be filed with the secretary of transportation not more than thirty days after its 18 19 adoption. The purpose of this section is to assure that each city and 20 town shall perpetually have available advanced plans looking to the future for not less than six years as a guide in carrying out a 21 coordinated transportation program. The program may at any time be 22 revised by a majority of the legislative body of a city or town, but 23 24 only after a public hearing.

25 The six-year plan for each city or town shall specifically set 26 forth those projects and programs of regional significance for 27 inclusion in the transportation improvement program within that region.

- (2) Each six-year transportation program forwarded to the secretary in compliance with subsection (1) of this section shall contain information as to how a city or town will expend its moneys, including funds made available pursuant to chapter 47.30 RCW, for nonmotorized transportation purposes.
- 33 (3) Each six-year transportation program forwarded to the secretary 34 in compliance with subsection (1) of this section shall contain 35 information as to how a city or town shall act to preserve railroad 36 right-of-way in the event the railroad ceases to operate in the city's 37 or town's jurisdiction.

- 3 (1) This chapter replaces the writ of certiorari for appeal of land 4 use decisions and shall be the exclusive means of judicial review of 5 land use decisions, except that this chapter does not apply to:

- 7 (i) Land use decisions made by bodies that are not part of a local 8 jurisdiction;

- $((\frac{1}{1}))$ Whenever the board approves a rural arterial project it 26 27 shall determine the amount of rural arterial trust account funds to be allocated for such project. The allocation shall be based upon 28 29 information contained in the six-year plan submitted by the county seeking approval of the project and upon such further investigation as 30 the board deems necessary. The board shall adopt reasonable rules 31 pursuant to which rural arterial trust account funds allocated to a 32 project may be increased upon a subsequent application of the county 33 34 constructing the project. - (3) Each proposed amendment to approved community comprehensive plans or approved community zoning ordinances that is adopted by a community council shall be submitted to the county legislative authority for its review of the consistency of the amendment with the ordinance adopted under subsection (1) of this section. The county legislative authority shall either approve the proposed amendment as adopted or refer the proposed amendment back to the community council with written findings specifying the inconsistencies within ninety days after the proposed amendment was submitted. The unamended community comprehensive plans and unamended community zoning ordinances shall remain in effect in the community until the proposed amendment has been approved as provided in this subsection.
- (4) If the county legislative authority amends the ordinance it adopted under subsection (1) of this section, a community council shall be given at least one hundred twenty days to amend its community comprehensive plans and community zoning ordinances to be consistent with this amended ordinance. However, the county legislative authority may amend the community comprehensive plans and community zoning ordinances to achieve consistency with this amended ordinance. Nothing in this subsection shall preclude a community council from subsequently obtaining approval of its proposed community comprehensive plans and proposed community zoning ordinances.
- (5) Approved community comprehensive plans and approved community zoning ordinances shall be enforced by the county as if they had been adopted by the county legislative authority. All quasi-judicial actions and permits relating to these plans and ordinances shall be made and decided by the county legislative authority or otherwise as provided by the county legislative authority.
- 32 (6) The county shall provide administrative and staff support for 33 each community council within its boundaries.

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revenues anticipated to support the six-year programs and financial 2 plans under RCW 44.40.070. In estimating revenues to support financial plans under RCW 44.40.070, the office of financial management shall 3 4 rely on information and advice from the interagency revenue task force. 5 Revenues shall be estimated for such fiscal period from the source and at the rates existing by law at the time of submission of the budget 6 7 document, including the supplemental budgets submitted in the even-8 numbered years of a biennium. Supplemental and biennial documents shall reflect a six-year expenditure plan consistent with estimated revenues from existing sources and at existing rates for those agencies required to submit six-year program and financial plans under RCW 44.40.070. Any additional revenue resulting from proposed changes to existing statutes shall be separately identified within the document as well as related expenditures for the six-year period.

