- 1 AN ACT Relating to the assessment of student learning; amending RCW
- 2 28A.630.885, 28A.195.010, 28A.200.010, 28B.80.350, 28B.20.130, and
- 3 28B.30.150; adding a new section to chapter 28A.630 RCW; adding a new
- 4 section to chapter 28B.35 RCW; and adding a new section to chapter
- 5 28B.40 RCW.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 7 **Sec. 1.** RCW 28A.630.885 and 1997 c 268 s 1 are each amended to 8 read as follows:
- 9 (1) The Washington commission on student learning is hereby
- 10 established. The primary purposes of the commission are to identify
- 11 the knowledge and skills all public school students need to know and be
- 12 able to do based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210, to
- 13 develop student assessment and school accountability systems, to review
- 14 current school district data reporting requirements and make
- 15 recommendations on what data is necessary for the purposes of
- 16 accountability and meeting state information needs, and to take other
- 17 steps necessary to develop a performance-based education system. The
- 18 commission shall include three members of the state board of education,
- 19 three members appointed by the governor before July 1, 1992, and five

members appointed no later than June 1, 1993, by the governor elected 1 in the November 1992 election. The governor shall appoint a chair from 2 3 the commission members, and fill any vacancies in gubernatorial 4 appointments that may occur. The state board of education shall fill 5 any vacancies of state board of education appointments that may occur. In making the appointments, educators, business leaders, and parents 6 7 shall be represented, and nominations from state-wide education, 8 business, and parent organizations shall be requested. Efforts shall 9 be made to ensure that the commission reflects the racial and ethnic 10 diversity of the state's K-12 student population and that the major geographic regions in the state are represented. Appointees shall be 11 12 qualified individuals who are supportive of educational restructuring, 13 who have a positive record of service, and who will devote sufficient time to the responsibilities of the commission to ensure that the 14 objectives of the commission are achieved. 15

- (2) The commission shall establish advisory committees. Membership of the advisory committees shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, professionals from the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the state board of education, and other state and local educational practitioners and student assessment specialists.
- 21 (3) The commission, with the assistance of the advisory committees, 22 shall:
  - (a) Develop essential academic learning requirements based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210. Essential academic learning requirements shall be developed, to the extent possible, for each of the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210. Goals one and two shall be considered primary. Essential academic learning requirements for RCW 28A.150.210(1), goal one, and the mathematics component of RCW 28A.150.210(2), goal two, shall be completed no later than March 1, 1995. Essential academic learning requirements that incorporate the remainder of RCW 28A.150.210 (2), (3), and (4), goals two, three, and four, shall be completed no later than March 1, 1996. To the maximum extent possible, the commission shall integrate goal four and the knowledge and skill areas in the other goals in the development of the essential academic learning requirements;
- (b)(i) The commission shall present to the state board of education and superintendent of public instruction a state-wide academic assessment system for use in the elementary, middle, and high school years designed to determine if each student has mastered the essential

- 1 academic learning requirements identified in (a) of this subsection.
- 2 The academic assessment system shall include a variety of assessment
- 3 methods, including criterion-referenced and performance-based measures.
- 4 Performance standards for determining if a student has successfully
- 5 completed an assessment shall be initially determined by the commission
- 6 in consultation with the advisory committees required in subsection (2)
- 7 of this section.
- 8 (ii) The assessment system shall be designed so that the results
- 9 under the assessment system are used by educators as tools to evaluate
- 10 instructional practices, and to initiate appropriate educational

