SUBSTITUTE SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 8425

State of Washington 55th Legislature 1998 Regular Session

By Senate Committee on Commerce & Labor (originally sponsored by Senators Schow, Prentice, Heavey, Horn, Haugen, Long, Spanel, Rossi, Brown, Snyder, Patterson, Wojahn, Hochstatter, Zarelli, Roach, Oke and Winsley)

- 1 WHEREAS, Legalized forms of gambling in Washington state have 2 proliferated over the last ten years; and
- WHEREAS, Neighboring states and Canadian provinces have also recently expanded legalized forms of gambling and are expected to continue to do so in the coming years; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The various segments of the gambling industry in this 7 state, including lottery, horse racing, tribal casino gaming, bingo,
- 8 raffles, casino nights, commercial card rooms, punchboards, and pull-
- 9 tabs have reportedly begun to experience market challenges; and
- 10 WHEREAS, As a result of these challenges, there are frequent
- 11 pressures to make changes in the nature and scope of gambling
- 12 activities currently authorized in this state; and
- 13 WHEREAS, It is unclear what forces may be contributing to the
- 14 challenges faced by the various segments of the gambling industry and
- 15 most important, what, if anything, the state can do to address such
- 16 challenges; and
- 17 WHEREAS, The executive branch and the legislative branch need to
- 18 have a full understanding of what is occurring in the gambling industry
- 19 in order to make appropriate public policy decisions regarding gambling
- 20 in this state; and

- WHEREAS, The state's public policy on gambling, in many respects, has not been clearly defined;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, By the Senate of the State of Washington, the House of Representatives concurring, That a gambling policy task force be established to examine:
 - (1) The current nature and scope of legalized gambling in the state and how these forms of gambling have developed and changed over time;

- (2) The current tax structure of gambling activities in this state;
- 9 (3) The nature of compulsive or problem gambling and current 10 efforts to address this social problem in this state;
- 11 (4) The current nature and scope of legalized gambling in 12 neighboring states and Canadian provinces and the potential competitive 13 impact such gambling has or will have on this state's gambling market;
 - (5) Current trends emerging across the United States and Canada in each segment of the gambling market and the potential impact of such trends on this state's gambling market;
- 17 (6) Recent state or federal court decisions and the potential 18 impact these cases have on the future of gambling policy in this state; 19 and
- 20 (7) The establishment of potential state-wide policies on gambling; 21 and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the task force consist of eleven 22 23 voting members, including: The governor or the governor's designee; 24 three members from the majority caucus and two members from the 25 minority caucus of the Senate, appointed by the President of the 26 Senate; at least one member from each caucus shall be a member of the 27 Senate committee on labor and commerce; and three members from the majority caucus and two members from the minority caucus of the House 28 29 of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of 30 Representatives; at least one member from each caucus shall be a member of the House of Representatives committee on commerce and labor. 31 addition, the task force shall consist of the following nonvoting 32 33 members: One representative each from the Washington state gambling 34 commission, the Washington state horse racing commission, and the 35 Washington state lottery commission; one representative of a recognized tribe in the state that operates legalized class III gaming in an urban 36 37 area; one representative of a recognized tribe in the state that operates legalized class III gaming in a rural area; one representative 38 39 of the commercial gaming industry; one representative of the charitable

- l gaming industry; one representative of a horse racing association
- 2 licensed by the state horse racing commission; and three members of the
- 3 public. The nonvoting members shall be appointed by the governor,
- 4 based on recommendations made by the Senate and the House of
- 5 Representatives. The task force shall choose its chair and vice-chair
- 6 from among its voting membership; and
- 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the task force is authorized to expend
- 8 up to forty-nine thousand dollars to pay a consultant to gather the
- 9 appropriate data needed to obtain a clear understanding of the gambling
- 10 market in this state. The task force is also authorized to consult
- 11 with individuals from the public and private sector who have expertise
- 12 in the gambling industry in order to gain a clear understanding of
- 13 gambling in this state; and
- 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the task force shall use legislative
- 15 staff and facilities. All expenses of the task force, including
- 16 travel, and the cost of a consultant shall be paid jointly by the
- 17 Senate and the House of Representatives; and
- 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the task force report its findings and
- 19 recommendations to the legislature by January 1, 1999; and
- 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the task force expires January 1,
- 21 1999.
