- 7 The Washington commission on student learning is hereby The primary purposes of the commission are to identify 8 established. the knowledge and skills all public school students need to know and be 9 10 able to do based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210, to develop student assessment and school accountability systems, and to 11 12 take other steps necessary to develop a performance-based education 13 The commission shall include three members of the state board 14 of education, three members appointed by the governor before July 1, 15 1992, and five members appointed no later than June 1, 1993, by the governor elected in the November 1992 election. 16 The governor shall 17 appoint a chair from the commission members, and fill any vacancies in 18 gubernatorial appointments that may occur.