The budget document or documents shall also contain:

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- (a) Revenues classified by fund and source for the immediately past fiscal period, those received or anticipated for the current fiscal period, those anticipated for the ensuing biennium, and those anticipated for the ensuing six-year period to support the six-year programs and financial plans required under RCW 44.40.070;
 - (b) The undesignated fund balance or deficit, by fund;
- 32 (c) Such additional information dealing with expenditures, 33 revenues, workload, performance, and personnel as the legislature may 34 direct by law or concurrent resolution;

- This section sets forth the expenditure programs and the allotment and reserve procedures to be followed by the executive branch for public funds.
- 6 (1) Allotments of an appropriation for any fiscal period shall 7 conform to the terms, limits, or conditions of the appropriation.
- 8 (2) The director of financial management shall provide all agencies 9 with a complete set of operating and capital instructions for preparing 10 a statement of proposed expenditures at least thirty days before the 11 beginning of a fiscal period. - (h)) Other criteria that the board considers advisable.
- 37 (3) Existing debt or financial obligations of local governments 38 shall not be refinanced under this chapter. Each local government 39 applicant shall provide documentation of attempts to secure additional

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local or other sources of funding for each public works project for which financial assistance is sought under this chapter.

- 10 (3) The committee may not approve an application if it fails to 11 provide for adequate reporting or disclosure of financial data to the 12 committee. The committee may require an annual or other periodic audit 13 of the project books.
- 14 (4) The committee may require that the project be managed in whole 15 or in part by a local development organization and may prescribe a 16 management fee to be paid to such organization by the recipient of the 17 loan or grant.
- (5)(a) Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, the committee shall not approve any application which would result in a loan or grant in excess of three hundred fifty thousand dollars.
- (b) The committee may approve an application which results in a 22 loan or grant of up to seven hundred thousand dollars if the 23 application has been approved by the director.
- 24 (6) The committee shall fix the terms and rates pertaining to its loans.
- (7) Should there be more demand for loans than funds available for lending, the committee shall provide loans for those projects which will lead to the greatest amount of employment or benefit to a community. In determining the "greatest amount of employment or benefit" the committee shall also consider the employment which would be saved by its loan ((and the benefit relative to the community, not just the total number of new jobs or jobs saved)).
- 33 (8) To the extent permitted under federal law the committee shall require applicants to provide for the transfer of all payments of principal and interest on loans to the Washington state development loan fund created under this chapter. Under circumstances where the federal law does not permit the committee to require such transfer, the committee shall give priority to applications where the applicants on their own volition make commitments to provide for the transfer.

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- 1 (9) The committee shall not approve any application to finance or 2 help finance a shopping mall.
- 3 (10) For loans not made to minority and women-owned businesses, the 4 committee shall make at least eighty percent of the appropriated funds 5 available to projects located in distressed areas, and may make up to twenty percent available to projects located in areas not designated as 6 7 distressed. For loans not made to minority and women-owned businesses, 8 the committee shall not make funds available to projects located in 9 areas not designated as distressed if the fund's net worth is less than 10 seven million one hundred thousand dollars.
- (11) If an objection is raised to a project on the basis of unfair business competition, the committee shall evaluate the potential impact of a project on similar businesses located in the local market area. A grant may be denied by the committee if a project is not likely to result in a net increase in employment within a local market area.
- 16 (12) For loans to minority and women-owned businesses who do not 17 meet the credit criteria, the committee may consider nontraditional credit standards to offset past discrimination that has precluded full 18 19 participation of minority or women-owned businesses in the economy. 20 For applicants with high potential who do not meet the credit criteria, the committee shall consider developing alternative borrowing methods. 21 For applicants denied loans due to credit problems, the committee shall 22 23 provide financial counseling within available resources and provide 24 referrals to credit rehabilitation services. In circumstances of 25 competing applications, priority shall be given to members of eligible 26 groups which previously have been least served by this fund.
 - Sec. 18. RCW 43.210.010 and 1990 1st ex.s. c 17 s 65 are each amended to read as follows:
- 29 The legislature finds:

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- (1) The exporting of goods and services from Washington to international markets is an important economic stimulus to the growth, development, and stability of the state's businesses ((in both urban and rural areas)), and that these economic activities create needed jobs for Washingtonians.
- 35 (2) Impediments to the entry of many small and medium-sized 36 businesses into export markets have restricted growth in exports from 37 the state.

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- 1 (3) Particularly significant impediments for many small and medium-2 sized businesses are the lack of easily accessible information about 3 export opportunities and financing alternatives.

((The board shall not allocate funds, nor make payments of the funds under RCW 47.26.260, to any county, city, or town identified by the governor under RCW 36.70A.340.))

Sec. 21. RCW 57.16.010 and 1996 c 230 s 501 are each amended to 17 read as follows:

Before ordering any improvements or submitting to vote any proposition for incurring any indebtedness, the district commissioners shall adopt a general comprehensive plan for the type or types of facilities the district proposes to provide. A district may prepare a separate general comprehensive plan for each of these services and other services that districts are permitted to provide, or the district may combine any or all of its comprehensive plans into a single general comprehensive plan.

