SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 6326

1998 Regular Session State of Washington 55th Legislature

- 1 AN ACT Relating to disclosure of social security numbers by schools
- 2 and school districts; and adding new sections to chapter 28A.320 RCW.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28A.320 5 RCW to read as follows:
- 6 (1) School districts and public schools may not request the disclosure of a student's federal social security number, except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this section. 8
- 9 (2)(a) A school district or public school may request 10 disclosure of a student's federal social security number for the purpose of seeking medicaid reimbursement for covered services to 11 12 eligible students under RCW 74.09.5241 through 74.09.5256, or for the purpose of compliance with federal law explicitly requiring such 13
- 14 disclosure.
- 15 (b) If the student is an employee of the school district, a school
- district or public school may request disclosure of a student's social 16
- security number for employment purposes. Employment records containing 17
- student social security numbers shall be maintained separately from 18
- student records. 19

- 1 (c) Any school district or public school requesting the disclosure 2 of a student's federal social security number under this subsection (2) 3 must use a consent form, to be signed by the parent or guardian, that 4 contains a disclosure statement printed on the form. The disclosure 5 statement must include the following:
 - (i) Whether the disclosure is mandatory or voluntary;
- 7 (ii) The information that will be collected or matched using the 8 number;
- 9 (iii) Which federal or state law, rule, or regulation requires the 10 disclosure; and
- 11 (iv) Who will have access to the number.

- (d) A parent's or guardian's general consent for another purpose, including medical consent or any consent used to approve admission to or involvement in a special education or remedial program or regular school activity, does not constitute consent to disclosure of the student's social security number.
- 17 (3)(a) Longitudinal studies that involve the disclosure of student social security numbers must first be reviewed and approved by the 18 19 local school board. The board may permit a school, school district, or 20 the superintendent of public instruction to request voluntary student participation in longitudinal studies related to education. Permission 21 for student participation in a longitudinal study may be granted only 22 23 in writing by the student age eighteen or older or by the parent of a 24 student under age eighteen. Any request for disclosure of a student's 25 federal social security number for this purpose must include a 26 disclosure statement with the following information:
- 27 (i) An explanation that participation in the study and disclosure 28 of the social security number are voluntary;
- (ii) An itemization of all information that will be gathered about the student or the student's family;
- 31 (iii) Who will have access to the information;
- 32 (iv) Who will have access to the social security number;
- 33 (v) How long the study will last;
- (vi) What will happen to the information after completion of the longitudinal study; and
- (vii) The date the school board reviewed and approved participation in the study.
- 38 (b) A parent's or guardian's general consent for another purpose, 39 including medical consent or any consent used to approve admission to

- or involvement in a special education or remedial program or regular school activity does not constitute consent to disclose the student's social security number.
- 4 (4)(a) No official, employee, contractor, or agent of an educational institution or agency may release a student's social security number except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this 7 section without the written consent of the student age eighteen or 8 older or the parent or legal guardian of a student under age eighteen.
- 9 The request for release must include the following information:
- 10 (i) Whether the disclosure is mandatory or voluntary;
- 11 (ii) The information that will be collected or matched using the 12 number;
- 13 (iii) Which federal or state law, rule, or regulation requires the 14 disclosure; and
- 15 (iv) Who will have access to the number.
- 16 (b) A parent's or guardian's general consent for other purposes, 17 including medical consent or any consent used to approve admission to 18 or involvement in a special education or remedial program or regular 19 school activity, does not constitute consent to disclosure of the 20 student's social security number.
- (5) This section shall not be construed as prohibiting a school district from developing an individual student identification number, unrelated to the student's social security number, to identify and maintain education records on students enrolled in the district.
- 25 (6) A student's social security number may only be used for the 26 purpose it was collected and for which the student or the student's 27 parent or legal guardian has given prior written consent.
- (7) It is unlawful for any public school or public school district to deny a student any right, benefit, or privilege provided by law because the student or the student's parent or legal guardian refuses to disclose the student's federal social security number.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.320 RCW to read as follows:
- Every school district shall establish and implement a district-wide policy that requires all student information and records to be destroyed within thirty days of a student's high school graduation, except for the following:

- 2 (3) Standardized test results.