- 25 legislature takes action to delay or prevent implementation of the
- 26 assessment system and essential academic learning requirements.
- 27 ((Assessments measuring the essential academic learning requirements
- 28 developed for the science component of RCW 28A.150.210(2) at the middle
- 29 school and high school levels shall be available for use by districts
- 30 no later than the 1998-99 school year unless the legislature takes
- 31 action to delay or prevent implementation of the assessment system and
- 32 essential academic learning requirements.))
- 33 The completed assessments and assessments still in development
- 34 shall be transferred to the superintendent of public instruction by
- 35 June 30, 1999, unless the legislature takes action to delay
- 36 implementation of the assessment system and essential academic learning
- 37 requirements. The superintendent shall continue the development of
- 38 assessments on the following schedule: The science assessments at the
- 39 middle and high school levels shall be available for use by districts

no later than the 1999-2000 school year; the history, civics, and 1 geography assessments at the middle and high school levels shall be 2 available for use by districts no later than (({the})) the 2000-01 3 4 school year; the arts assessment for middle and high school levels 5 shall be available for use by districts no later than (({the})) the 2000-01 school year; and the health and fitness assessments for middle 6 7 and high school levels shall be available no later than the 2001-02 8 school year. The elementary science assessment shall be available for 9 use by districts not later than the 2001-02 school year. 10 commission or the superintendent, as applicable, shall upon request, provide opportunities for the education committees of the house of 11 representatives and the senate to review the assessments and proposed 12 13 modifications to the essential academic learning requirements before the modifications are adopted. By December 15, 1998, the commission on 14 15 student learning shall recommend to the appropriate committees of the legislature a revised timeline for implementing these assessments and 16 17 when the school districts should be required to participate. school districts shall be required to participate in the history, 18 19 civics, geography, arts, health, fitness, and ((elementary)) science 20 assessments in the third year after the assessments are available to school districts. 21

To the maximum extent possible, the commission shall integrate knowledge and skill areas in development of the assessments.

(iv) Assessments for goals three and four of RCW 28A.150.210 shall be integrated in the essential academic learning requirements and assessments for goals one and two. Before the 1997-98 school year, the elementary assessment system in reading, writing, communications, and mathematics shall be optional. School districts that desire to participate before the 1997-98 school year shall notify the commission on student learning in a manner determined by the commission. Beginning in the 1997-98 school year, school districts shall be required to participate in the elementary assessment system for reading, writing, communications, and mathematics. Before the 2000-01 school year, participation by school districts in the middle school and high school assessment system for reading, writing, communications, and mathematics((, and science)) shall be optional. School districts that desire to participate before the 1998-99 school year shall notify the commission on student learning in a manner determined by the commission on student learning. Schools that desire to participate after the

- 1 1998-99 school year, shall notify the superintendent of public instruction in a manner determined by the superintendent. Beginning in the 2000-01 school year, all school districts shall be required to participate in the assessment system for reading, writing, communications, and mathematics((, and science)).
- 6 (v) The commission on student learning may modify the essential 7 academic learning requirements and the assessments for reading, 8 writing, communications, mathematics, and science, as needed, before 9 June 30, 1999. The commission shall, upon request, provide committees of 10 opportunities for the education the representatives and the senate to review the assessments and proposed 11 modifications to the essential academic learning requirements before 12 the modifications are adopted. 13
- (vi) The commission shall develop assessments that are directly related to the essential academic learning requirements, and are not biased toward persons with different learning styles, racial or ethnic backgrounds, or on the basis of gender;
- 18 (c) ((After a determination is made)) (i) By September 1, 2002, the 19 state board of education ((that)) shall determine whether the high school assessment system has been implemented and ((that)) if it is 20 sufficiently reliable and valid, then beginning with the graduating 21 22 class of 2006, successful completion of the high school assessments 23 ((shall lead to a certificate of mastery)) in reading, writing, 24 communications-listening, and mathematics shall meet the requirements for a certificate of academic proficiency. Beginning with the 25 graduating class of 2008, successful completion of the high school 26 assessments in reading, writing, communications-listening, mathematics, 27 and science shall meet the requirements for a certificate of academic 28 29 proficiency. The certificate of ((mastery)) academic proficiency shall 30 be obtained by most students at about the age of sixteen, and is evidence that the student has successfully ((mastered)) learned the 31 32 essential academic learning requirements during his or her educational The <u>achievement of a</u> certificate of ((mastery)) <u>academic</u> 33 34 proficiency shall be required for graduation but shall not be the only ((The commission shall make 35 requirement for graduation. recommendations to the state board of education regarding the 36 37 relationship between the certificate of mastery and high school 38 graduation requirements.))