(1) For a general comprehensive plan of a water supply system, the commissioners shall investigate the several portions and sections of the district for the purpose of determining the present and reasonably foreseeable future needs thereof; shall examine and investigate, determine, and select a water supply or water supplies for such district suitable and adequate for present and reasonably foreseeable future needs thereof; and shall consider and determine a general system or plan for acquiring such water supply or water supplies, and the lands, waters, and water rights and easements necessary therefor, and for retaining and storing any such waters, and erecting dams, reservoirs, aqueducts, and pipe lines to convey the same throughout such district. There may be included as part of the system the installation of fire hydrants at suitable places throughout the

The commissioners shall determine a general comprehensive 1 plan for distributing such water throughout such portion of the 2 district as may then reasonably be served by means of subsidiary 3 4 aqueducts and pipe lines, and a long-term plan for financing the planned projects and the method of distributing the cost and expense 5 thereof, including the creation of local improvement districts or 6 7 utility local improvement districts, and shall determine whether the 8 whole or part of the cost and expenses shall be paid from revenue or 9 general obligation bonds.
- 10 (2) For a general comprehensive plan for a sewer system, the commissioners shall investigate all portions and sections of the 11 district and select a general comprehensive plan for a sewer system for 12 13 the district suitable and adequate for present and reasonably 14 foreseeable future needs thereof. The general comprehensive plan shall 15 provide for treatment plants and other methods for the disposal of 16 sewage and industrial and other liquid wastes now produced or which may 17 reasonably be expected to be produced within the district and shall, for such portions of the district as may then reasonably be served, 18 19 provide for the acquisition or construction and installation of 20 laterals, trunk sewers, intercepting sewers, syphons, pumping stations or other sewage collection facilities, septic tanks, septic tank 21 systems or drainfields, and systems for the transmission and treatment 22 of wastewater. The general comprehensive plan shall provide a long-23 24 term plan for financing the planned projects and the method of 25 distributing the cost and expense of the sewer system, including the 26 creation of local improvement districts or utility local improvement districts; and provide whether the whole or some part of the cost and 27 expenses shall be paid from revenue or general obligation bonds. 28
 - (3) For a general comprehensive plan for a drainage system, the commissioners shall investigate all portions and sections of the district and adopt a general comprehensive plan for a drainage system for the district suitable and adequate for present and future needs thereof. The general comprehensive plan shall provide for a system to collect, treat, and dispose of storm water or surface waters, including use of natural systems and the construction or provision of culverts, storm water pipes, ponds, and other systems. The general comprehensive plan shall provide for a long-term plan for financing the planned projects and provide for a method of distributing the cost and expense of the drainage system, including local improvement districts or

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38 39 utility local improvement districts, and provide whether the whole or some part of the cost and expenses shall be paid from revenue or general obligation bonds.

- (4) For a general comprehensive plan for street lighting, the commissioners shall investigate all portions and sections of the district and adopt a general comprehensive plan for street lighting for the district suitable and adequate for present and future needs thereof. The general comprehensive plan shall provide for a system or systems of street lighting, provide for a long-term plan for financing the planned projects, and provide for a method of distributing the cost and expense of the street lighting system, including local improvement districts or utility local improvement districts, and provide whether the whole or some part of the cost and expenses shall be paid from revenue or general obligation bonds.
- 15 (5) The commissioners may employ such engineering and legal service 16 as in their discretion is necessary in carrying out their duties.
 - (6) Any general comprehensive plan or plans shall be adopted by resolution and submitted to an engineer designated by the legislative authority of the county in which fifty-one percent or more of the area of the district is located, and to the director of health of the county in which the district or any portion thereof is located, and must be approved in writing by the engineer and director of health, except that a comprehensive plan relating to street lighting shall not be submitted to or approved by the director of health. The general comprehensive plan shall be approved, conditionally approved, or rejected by the director of health and by the designated engineer within sixty days of their respective receipt of the plan. ((However, this sixty day time limitation may be extended by the director of health or engineer for up to an additional sixty days if sufficient time is not available to review adequately the general comprehensive plans.))

