- 1 AN ACT Relating to incorporating environmental health into the
- 2 public health improvement plan; and amending RCW 43.70.520 and
- 3 43.70.580.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 43.70.520 and 1993 c 492 s 467 are each amended to 6 read as follows:
- 7 (1) The legislature finds that the public health functions of
- 8 community assessment, policy development, and assurance of service
- 9 delivery are essential elements in achieving the objectives of health
- 10 reform in Washington state. The legislature further finds that the
- 11 population-based services provided by state and local health
- 12 departments are cost-effective and are a critical strategy for the
- 13 long-term containment of health care costs. The legislature further
- 14 finds that the public health system in the state lacks the capacity to
- 15 fulfill these functions consistent with the needs of a reformed health
- 16 care system.
- 17 (2) The department of health shall develop, in consultation with
- 18 local health departments and districts, the state board of health, the
- 19 health services commission, area Indian health service, and other state

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- 1 agencies, health services providers, and citizens concerned about
- 2 public health, a public health services improvement plan. The plan
- 3 shall provide a detailed accounting of deficits in the core functions
- 4 of assessment, policy development, assurance of the current public
- 5 health system, how additional public health funding would be used, and
- 6 describe the benefits expected from expanded expenditures.
  - (3) The plan shall include:
- 8 (a) Definition of minimum standards for public health protection 9 through assessment, policy development, and assurances:
  - (i) Enumeration of communities not meeting those standards;
- 11 (ii) A budget and staffing plan for bringing all communities up to 12 minimum standards;
- 13 (iii) An analysis of the costs and benefits expected from adopting
- 14 minimum public health standards for assessment, policy development, and
- 15 assurances;

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- 16 (b) Recommended strategies and a schedule for improving public 17 health programs throughout the state, including:
- 18 (i) Strategies for transferring personal health care services from
- 19 the public health system, into the uniform benefits package where
- 20 feasible; and
- 21 (ii) Timing of increased funding for public health services linked
- 22 to specific objectives for improving public health; ((and))
- 23 (c) A recommended level of dedicated funding for public health
- 24 services to be expressed in terms of a percentage of total health
- 25 service expenditures in the state or a set per person amount; such
- 26 recommendation shall also include methods to ensure that such funding
- 27 does not supplant existing federal, state, and local funds received by
- 28 local health departments, and methods of distributing funds among local
- 29 health departments; and
- 30 (d) A summary of federal, state, and local data sources related to
- 31 public health, including both personal health and environmental health,
- 32 with recommendations to improve interagency coordination and increase
- 33 public access to health information.
- 34 (4) The department shall coordinate this planning process with the
- 35 study activities required in section 258, chapter 492, Laws of 1993.
- 36 (5) By March 1, 1994, the department shall provide initial
- 37 recommendations of the public health services improvement plan to the
- 38 legislature regarding minimum public health standards, and public

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- 1 health programs needed to address urgent needs, such as those cited in 2 subsection (7) of this section.
- 3 (6) By December 1, 1994, the department shall present the public 4 health services improvement plan to the legislature, with specific 5 recommendations for each element of the plan to be implemented over the 6 period from 1995 through 1997.
- 7 (7) Thereafter, the department shall update the public health 8 services improvement plan for presentation to the legislature prior to 9 the beginning of a new biennium.
- 10 (8) Among the specific population-based public health activities to be considered in the public health services improvement plan are: 11 Health data assessment and chronic and infectious disease surveillance; 12 rapid response to outbreaks of communicable disease; efforts to prevent 13 and control specific communicable diseases, such as tuberculosis and 14 15 acquired immune deficiency syndrome; health education to promote 16 healthy behaviors and to reduce the prevalence of chronic disease, such as those linked to the use of tobacco; access to primary care in 17 coordination with existing community and migrant health clinics and 18 19 other not for profit health care organizations; programs to ensure 20 children are born as healthy as possible and they receive immunizations adequate nutrition; efforts to prevent 21 and intentional unintentional injury; efforts to assess, monitor, and reduce or 22 eliminate environmental health risks related to pollutant-emitting 23 24 facilities or the accumulation of toxic air or water releases; programs 25 to ensure the safety of drinking water and food supplies; poison 26 control; trauma services; and other activities that have the potential 27 to improve the health of the population or special populations and reduce the need for or cost of health services. 28
- 29 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.70.580 and 1995 c 43 s 3 are each amended to read 30 as follows:
- The primary responsibility of the public health system, is to take those actions necessary to protect, promote, and improve the health of the population. In order to accomplish this, the department shall:
- 34 (1) Identify, as part of the public health improvement plan, the 35 key health outcomes sought for the population and the capacity needed 36 by the public health system to fulfill its responsibilities in 37 improving health outcomes.

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(2)(a) Distribute state funds that, in conjunction with local revenues, are intended to improve the capacity of the public health system. The distribution methodology shall encourage system-wide effectiveness and efficiency and provide local health jurisdictions with the flexibility both to determine governance structures and address their unique needs.

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- 7 (b) Enter into with each local health jurisdiction performance-8 based contracts that establish clear measures of the degree to which 9 the local health jurisdiction is attaining the capacity necessary to 10 improve health outcomes. The contracts negotiated between the local health jurisdictions and the department of health must identify the 11 specific measurable progress that local health jurisdictions will make 12 13 toward achieving health outcomes. A community assessment conducted by 14 local health jurisdiction according to the public health the 15 improvement plan((, which shall include the results of the 16 comprehensive plan prepared according to RCW 70.190.130,)) will be used 17 as the basis for identifying the health outcomes. A community 18 assessment shall include the following: (i) An assessment of the 19 demographics, health status, health problems, risk behaviors, and health system capacity for the county or district; (ii) the results of 20 the comprehensive plan prepared according to RCW 70.190.130; (iii) an 21 22 assessment of community environmental health risks and a plan to reduce or eliminate these risks; and (iv) a program of public outreach to 23 24 involve the community in identifying health problems and formulating <u>local health policy.</u> The contracts shall include provisions to 25 26 encourage collaboration among local health jurisdictions. State funds 27 shall be used solely to expand and complement, but not to supplant city and county government support for public health programs. 28
- 29 (3) Develop criteria to assess the degree to which capacity is 30 being achieved and ensure compliance by public health jurisdictions.
- 31 (4) Adopt rules necessary to carry out the purposes of chapter 43, 32 Laws of 1995.
- (5) Biennially, within the public health improvement plan, evaluate the effectiveness of the public health system, evaluate the effectiveness of local health jurisdictions at addressing both personal and environmental health risks, assess the degree to which the public health system is attaining the capacity to improve the status of the

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- 1 public's health, and report progress made by each local health
- 2 jurisdiction toward improving health outcomes.

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
