- 1 AN ACT Relating to parents' rights and responsibilities; amending
- 2 RCW 28A.320.230, 28A.210.300, and 28A.230.070; and adding a new chapter
- 3 to Title 28A RCW.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** DEFINITION. Unless specifically provided by
- 6 law, for purposes of this chapter, "parent" means a parent or legal
- 7 guardian having legal custody of a child enrolled in public school.
- 8 For purposes of this chapter, "parent" does not mean parents of
- 9 children in private school or of children receiving home-based
- 10 instruction. If a person has a child enrolled in a public school and
- 11 has another child enrolled in a private school or receiving home-based
- 12 instruction, this chapter applies to the parent with regard to the
- 13 parent's rights and responsibilities concerning the child enrolled in
- 14 the public school.
- 15 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. PARENTS' RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES. In
- 16 accordance with law existing on the effective date of this section,
- 17 parents shall:

- 1 (1) Comply with immunization requirements for their child, unless 2 exempted, in accordance with RCW 28A.210.090;
- 3 (2) Provide information regarding their child's prior educational 4 history if the child transfers from another school, in accordance with 5 RCW 28A.225.330;
- 6 (3) Be responsible for property damaged by their child, in 7 accordance with RCW 28A.635.060;
- 8 (4) Comply with compulsory attendance requirements, in accordance 9 with RCW 28A.225.010;
- 10 (5) Be notified when their child has an unexcused absence, in 11 accordance with RCW 28A.225.020;
- 12 (6) Determine whether their child participates in AIDS instruction, 13 in accordance with RCW 28A.230.070 and this chapter;
- 14 (7) Be notified of their parent involvement opportunities, in accordance with RCW 28A.225.300;
- 16 (8) Receive an annual report from their school district, in accordance with RCW 28A.320.205;
- 18 (9) Be consulted in the development of the district's AIDS 19 curriculum, in accordance with RCW 28A.230.070;
- 20 (10) Receive periodic reports on the academic progress of their 21 child, in accordance with RCW 28A.150.240;
- 22 (11) Receive the results of their child's performance on state-wide 23 assessments, in accordance with RCW 28A.230.190, 28A.230.195, 24 28A.230.230, 28A.230.240, 28A.230.250, and 28A.630.886;
- 25 (12) Be notified if their child has a hearing or visual loss, in 26 accordance with RCW 28A.210.030;
- 27 (13) Be notified of their child's choice options, in accordance 28 with RCW 28A.225.300;
- 29 (14) Be notified about the running start program, in accordance 30 with RCW 28A.600.320;
- 31 (15) Be notified of their child's conduct, emergent discipline 32 problems, and rights, in accordance with RCW 28A.600.010; and
- 33 (16) Be notified if a court order or subpoena has been issued for 34 access to the records of their child, in accordance with RCW 35 28A.600.475.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. PARENTS' RIGHTS. In accordance with law existing on the effective date of this section, parents may:

- 1 (1) Make a complaint to the school board and have the complaint 2 heard at a public hearing regarding instructional and library materials 3 the parent deems objectionable, in accordance with RCW 28A.150.230;
- 4 (2) Exclude their child from sex education classes and be involved 5 in evaluation and revision of sex education programs, in accordance 6 with rules adopted by the state board of education;
- 7 (3) Exclude their child from scoliosis screening, in accordance 8 with RCW 28A.210.190 through 28A.210.240; and
- 9 (4) Be involved in instructional materials committees in accordance 10 with RCW 28A.320.230 and this chapter.
- Sec. 4. ACCESS TO ACADEMIC PROGRAMS AND TEACHING 11 NEW SECTION. 12 MATERIALS. (1) A parent shall have access to his or her child's Every school district board of directors shall, after 13 classroom. 14 following established procedures, adopt a policy assuring parents 15 access to their child's classrooms and school-sponsored activities for purposes of observing class procedure, teaching material, and class 16 conduct. Observation under this section may not disrupt the classroom 17 18 procedure or learning activity.
- 19 (2) School district employees may not withhold information 20 pertaining to the school activities of a child from the child's 21 parents.
- Sec. 5. STUDENT EXCLUSION FROM CLASS OR OTHER 22 NEW SECTION. 23 ACTIVITIES. In addition to other provisions in law, parents may excuse 24 their child temporarily from a class or other school activity that 25 conflicts with a parent's religious or moral beliefs if the parent presents or delivers to the teacher of the parent's child a written 26 27 statement authorizing the exemption of the child from the class or 28 other activity. A parent may not excuse the child from the class or 29 other activity specifically to avoid a test on academic subject matter. The parent is responsible for identifying alternative educational 30 31 opportunities at the school that the student may participate in during 32 the time the student is excused from his or her regular class or 33 scheduled activity.
- This section does not exempt a child from satisfying grade level or graduation curriculum requirements in a manner acceptable to the school district.