Before becoming effective, the general comprehensive plan shall also be submitted to, and approved by resolution of, the legislative authority of every county within whose boundaries all or a portion of the district lies. The ((general)) governing body may not impose requirements restricting the maximum size of the water supply facilities provided for in the comprehensive plan ((shall be approved, conditionally approved, or rejected by each of the county legislative authorities pursuant to the criteria in RCW 57.02.040 for approving the formation, reorganization, annexation, consolidation, or merger of

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districts. The resolution, ordinance, or motion of the legislative 1 body that rejects the comprehensive plan or a part thereof shall 2 specifically state in what particular the comprehensive plan or part 3 4 thereof rejected fails to meet these criteria. The general comprehensive plan shall not provide for the extension or location of 5 facilities that are inconsistent with the requirements of RCW 6 7 36.70A.110)). Nothing in this chapter shall preclude a county from 8 rejecting a proposed plan because it is in conflict with the criteria 9 in RCW 57.02.040. Each general comprehensive plan shall be deemed 10 approved if the county legislative authority fails to reject or conditionally approve the plan within ninety days of the plan's 11 submission to the county legislative authority or within thirty days of 12 13 a hearing on the plan when the hearing is held within ninety days of submission to the county legislative authority. ((However, a county 14 15 legislative authority may extend this ninety-day time limitation by up 16 to an additional ninety days where a finding is made that ninety days 17 is insufficient to review adequately the general comprehensive plan. In addition,)) The commissioners and the county legislative authority 18 19 may mutually agree to an extension of the deadlines in this section. 20

If the district includes portions or all of one or more cities or towns, the general comprehensive plan shall be submitted also to, and approved by resolution of, the legislative authorities of the cities and towns before becoming effective. The general comprehensive plan shall be deemed approved by the city or town legislative authority if the city or town legislative authority fails to reject or conditionally approve the plan within ninety days of the plan's submission to the city or town or within thirty days of a hearing on the plan when the hearing is held within ninety days of submission to the county legislative authority. ((However, a city or town legislative authority may extend this time limitation by up to an additional ninety days where a finding is made that insufficient time exists to adequately review the general comprehensive plan within these time limitations. In addition, the commissioners and the city or town legislative authority may mutually agree to an extension of the deadlines in this section.))

Before becoming effective, the general comprehensive plan shall be approved by any state agency whose approval may be required by applicable law. Before becoming effective, any amendment to, alteration of, or addition to, a general comprehensive plan shall also

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- l be subject to such approval as if it were a new general comprehensive
- 2 plan. However, only if the amendment, alteration, or addition affects
- 3 a particular city or town, shall the amendment, alteration, or addition
- 4 be subject to approval by such particular city or town governing body.
- 5 **Sec. 22.** RCW 58.17.060 and 1990 1st ex.s. c 17 s 51 are each 6 amended to read as follows:

If it finds that the proposed subdivision and dedication does not make such appropriate provisions ((and)) or that the public use and interest will not be served, then the legislative body ((shall approve)) may disapprove the proposed subdivision and dedication. Dedication of land to any public body((, provision of public improvements to serve the subdivision, and/ or impact fees imposed under RCW 82.02.050 through 82.02.090)) may be required as a condition of subdivision approval. Dedications shall be clearly shown on the final plat. ((No dedication, provision of public improvements, or impact fees imposed under RCW 82.02.050 through 82.02.090 shall be allowed that constitutes an unconstitutional taking of private property.)) The legislative body shall not as a condition to the approval of any subdivision require a release from damages to be procured from other property owners.

 - (4) A commute trip reduction plan shall be consistent with the guidelines established under RCW 70.94.537 and shall include but is not limited to (a) goals for reductions in the proportion of singleoccupant vehicle commute trips and the commute trip vehicle miles traveled per employee; (b) designation of commute trip reduction zones; (c) requirements for major public and private sector employers to implement commute trip reduction programs; (d) a commute trip reduction program for employees of the county, city, or town; (e) a review of local parking policies and ordinances as they relate to employers and major worksites and any revisions necessary to comply with commute trip reduction goals and guidelines; (f) an appeals process by which major employers, who as a result of special characteristics of their business or its locations would be unable to meet the requirements of a commute trip reduction plan, may obtain waiver or modification of those requirements; and (g) means for determining base year values of the proportion of single-occupant vehicle commute trips and the commute trip vehicle miles traveled per employee and progress toward meeting

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commute trip reduction plan goals on an annual basis. Goals which are 1 established shall take into account existing transportation demand 2 management efforts which are made by major employers. 3 4 jurisdiction shall ensure that employers shall receive full credit for 5 the results of transportation demand management efforts and commute trip reduction programs which have been implemented by major employers 6 7 prior to the base year. The goals for miles traveled per employee for 8 all major employers shall not be less than a fifteen percent reduction 9 from the base year value of the commute trip reduction zone in which 10 their worksite is located by January 1, 1995, twenty-five percent reduction from the base year values by January 1, 1997, and thirty-five 11 12 percent reduction from the base year values by January 1, 1999.

