## SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 6574

- 1 AN ACT Relating to the learning materials loan program; adding a
- 2 new section to chapter 28A.195 RCW; creating a new section; and
- 3 providing an effective date.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature, in fulfilling its role as
- 6 stated in the state Constitution, namely, that "It is the paramount
- 7 duty of the state to make ample provision for the education of all
- 8 children residing within its borders...", finds that families with
- 9 children enrolled in approved private schools are an integral part of
- 10 fulfilling the state's educational mission.
- 11 The legislature further recognizes that a significant percentage of
- 12 students attend approved private schools and frequently move between
- 13 the state's publicly and privately funded schools. The parents of
- 14 these children are subject to taxes and levies to fulfill the education
- 15 provided through our common schools. In addition, these parents pay
- 16 for student learning materials their child uses in the approved private
- 17 school that would be free of additional charge in the common school.
- 18 In acknowledgement of this additional burden and in recognizing the
- 19 role of our state's approved private schools in helping to fulfill the

- 1 constitutional mandate to provide a basic education to our children,
- 2 the legislature recognizes the need for equalization. The sole purpose
- 3 of this act is to assist children, not schools.
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.195
- 5 RCW to read as follows:
- 6 Students attending state-approved private schools may receive
- 7 loaned learning materials from the local school district in which the
- 8 private school is located. To provide these materials to students,
- 9 approved private schools shall submit annual requests for learning
- 10 materials to the local school district in which the private school is
- 11 located. The local school district may provide through a loan
- 12 agreement the learning materials in accordance with the following
- 13 guidelines:
- 14 (1) The local school district shall make a good faith effort to
- 15 accommodate requests for learning materials.
- 16 (2) Learning materials support shall not be limited, in any way,
- 17 based on a student's economic status.
- 18 (3) "Learning materials" means textbooks and workbooks.
- 19 (4) Only textbooks listed on the official adoption list of the
- 20 local school district are eligible.
- 21 (5) Loaned learning materials shall neither promote nor deter
- 22 sectarian or religious activities of the private school.
- 23 (6) No approved private school may be required to participate in
- 24 learning materials support provided by the state.
- 25 (7) Only students who attend state-approved private schools are
- 26 eligible for learning materials support.
- 27 (8) Student learning materials designed for religious instruction
- 28 are not eligible for learning materials support.
- 29 (9) No laws or rules may be added beyond those already in existence
- 30 as of January 1, 1998, that have a direct or indirect impact on the
- 31 autonomy of the private school as a result of the student's receipt of
- 32 learning materials support.
- 33 (10) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall
- 34 adopt guidelines for effective implementation of this section.
- 35 (11) To assist the state, the office of the superintendent of
- 36 public instruction may identify currently existing, nonsectarian,
- 37 state-wide private school organizations to serve as the liaison with

- 1 the state for eligible private schools whose students are receiving or
- 2 are interested in receiving loaned learning materials.
- 3 (12) Student learning materials loaned to students attending
- 4 private schools under this section shall, at all times, be considered
- 5 the property of the local school district.
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** This act takes effect September 1, 1998.
- 7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. If any provision of this act or its
- 8 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
- 9 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
- 10 persons or circumstances is not affected.