- 1 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28A.320.230 and 1989 c 371 s 1 are each amended to 2 read as follows:
- Every board of directors, unless otherwise specifically provided by 4 law, shall:
- 5 (1) Prepare, negotiate, set forth in writing and adopt, policy 6 relative to the selection or deletion of instructional materials. Such 7 policy shall:
- 8 (a) State the school district's goals and principles relative to 9 instructional materials;
- 10 (b) Delegate responsibility for the preparation and recommendation 11 of teachers' reading lists and specify the procedures to be followed in 12 the selection of all instructional materials including text books;
- 13 (c) Establish an instructional materials committee to be appointed, with the approval of the school board, by the school district's chief 14 administrative officer. 15 This committee shall consist of parents, representative members of the district's professional staff, including 16 17 representation from the district's curriculum development committees, and, in the case of districts which operate elementary school(s) only, 18 19 the educational service district superintendent, one of whose 20 responsibilities shall be to assure the correlation of those elementary district adoptions with those of the high school district(s) which 21 serve their children. ((The committee may include parents at the 22 23 school board's discretion: PROVIDED, That parent members shall make up 24 less than one half of the total membership of the committee)) At least one-third of the committee must be comprised of parents who are not 25 26 school district employees and who have children enrolled in the district. In addition to these parents, other parents who live in the 27 district may also serve on the committee at the school board's 28 discretion; 29
- 30 (d) Provide for reasonable notice to parents of the opportunity to 31 serve on the committee and for terms of office for members of the 32 instructional materials committee;
- (e) Provide a system for receiving, considering and acting upon written complaints regarding instructional materials used by the school district;
- 36 (f) Provide free text books, supplies and other instructional 37 materials to be loaned to the pupils of the school, when, in its 38 judgment, the best interests of the district will be subserved thereby

- 1 and prescribe rules and regulations to preserve such books, supplies 2 and other instructional materials from unnecessary damage.
- Recommendation of instructional materials shall be by the district's instructional materials committee in accordance with district policy. Approval or disapproval shall be by the local school district's board of directors.
- Districts may pay the necessary travel and subsistence expenses for 8 expert counsel from outside the district. In addition, the committee's 9 expenses incidental to visits to observe other districts' selection 10 procedures may be reimbursed by the school district.
- Districts may, within limitations stated in board policy, use ((and experiment with)) instructional materials for a period of time before general adoption is formalized.
- Within the limitations of board policy, a school district's chief administrator may purchase instructional materials to meet ((deviant needs or rapidly changing circumstances)) needs as defined by the school board.
- 18 (2) Establish a depreciation scale for determining the value of 19 texts which students wish to purchase.
- 20 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28A.210.300 and 1975 c 43 s 20 are each amended to 21 read as follows:
- 22 (1) The board of directors of any school district of the second 23 class may employ a regularly licensed physician or a licensed public 24 health nurse for the purpose of protecting the health of the children 25 in said district.
- 26 (2) Parents shall annually receive an itemization of the health-27 related services made available to students at each school within the 28 district.
- 29 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28A.230.070 and 1994 c 245 s 7 are each amended to 30 read as follows:
- 31 (1) ((The life-threatening dangers of)) Acquired immunodeficiency
 32 syndrome (AIDS) ((and its prevention shall be taught in the public
 33 schools of this state. AIDS)) prevention education shall be limited to
 34 the discussion of the life-threatening dangers of the disease, its
 35 spread, and prevention. ((Students shall receive such education at
 36 least once each school year beginning no later than the fifth grade.))