(5) A county, city, or town may, as part of its commute trip reduction plan, require commute trip reduction programs for employers with ten or more full time employees at major worksites in federally designated nonattainment areas for carbon monoxide and ozone. The county, city or town shall develop the programs in cooperation with affected employers and provide technical assistance to the employers in implementing such programs.

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- 20 (6) The commute trip reduction plans adopted by counties, cities, and towns under this chapter shall be consistent with and may be 21 22 incorporated in applicable state or regional transportation plans and local comprehensive plans and shall be coordinated, and consistent 23 24 with, the commute trip reduction plans of counties, cities, or towns 25 with which the county, city, or town has, in part, common borders or 26 related regional issues. - When making grants or loans for water pollution control facilities, the department shall consider the following:
- 12 (1) The protection of water quality and public health;
- 13 (2) The cost to residential ratepayers if they had to finance water 14 pollution control facilities without state assistance;

- Class I: Minimal or specific forest practices that have no direct potential for damaging a public resource that may be conducted without submitting an application or a notification;

 include plans for concentrated employment centers, mixed-use development, and housing densities that support high capacity transportation systems.
- 34 (4) Agencies providing high capacity transportation service and 35 other transit agencies shall develop a cooperative process for the 36 planning, development, operations, and funding of feeder transportation 37 systems. Feeder systems may include existing and future intercity

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passenger systems and alternative technology people mover systems which may be developed by the private or public sector.

 - (1) At the time of formation, the area to be included within the boundary of the authority shall be that area set forth in the system plan adopted by the joint regional policy committee. submitting the system and financing plan to the voters, the authority may make adjustments to the boundaries as deemed appropriate but must assure that, to the extent possible, the boundaries: (a) Include the largest-population urban growth area designated by each county ((under chapter 36.70A RCW)); and (b) follow election precinct boundaries. If a portion of any city is determined to be within the service area, the entire city must be included within the boundaries of the authority.

9 **Sec. 34.** RCW 82.02.020 and 1996 c 230 s 1612 are each amended to 10 read as follows:

Except only as expressly provided in RCW 67.28.180 and 67.28.190 11 12 and the provisions of chapter 82.14 RCW, the state preempts the field 13 of imposing taxes upon retail sales of tangible personal property, the 14 use of tangible personal property, parimutuel wagering authorized 15 pursuant to RCW 67.16.060, conveyances, and cigarettes, and no county, 16 town, or other municipal subdivision shall have the right to impose taxes of that nature. ((Except as provided in RCW 82.02.050 through 17 18 82.02.090,)) No county, city, town, or other municipal corporation 19 shall impose any tax, fee, or charge, either direct or indirect, on the construction or reconstruction of residential buildings, commercial 20 buildings, industrial buildings, or on any other building or building 21 space or appurtenance thereto, or on the development, subdivision, 22 23 classification, or reclassification of land. However, this section 24 does not preclude dedications of land or easements under RCW 58.17.110 25 within the proposed development or plat which the county, city, town, or other municipal corporation can demonstrate are reasonably necessary 26 27 as a direct result of the proposed development or plat to which the dedication of land or easement is to apply. 28

29 This section does not prohibit voluntary agreements with counties, 30 cities, towns, or other municipal corporations that allow a payment in lieu of a dedication of land or to mitigate a direct impact that has 31 32 been identified as a consequence of a proposed development, 33 subdivision, or plat. A local government shall not use such voluntary 34 agreements for local off-site transportation improvements within the geographic boundaries of the area or areas covered by an adopted 35 36 transportation program authorized by chapter 39.92 RCW. Any such 37 voluntary agreement is subject to the following provisions:

- 1 (1) The payment shall be held in a reserve account and may only be 2 expended to fund a capital improvement agreed upon by the parties to 3 mitigate the identified, direct impact;
- 4 (2) The payment shall be expended in all cases within five years of collection; and

