## HOUSE BILL 2111

State of Washington 55th Legislature 1997 Regular Session

By Representatives Quall, Talcott, Wolfe, Blalock and Costa Read first time 02/20/97. Referred to Committee on Education.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to teacher preparation; creating new sections; and 2 declaring an emergency.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that some certificated 5 and classified instructional staff may not have the necessary knowledge 6 and skills to provide an appropriate education for both special education and regular education students under the federal requirement of least-restrictive environment. Teachers may need additional 8 9 preservice instruction in creating and adjusting curriculum, or they 10 may need training or internships with special education professionals 11 in designing strategies to include special education students in the regular classroom. Classified staff may need additional training when 12 assigned to assist a special education student who is included in 13 14 regular classroom instruction. The legislature intends to direct a 15 study to assess the adequacy of teacher preparation programs and other training programs in addressing special education and regular education 16 17 needs in a least-restrictive environment.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) The joint legislative audit and review committee, in conjunction with the office of the superintendent of public instruction, shall conduct a study of teacher preparation programs and classified staff training programs relating to special education needs.

- 6 (2) The joint legislative audit and review committee is directed 7 to:
- 8 (a) Survey in-state and out-of-state institutions of postsecondary 9 education regarding programs, curriculum, and courses to prepare 10 teachers to instruct special education students in the least-11 restrictive environment;
- 12 (b) Survey the range of practices in school districts, educational 13 service districts, and other educational programs around the state to 14 instruct children with special education needs in a least-restrictive 15 environment; and
- (c) Examine, to the extent it is possible, the adequacy of teacher preparation programs and classified staff training programs in providing the necessary knowledge and skills to deliver appropriate instruction and services to special education students and regular education students from kindergarten through twelfth grade in a least-restrictive environment.
- 22 (3) As part of the study effort, the office of the superintendent 23 of public instruction shall survey the attitudes of parents, educators, 24 and administrators regarding the reported quality, effectiveness, and 25 efficiency of special education instruction and services. The results 26 of the survey shall be integrated into a report prepared by the joint 27 legislative audit and review committee.
- 28 (4) In conducting the study described in this section, the joint 29 legislative audit and review committee may convene a technical advisory 20 committee composed of legislators and representatives from higher 21 education, K-12 education, and teacher, advocate, and parent 22 organizations. Members of the technical advisory committee shall be 23 reimbursed for travel expenses as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
- 35 (5) The joint legislative audit and review committee shall provide 36 an interim project briefing to the appropriate legislative committees 37 by December 31, 1997. The joint legislative audit and review committee 38 shall report its findings and recommendations to the appropriate 39 legislative committees by September 25, 1998.

- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect immediately.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. If specific funding for the purposes of this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not provided by June 30, 1997, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and void.