(ii) Upon achieving the certificate of ((mastery, schools shall 1 provide)) academic proficiency, students shall be provided by schools 2 3 with the opportunity to pursue career and educational objectives 4 through educational pathways that emphasize integration of academic and 5 vocational education. Educational pathways may include, but are not limited to, programs such as work-based learning, school-to-work 6 7 transition, tech prep, vocational-technical education, running start, 8 and preparation for technical college, community college, or university 9 education. Any middle school, junior high school, or high school using educational pathways shall ensure that all pathways adopted in the 10 school provide students with access to the courses and instruction 11 necessary to meet admission requirements at baccalaureate institutions. 12 Students shall be allowed to enter the educational pathway of their 13 14 choice. Before accepting a student into an educational pathway, the school shall inform the student's parent of the pathway chosen, the 15 16 opportunities available to the student through the pathway, and the career objectives to which the student will have exposure while 17 18 pursuing the pathway. Parents and students dissatisfied with the 19 opportunities available through the selected educational pathway shall be provided with the opportunity to transfer the student to any other 20 pathway provided in the school. Schools may not develop educational 21 pathways that retain students in high school beyond the date they are 22 23 eligible to graduate, and may not require students who transfer between 24 pathways to complete pathway requirements beyond the date the student is eligible to graduate. 25

(iii) If a student fails to meet the high school assessment standard in any content area required to meet the requirements for the certificate of academic proficiency, then the student may retake the assessment at no cost to the student. A student who meets the assessment standard in any content area may retake the assessment at student expense for the purpose of improving scores. Students retaking the assessment to improve scores may not be charged more than the cost of administering the assessment.

(iv) School districts shall designate on each student's official transcript whether the student met the requirements for the certificate of academic proficiency, the highest scores attained by content area, and the dates on which the assessments were taken.

(v) As a local option, school districts may establish requirements
in addition to achievement of the certificate of academic proficiency

- 26 (h) Review current school district data reporting requirements for
- 27 the purposes of accountability and meeting state information needs.
- 28 The commission on student learning shall report recommendations to the
- 29 joint select committee on education restructuring by September 15,
- 30 1996, on:
- 31 (i) What data is necessary to compare how school districts are
- 32 performing before the essential academic learning requirements and the
- 33 assessment system are implemented with how school districts are
- 34 performing after the essential academic learning requirements and the
- 35 assessment system are implemented; and
- 36 (ii) What data is necessary pertaining to school district reports
- 37 under the accountability systems developed by the commission on student
- 38 learning under this section;

School staff shall determine how the 27 awards will be spent.
  - The commission shall make recommendations regarding a state-wide accountability system for reading in grades kindergarten through four by November 1, 1997. Recommendations for an accountability system in the other subject areas and grade levels shall be made no later than June 30, 1999;
- (j) Report annually by December 1st to the legislature, the governor, the superintendent of public instruction, and the state board of education on the progress, findings, and recommendations of the commission; and
- 37 (k) Make recommendations to the legislature and take other actions 38 necessary or desirable to help students meet the student learning 39 goals.

- (6) The commission shall select an entity to provide staff support and the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall provide administrative oversight and be the fiscal agent for the commission. The commission may direct the office of the superintendent of public instruction to enter into subcontracts, within the commission's resources, with school districts, teachers, higher education faculty, state agencies, business organizations, and other individuals and organizations to assist the commission in its deliberations.
- (7) Members of the commission shall be reimbursed for travel 16 expenses as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060. 17
  - (8)((<del>a)</del> By September 30, 1997, the commission on student learning, the state board of education, and the superintendent of public instruction shall jointly present recommendations to the education committees of the house of representatives and the senate regarding the high school assessments, the certificate of mastery, and high school graduation requirements.
- 24 In preparing recommendations, the commission on student learning 25 shall convene an ad hoc working group to address questions, including:

- (iii) How will the criteria for establishing the standards for 31 passing scores on the assessments be determined? 32
- (iv) What timeline should be used in phasing-in the assessments as 33 34 a graduation requirement?
- (v) What options may be used in demonstrating how the results of 35 the assessments will be displayed in a way that is meaningful to 36 37 students, parents, institutions of higher education, and potential 38 employers?

