- 1 AN ACT Relating to alternate teacher certification; amending RCW
- 2 28A.150.410; adding a new section to chapter 28A.410 RCW; and creating
- 3 a new section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** It is the intent of the legislature to
- 6 attract career professionals from diverse backgrounds into the teaching
- 7 profession and prevent teacher shortages by making alternate teacher
- 8 certification available to persons with baccalaureate degrees and
- 9 relevant work experience or sufficient knowledge of the subject area to
- 10 be taught. The alternate certificate established under section 2 of
- 11 this act allows eligible persons to enter the classroom under the
- 12 guidance and supervision of a school district and to qualify for
- 13 initial teacher certification upon satisfactory completion of two years
- 14 of full-time teaching.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.410
- 16 RCW to read as follows:

1 (1) An individual may obtain an alternate teaching certificate that 2 allows the individual to teach in the state of Washington. Each 3 candidate for an alternate teacher's certificate shall:

- (a) Possess a baccalaureate degree in the arts, sciences, or humanities from a college or university accredited by the Northwest association of schools and colleges or an equivalent accrediting organization;
- 8 (b) Have at least five years' work experience relevant to the 9 subject area in which he or she is seeking an endorsement or 10 endorsements, or sufficient knowledge of the subject area to be taught. The superintendent of the school district shall determine, on a case-11 by-case basis, what constitutes sufficient knowledge. 12 This work 13 experience or knowledge of the subject area shall meet the requirements 14 for an endorsement or endorsements in the relevant subject area or 15 areas;
- 16 (c) Meet the age and character requirements established by the 17 state board of education for all certificated school staff, including 18 compliance with the background check through the Washington state 19 patrol criminal investigation system and the federal bureau of 20 investigation as required under RCW 28A.410.010; and
- 21 (d) Possess a contract for employment in a school district of the 22 state.
 - (2) Before beginning teaching under the alternate teacher certificate, the candidate shall develop with his or her employing school district a written plan for training, supervision, guidance, and support to be provided to the candidate by the district for the duration of the alternate certificate.
- (3) The alternate teacher certificate allows the holder full 28 29 authority to serve as a part-time or full-time teacher. 30 certificate shall be valid for not more than two years of full-time 31 teaching or its equivalent. A person desiring to teach beyond the expiration date of his or her alternate certificate shall apply for 32 initial certification, or its equivalent, with the state board of 33 34 education. Such certification shall be conditioned upon the satisfaction of all requirements in this section, two years of 35 successful teaching as determined by the evaluation criteria used in 36 37 the school district for teachers, and a recommendation by the principal supervising the candidate. State certification shall not require 38 39 additional course work or experience.

- 1 (4) Alternate certification developed under this section shall be 2 available beginning in the 1997-98 school year.
- 3 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28A.150.410 and 1990 c 33 s 118 are each amended to 4 read as follows:
- 5 (1) The legislature shall establish for each school year in the 6 appropriations act a state-wide salary allocation schedule, for 7 allocation purposes only, to be used to distribute funds for basic 8 education certificated instructional staff salaries under RCW 9 28A.150.260.
- (2) The superintendent of public instruction shall calculate salary 10 allocations for state funded basic education certificated instructional 11 staff by determining the district average salary for basic education 12 13 instructional staff using the salary allocation schedule established 14 pursuant to this section. However, no district shall receive an 15 allocation based upon an average basic education certificated instructional staff salary which is less than the average of the 16 district's 1986-87 actual basic education certificated instructional 17 18 staff salaries, as reported to the superintendent of public instruction 19 prior to June 1, 1987, and the legislature may grant minimum salary increases on that base: PROVIDED, That the superintendent of public 20 instruction may adjust this allocation based upon the education and 21 experience of the district's certificated instructional staff and in 22 23 accordance with subsection (4) of this section.
- (3) Beginning January 1, 1992, no more than ninety college quarterbour credits received by any employee after the baccalaureate degree may be used to determine compensation allocations under the state salary allocation schedule and LEAP documents referenced in the biennial appropriations act, or any replacement schedules and documents, unless:
 - (a) The employee has a masters degree; or

- 31 (b) The credits were used in generating state salary allocations 32 before January 1, 1992.
- 33 (4) In determining state allocations and salaries for individuals 34 participating in the alternate certification program under section 2 of 35 this act, the school district shall consider the individual's education 36 and employment experience, including employment experience in

- 1 <u>noneducation employment that is relevant to the individual's</u>
- 2 performance as a teacher.