(2) Each district board of directors ((shall)) may adopt an AIDS 1 prevention education program ((which is)) as an independent unit within 2 a curriculum offering. The program may not be offered to students 3 4 before the fifth grade. The program shall be developed in consultation with teachers, administrators, parents, and other community members 5 including, but not limited to, persons from medical, public health, and 6 7 mental health organizations and agencies ((so long as the curricula and 8 materials developed for use in the AIDS education program either (a) 9 are the model curricula and resources under subsection (3) of this 10 section, or (b) are developed by the school district)) and approved for medical accuracy by ((the office on AIDS established in RCW 70.24.250. 11 If a district elects to use curricula developed)) a local health 12 advisory committee appointed by the school district((7)). The district 13 14 shall submit to the office on AIDS a copy of its curricula and an 15 affidavit of medical accuracy stating that the material in the 16 district-developed curricula has been ((compared to the model curricula for medical accuracy)) reviewed by the local health advisory committee 17 and that in the opinion of the ((district)) committee the district-18 19 developed materials are medically accurate. ((Upon submission of the 20 affidavit and curricula, the district may use these materials until the approval procedure to be conducted by the office of AIDS has been 21 22 completed.

(3) Model curricula and other resources available from the superintendent of public instruction may be reviewed by the school district board of directors, in addition to materials designed locally, in developing the district's AIDS education program. The model curricula shall be reviewed for medical accuracy by the office on AIDS established in RCW 70.24.250 within the department of social and health services.

(4)) (3) Each school district shall, at least one month before teaching AIDS prevention education in any classroom, conduct at least one presentation during weekend and evening hours for the parents and guardians of students concerning the curricula and materials that will be used for such education. The parents and guardians shall be notified by the school district of the presentation and that the curricula and materials are available for inspection. Absent the written permission of a student's parent or legal guardian, no student may be required to participate in AIDS prevention education ((if the

student's parent or guardian, having attended one of the district 1 presentations, objects in writing to the participation)).

- 3 (((5))) (4) The office of the superintendent of public instruction 4 with the assistance of the office on AIDS shall update AIDS education curriculum material as newly discovered medical facts make it 5 6 necessary.
- 7 $((\frac{6}{}))$) (5) The curriculum for AIDS prevention education shall 8 stress the life-threatening dangers of contracting AIDS and be designed 9 to teach students which behaviors place a person dangerously at risk of 10 infection with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and methods to avoid such risk including, at least: 11
- (a) That abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain means 12 for the prevention of the spread or contraction of the AIDS virus 13 through sexual contact. It shall also teach that condoms and other 14 15 artificial means of birth control are not a certain means of preventing the spread of the AIDS virus and reliance on condoms puts a person at 16 risk for exposure to the disease; 17
- (b) The dangers of drug abuse, especially that involving the use of 18 19 hypodermic needles; and
- 20 (((b))) <u>(c)</u> The dangers of sexual intercourse((, with or without 21 condoms.
- 22 (7) The program of AIDS prevention education shall stress the lifethreatening dangers of contracting AIDS and shall stress that 23 24 abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain means for the 25 prevention of the spread or contraction of the AIDS virus through 26 sexual contact. It shall also teach that condoms and other artificial means of birth control are not a certain means of preventing the spread 27 28 of the AIDS virus and reliance on condoms puts a person at risk for 29 exposure to the disease)) outside of monogamous marriage.
- 30 NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. COMPLAINTS. The board of directors of each school district shall have a grievance procedure under which the school 31 district shall address and attempt to resolve each written complaint 32 33 that the district receives concerning violation of a right guaranteed 34 by this chapter. The grievance procedure shall identify correctional actions to be taken for violations of this chapter. 35

- 2 chapter are not intended to reflect the exclusive rights and
- 3 obligations of parents of students in public schools.
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 11.** CAPTIONS NOT LAW. Captions used in this
- 5 chapter are not any part of the law.
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 12.** Sections 1 through 5 and 9 through 11 of
- 7 this act constitute a new chapter in Title 28A RCW.