(vii) Should the assessments and certificate of mastery be used to satisfy college or university entrance criteria for public school students? If yes, how should these methods be phased-in?

(b) The ad hoc working group shall report its recommendations to the commission on student learning, the state board of education, and the superintendent of public instruction by June 15, 1997. The commission shall report the ad hoc working group's recommendations to the education committees of the house of representatives and senate by July 15, 1997. Final recommendations of the commission on student learning, the state board of education, and the superintendent of public instruction shall be presented to the education committees of the house of representatives and the senate by September 30, 1997.

 $\frac{(9)}{(9)}$ ) The Washington commission on student learning shall expire on 17 June 30, 1999.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.630 RCW to read as follows:

- (1) The superintendent of public instruction shall appoint a certificate of academic proficiency advisory committee that shall report to the state board of education. The committee shall consist of not more than fifteen members. Committee membership shall include, but need not be limited to, representatives of public and private education, higher education, a parent organization, parents not representing any organization but having students enrolled in public schools and in private schools, legislators, the business community, and taxpayers not having an affiliation with school or parent organizations. The committee may examine the following issues and such other issues as the state board of education may identify:
- 31 (a) The content areas required for the certificate of academic 32 proficiency;
- 33 (b) Endorsement policies, including adding endorsements in other 34 content areas as the assessments are made available, and adding 35 endorsements as requirements for the certificate of academic 36 proficiency;

- 1 (d) Implementation of the certificate of academic proficiency 2 system.
- 3 (2) The superintendent of public instruction shall convene the 4 committee not later than September 1, 1999. The committee shall report 5 its findings and recommendations to the state board of education, which 6 shall report annually to the education committees of the senate and 7 house of representatives, with its first written report submitted not 8 later than September 1, 2000, and each succeeding report submitted not
- 9 later than September 1st of each year thereafter. Committee members 10 shall serve without additional compensation but are eligible for per
- 11 diem and mileage allowances under RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
- 12 (3) The state board of education and the superintendent of public 13 instruction shall assist the committee in conducting pilot studies to:
- (a) Determine the feasibility of certifying proficiency in content areas beyond reading, writing, communications-listening, mathematics, and science;
- 17 (b) Explore methods, in addition to state-level assessments, to 18 certify proficiency in content areas;
- 19 (c) Gather information about assessment methods already in use or 20 planned for use by school districts;
- 21 (d) Gather information about school district cooperative efforts 22 related to the certificate of academic proficiency; and
- (e) Investigate any issues that the state board of education or the committee identifies relating to the effective implementation of the certificate of academic proficiency.
- 26 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28A.195.010 and 1993 c 336 s 1101 are each amended to 27 read as follows:
- The legislature hereby recognizes that private schools should be subject only to those minimum state controls necessary to insure the health and safety of all the students in the state and to insure a sufficient basic education to meet usual graduation requirements. The state, any agency or official thereof, shall not restrict or dictate any specific educational or other programs for private schools except as hereinafter in this section provided.
- Principals of private schools or superintendents of private school districts shall file each year with the state superintendent of public instruction a statement certifying that the minimum requirements hereinafter set forth are being met, noting any deviations. After

- 1 review of the statement, the state superintendent will notify schools
- 2 or school districts of those deviations which must be corrected. In
- 3 case of major deviations, the school or school district may request and
- 4 the state board of education may grant provisional status for one year