 - Nothing in this section prohibits cities, towns, counties, or other municipal corporations from collecting reasonable fees from an applicant for a permit or other governmental approval to cover the cost to the city, town, county, or other municipal corporation of processing applications, inspecting and reviewing plans, or preparing detailed statements required by chapter 43.21C RCW.
- 22 This section does not limit the existing authority of any county, 23 city, town, or other municipal corporation to impose special 24 assessments on property specifically benefitted thereby in the manner 25 prescribed by law.
- 26 Nothing in this section prohibits counties, cities, or towns from 27 imposing or permits counties, cities, or towns to impose water, sewer, natural gas, drainage utility, and drainage system charges: PROVIDED, 28 29 That no such charge shall exceed the proportionate share of such 30 utility or system's capital costs which the county, city, or town can demonstrate are attributable to the property being charged: PROVIDED 31 FURTHER, That these provisions shall not be interpreted to expand or 32 33 contract any existing authority of counties, cities, or towns to impose 34 such charges.
- Nothing in this section prohibits a transportation benefit district from imposing fees or charges authorized in RCW 36.73.120 nor prohibits the legislative authority of a county, city, or town from approving the imposition of such fees within a transportation benefit district.

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Nothing in this section prohibits counties, cities, or towns from 1 2 imposing transportation impact fees authorized pursuant to chapter 3 39.92 RCW.

4 ((Nothing in this section prohibits counties, cities, or towns from requiring property owners to provide relocation assistance to tenants under RCW 59.18.440 and 59.18.450.))

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This section does not apply to special purpose districts formed and acting pursuant to Titles 54, 57, or 87 RCW, nor is the authority conferred by these titles affected.

- (1) The legislative authority of any county or city shall identify 12 13 in the adopted budget the capital projects funded in whole or in part 14 from the proceeds of the tax authorized in this section, and shall indicate that such tax is intended to be in addition to other funds 15 that may be reasonably available for such capital projects. 16
 - (2) The legislative authority of any county or any city may impose an excise tax on each sale of real property in the unincorporated areas of the county for the county tax and in the corporate limits of the city for the city tax at a rate not exceeding one-quarter of one percent of the selling price. ((The revenues from this tax shall be used by any city or county with a population of five thousand or less and any city or county that does not plan under RCW 36.70A.040 for any capital purpose identified in a capital improvements plan and local capital improvements, including those listed in RCW 35.43.040.

After April 30, 1992, revenues generated from the tax imposed under this subsection in counties over five thousand population and cities over five thousand population that are required or choose to plan under RCW 36.70A.040 shall be used solely for financing capital projects specified in a capital facilities plan element of a comprehensive plan and housing relocation assistance under RCW 59.18.440 and 59.18.450. (3) In lieu of imposing the tax authorized in RCW 82.14.030(2), the legislative authority of any county or any city may impose an additional excise tax on each sale of real property in the 4 unincorporated areas of the county for the county tax and in the corporate limits of the city for the city tax at a rate not exceeding one-half of one percent of the selling price.

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- (4) Taxes imposed under this section shall be collected from persons who are taxable by the state under chapter 82.45 RCW upon the occurrence of any taxable event within the unincorporated areas of the county or within the corporate limits of the city, as the case may be.

9 A comprehensive flood control management plan shall be subject to 10 the minimum requirements for participation in the national flood insurance program, requirements exceeding the minimum national flood 11 12 insurance program that have been adopted by the department of ecology 13 for a specific flood plain pursuant to RCW 86.16.031, and rules adopted by the department of ecology pursuant to RCW 86.26.050 relating to 14 15 flood plain management activities. ((When a county plans under chapter 16 36.70A RCW, it may incorporate the portion of its comprehensive flood 17 control management plan relating to land use restrictions in its comprehensive plan and development regulations adopted pursuant to 18 19 chapter 36.70A RCW.))

- NEW SECTION. **sec. 42.** All administrative boards and agencies created under the authority of chapter 36.70A RCW are dissolved.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 43.** All administrative rules adopted under the authority of chapter 36.70A RCW are invalid, null and void, and of no effect.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 44. No state officer or agency may attempt to recover any moneys distributed pursuant to the authority of chapter 36.70A RCW.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 45. This act shall be known and cited as "The Local Control of Local Government Act of 1997."
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 46. If any provision of this act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

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- 1 NEW SECTION. Sec. 47. This act is necessary for the immediate
- 2 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
- 3 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect

4 immediately.
