8 TITLE 75
9 Amendments

10 **Sec. 1.** RCW 75.08.012 and 1983 1st ex.s. c 46 s 5 are each amended
11 to read as follows:

12 Wildlife, fish, and shellfish are the property of the state. The
13 commission, director, and the department shall preserve, protect,
14 perpetuate and manage the ((food)) fish and shellfish in state waters
15 and offshore waters.

16 The department shall conserve the ((food)) fish and shellfish
17 resources in a manner that does not impair the resource. In a manner
18 consistent with this goal, the department shall seek to maintain the
19 economic well-being and stability of the fishing industry in the state.
20 The department shall promote orderly fisheries and shall enhance and
21 improve recreational and commercial fishing in this state.

22 The commission may authorize the taking of wildlife, fish, and
23 shellfish only at times or places, or in manners or quantities as in
24 the judgment of the commission maximizes public recreational
25 opportunities without impairing the supply of these resources. The
26 commission shall attempt to maximize the public recreational fishing
27 and hunting opportunities of all citizens, including juvenile,
28 handicapped, and senior citizens.

29 Recognizing that the management of our state fish, wildlife, and
30 shellfish resources depends heavily on the assistance of volunteers,
31 the department shall work cooperatively with volunteer groups and
32 individuals to achieve the goals of this title to the greatest extent
33 possible.

34 Nothing in this title shall be construed to infringe on the right
35 of a private property owner to control the owner's private property.

1 **Sec. 2.** RCW 75.08.020 and 1988 c 36 s 31 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 (1) The director shall investigate the habits, supply, and economic
4 use of food fish and shellfish in state and offshore waters.

5 (2) The director shall make an annual report to the governor on the
6 operation of the department and the statistics of the fishing industry.

7 (3) Subject to RCW 40.07.040, the director shall provide a
8 comprehensive biennial report of all departmental operations to the
9 chairs of the committees on natural resources (~~((and ways and means))~~) of
10 the senate and house of representatives, the senate ways and means
11 committee, and the house of representatives appropriations committee,
12 including one copy to the staff of each of the committees, to reflect
13 the previous fiscal period. The format of the report shall be similar
14 to reports issued by the department from 1964-1970 and the report shall
15 include, but not be limited to, descriptions of all department
16 activities including: Revenues generated, program costs, capital
17 expenditures, personnel, special projects, new and ongoing research,
18 environmental controls, cooperative projects, intergovernmental
19 agreements, and outlines of ongoing litigation, recent court decisions
20 and orders on major issues with the potential for state liability. The
21 report shall describe the status of the resource and its recreational,
22 commercial, and tribal utilization. The report (~~((shall be given to the~~
23 ~~house and senate committees on ways and means and the house and senate~~
24 ~~committees on natural resources and))~~) shall be made available to the
25 public.

26 **Sec. 3.** RCW 75.08.040 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 2 s 23 are each amended
27 to read as follows:

28 The commission may acquire by gift, easement, purchase, lease, or
29 condemnation lands, buildings, water rights, (~~((and))~~) rights of way, or
30 other necessary property, and construct and maintain necessary
31 facilities for purposes consistent with this title. The commission may
32 authorize the director to acquire property under this section, but the
33 power of condemnation may only be exercised by the director when an
34 appropriation has been made by the legislature for the acquisition of
35 a specific property, except to clear title and acquire access rights of
36 way.

37 The commission may sell, lease, convey, or grant concessions upon
38 real or personal property under the control of the department.

1 **Sec. 4.** RCW 75.08.045 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 2 s 24 are each amended
2 to read as follows:

3 The (~~commission~~) director may accept money or real property from
4 persons under conditions requiring the use of the property or money for
5 the protection, rehabilitation, preservation, or conservation of the
6 state wildlife, food fish, and shellfish resources, or in settlement of
7 claims for damages to wildlife, food fish, and shellfish resources.
8 The (~~commission~~) director shall only accept real property useful for
9 the protection, rehabilitation, preservation, or conservation of these
10 fisheries resources.

11 **Sec. 5.** RCW 75.08.055 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 2 s 8 are each amended
12 to read as follows:

13 (1) The commission may enter into agreements with and receive funds
14 from the United States for the construction, maintenance, and operation
15 of fish cultural stations, laboratories, and devices in the Columbia
16 River basin for improvement of feeding and spawning conditions for
17 fish, for the protection of migratory fish from irrigation projects and
18 for facilitating free migration of fish over obstructions.