- 7 (1) The minimum school year for instructional purposes shall

- 21 (b) In exceptional cases, people of unusual competence but without

- 25 reporting and explaining such circumstances.
- 26 (4) An approved private school may operate an extension program for
- 27 parents, guardians, or persons having legal custody of a child to teach
- 28 children in their custody. The extension program shall require at a
- 29 minimum that:
- 30 (a) The parent, guardian, or custodian be under the supervision of
- 31 an employee of the approved private school who is certified under
- 32 chapter 28A.410 RCW;
- 33 (b) The planning by the certified person and the parent, guardian,
- 34 or person having legal custody include objectives consistent with this
- 35 subsection and subsections (1), (2), (5), (6), and (7) of this section;
- 36 (c) The certified person spend a minimum average each month of one
- 37 contact hour per week with each student under his or her supervision
- 38 who is enrolled in the approved private school extension program;

1 (d) Each student's progress be evaluated by the certified person; 2 and

- (e) The certified employee shall not supervise more than thirty students enrolled in the approved private school's extension program.
- 5 (5) Appropriate measures shall be taken to safeguard all permanent 6 records against loss or damage.
- 7 (6) The physical facilities of the school or district shall be 8 adequate to meet the program offered by the school or district: 9 PROVIDED, That each school building shall meet reasonable health and 10 fire safety requirements. However, the state board shall not require private school students to meet the student learning goals, to obtain 11 a certificate of ((mastery)) academic proficiency to graduate from high 12 13 school, to master the essential academic learning requirements, or to be assessed pursuant to RCW 28A.630.885. However, private schools may 14 choose, on a voluntary basis, to have their students master these 15 16 essential academic learning requirements, take these assessments, and 17 obtain certificates of ((mastery)) academic proficiency. A residential dwelling of the parent, guardian, or custodian shall be deemed to be an 18 19 adequate physical facility when a parent, guardian, or person having 20 legal custody is instructing his or her child under subsection (4) of this section. 21
- 22 (7) Private school curriculum shall include instruction of the 23 basic skills of occupational education, science, mathematics, language, 24 social studies, history, health, reading, writing, spelling, and the 25 development of appreciation of art and music, all in sufficient units 26 for meeting state board of education graduation requirements.
- 27 (8) Each school or school district shall be required to maintain 28 up-to-date policy statements related to the administration and 29 operation of the school or school district.
- All decisions of policy, philosophy, selection of books, teaching material, curriculum, except as in subsection (7) above provided, school rules and administration, or other matters not specifically referred to in this section, shall be the responsibility of the administration and administrators of the particular private school involved.
- 36 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28A.200.010 and 1995 c 52 s 1 are each amended to read 37 as follows:

Each parent whose child is receiving home-based instruction under 2 RCW 28A.225.010(4) shall have the duty to:

- (1) File annually a signed declaration of intent that he or she is planning to cause his or her child to receive home-based instruction. The statement shall include the name and age of the child, shall specify whether a certificated person will be supervising the instruction, and shall be written in a format prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction. Each parent shall file the statement by September 15 of the school year or within two weeks of the beginning of any public school quarter, trimester, or semester with the superintendent of the public school district within which the parent resides or the district that accepts the transfer, and the student shall be deemed a transfer student of the nonresident district. Parents may apply for transfer under RCW 28A.225.220;
  - (2) Ensure that test scores or annual academic progress assessments and immunization records, together with any other records that are kept relating to the instructional and educational activities provided, are forwarded to any other public or private school to which the child transfers.   - (3) Ensure that a standardized achievement test approved by the state board of education is administered annually to the child by a qualified individual or that an annual assessment of the student's academic progress is written by a certificated person who is currently working in the field of education. The state board of education shall not require these children to meet the student learning goals, master the essential academic learning requirements, to take the assessments, or to obtain a certificate of ((mastery)) academic proficiency pursuant to RCW 28A.630.885. The standardized test administered or the annual academic progress assessment written shall be made a part of the child's permanent records. If, as a result of the annual test or assessment, it is determined that the child is not making reasonable progress consistent with his or her age or stage of development, the parent shall make a good faith effort to remedy any deficiency.
