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## HOUSE BILL 2217

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State of Washington 55th Legislature 1997 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to fish passage barrier removal; adding new
- 2 sections to chapter 75.50 RCW; and creating new sections.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds:
- 5 (1) The increasing population and continued development throughout
- 6 the state, and the transportation system needed to serve this growth,
- 7 have exacerbated problems associated with culverts, creating barriers
- 8 to fish passage. These barriers obstruct habitat and have resulted in
- 9 reduced production and survival of anadromous and resident fish at a

time when salmonid stocks continue to decline. There is a growing need

- 11 to remove fish passage barriers related to transportation facilities.
- 12 Further, there is a definite link between fish passage problems and
- 13 storm water and flooding problems;

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- 14 (2) Current state laws do not appropriately direct resources for
- 15 the correction of fish passage obstructions related to transportation
- 16 facilities. The department of fish and wildlife has historically
- 17 worked with a number of cities, counties, and private organizations in
- 18 successful but limited correction of specific fish passage problems.
- 19 However, current fish passage management efforts related to

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- 1 transportation projects lack necessary coordination on a watershed,
  2 regional, and state-wide basis; have inadequate funding; and fail to
  3 maximize use of available resources;
- 4 (3) The department of transportation has expended funds on fish 5 passage research and has a barrier removal program in place that is managed jointly with the department of fish and wildlife. To develop 6 7 a coordinated program throughout the state, there is a need to 8 supplement the department of transportation's current fish passage 9 barrier removal program by expanding it to include cities and counties, 10 and increasing funding and coordination to cover that expanded program. Past appropriations made by the legislature for the removal of fish 11 passage barriers were intended to address applicable federal and state 12 13 mandates on habitat protection.

## 14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** It is the intent of the legislature that:

- (1) This act encourage new opportunities for cities, counties, Indian tribes, and the state to participate in the removal of transportation-related fish passage barriers. It is recognized that Indian tribes, as comanagers of fisheries throughout much of Washington state, can make significant contributions to the program based on inventories they have conducted;
- (2) Potential threatened and endangered species listings, and loss of commercial and recreational opportunities, justify the need for more effective fish passage barrier removal. The costs estimated to remove all identified barriers far exceed available revenue;
- 25 (3) This act establish a program to develop a state-wide 26 coordination mechanism for funding the removal of transportation-27 related fish passage barriers in the most ecologically beneficial and 28 cost-effective manner;
- (4) These programs be fully coordinated with storm water programs to maximize the effectiveness of both programs. Transportation facilities include, but are not limited to, state and local roads and highways, railroads, and private roads and driveways.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. The department of transportation and the department of fish and wildlife shall develop a coordinated funding, grant, and implementation program to address fish passage problems associated with transportation facilities.

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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The fish passage barrier removal committee 1 2 consisting of representatives from the department of transportation, acting as chair, the department of fish and wildlife, the department of 3 4 ecology, the department of natural resources, cities, counties, Indian 5 tribes, an environmental organization, and a business organization, shall oversee the program. The committee may add representatives of 6 other agencies, organizations, or interest groups to serve as members 7 8 or in an advisory capacity.

9 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. The fish passage barrier removal program must address, but is not limited to, the following objectives: 10 Greater state-wide coordination in the construction of fish passage 11 12 (2) encouraging multijurisdictional projects; facilities; (3) developing priorities and approaches for implementing activities on a 13 14 watershed basis; (4) developing criteria for a grant program; (5) 15 identifying and prioritizing fish passage retrofit projects for grant 16 funding; (6) evaluating methods to determine cost-saving and ecological benefits of proposed projects; (7) identifying ways to facilitate the 17 18 sharing of technical resources; (8) developing methods for monitoring 19 and evaluating activities carried out under the program; (9) making recommendations for ongoing funding of the program after evaluating 20 sources including, but not limited to, the federal 21 transportation program, the motor vehicle fund, the transportation 22 23 fund, natural resource-based funding sources, local and private 24 contributions, user fees, and other grant sources; (10) inventorying 25 and mapping; (11) research; and (12) tying the program to permit streamlining for implementation. 26

committee activities and administer grants to facilitate construction of the highest priority state and local fish passage projects based on ecological and cost-saving benefits.

The department of transportation shall coordinate fish passage

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. Funds may be provided to cities, towns, counties, port districts, municipal corporations, special purpose districts, conservation districts, Indian tribes, the department of natural resources, the department of fish and wildlife, and the department of transportation. Funding appropriation may include inventory and survey work. In developing project criteria, the fish passage barrier removal committee shall identify the most urgent

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- transportation-related fish passage problems; develop methods for 1 applying priorities across watersheds; and give added weight to 2 projects in which contributions, investments in surveys, and other 3 4 involvement are multijurisdictional. Criteria will also include economics and cost-effectiveness; impact of the fish passage barrier on 5 endangered species; and potential impact to the state from impending 6 endangered species listings. Consideration will be given for projects 7 8 within a local watershed plan.
- 9 NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. By January 1, 1999, the department of transportation and the department of fish and wildlife shall jointly 10 submit to the appropriate committees of the senate and house of 11 representatives a report on implementation of the fish passage barrier 12 removal funding and implementation program. The report will include 13 14 proposed criteria for project selection, procedures for managing the 15 and recommendations for achieving program objectives 16 identified in section 5 of this act.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** Sections 3 through 6 of this act are each added to chapter 75.50 RCW.

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