19 (2) The (~~commission~~) director and the department may acquire by
20 gift, purchase, lease, easement, or condemnation the use of lands where
21 the construction or improvement is to be carried on by the United
22 States.

23 **Sec. 6.** RCW 75.08.080 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 2 s 11 are each amended
24 to read as follows:

25 (1) The commission may adopt, amend, or repeal rules as follows:

26 (a) Specifying the times when the taking of wildlife, food fish, or
27 shellfish is lawful or unlawful.

28 (b) Specifying the areas and waters in which the taking and
29 possession of wildlife, food fish, or shellfish is lawful or unlawful.

30 (c) Specifying and defining the gear, appliances, or other
31 equipment and methods that may be used to take wildlife, food fish, or
32 shellfish, and specifying the times, places, and manner in which the
33 equipment may be used or possessed.

34 (d) Regulating the possession, disposal, landing, and sale of
35 wildlife, food fish, or shellfish within the state, whether acquired
36 within or without the state.

1 (e) Regulating the prevention and suppression of diseases and pests
2 affecting wildlife, food fish, or shellfish.

3 (f) Regulating the size, sex, species, and quantities of wildlife,
4 food fish, or shellfish that may be taken, possessed, sold, or disposed
5 of.

6 (g) Specifying the statistical and biological reports required from
7 fishermen, dealers, boathouses, or processors of wildlife, food fish,
8 or shellfish.

9 (h) Classifying species of marine and freshwater life as wildlife,
10 food fish, or shellfish.

11 (i) Classifying the species of wildlife, food fish, and shellfish
12 that may be used for purposes other than human consumption.

13 (j) Other rules necessary to carry out this title and the purposes
14 and duties of the department.

15 (2) Subsections (1)(a), (b), (c), (d), and (f) of this section do
16 not apply to private tideland owners and lessees and the immediate
17 family members of the owners or lessees of state tidelands, when they
18 take or possess oysters, clams, cockles, borers, or mussels, excluding
19 razor clams, produced on their own private tidelands or their leased
20 state tidelands for personal use.

21 "Immediate family member" for the purposes of this section means a
22 spouse, brother, sister, grandparent, parent, child, or grandchild.

23 (3) Except for subsection (1)(g) of this section, this section does
24 not apply to private sector cultured aquatic products as defined in RCW
25 15.85.020. Subsection (1)(g) of this section does apply to such
26 products.

27 **Sec. 7.** RCW 75.08.206 and 1983 1st ex.s. c 46 s 20 are each
28 amended to read as follows:

29 The director shall provide compensation insurance for fisheries
30 patrol officers, insuring these employees against injury or death in
31 the performance of enforcement duties not covered under the workers'
32 compensation act of the state. The beneficiaries and the compensation
33 and benefits under the compensation insurance shall be the same as
34 provided in chapter 51.32 RCW, and the compensation insurance also
35 shall provide for medical aid and hospitalization to the extent and
36 amount as provided in RCW 51.36.010 and 51.36.020.

37 The recodification of this section into Title 77 RCW does not make
38 any current or former employees eligible for compensation or benefits

1 under this section who were not otherwise eligible under this section
2 before the recodification.

3 **Sec. 8.** RCW 75.08.208 and 1983 1st ex.s. c 46 s 22 are each
4 amended to read as follows:

5 The director shall relieve from active duty fisheries patrol
6 officers who are injured in the performance of their official duties to
7 such an extent as to be incapable of active service. While relieved
8 from active duty, the employees shall receive one-half of their salary
9 less any compensation received through the provisions of RCW 41.40.200,
10 41.40.220, and 75.08.206.

11 The recodification of this section into Title 77 RCW does not make
12 any current or former employees eligible for compensation or benefits
13 under this section who were not otherwise eligible under this section
14 before the recodification.

15 **Sec. 9.** RCW 75.08.230 and 1996 c 267 s 3 are each amended to read
16 as follows:

17 (1) Except as provided in this ~~((section))~~ title, state and county
18 officers receiving the following moneys shall deposit them in the state
19 general fund:

20 (a) The sale of commercial licenses required under this title,
21 except for licenses issued under chapter 77.32 RCW; and

22 ~~(b) ((The sale of property seized or confiscated under this title;~~

23 ~~(c) Fines and forfeitures collected under this title;~~

24 ~~(d) The sale of real or personal property held for department~~
25 ~~purposes;~~

26 ~~(e) Rentals or concessions of the department;~~

27 ~~(f))~~ Moneys received for damages to food fish, shellfish or
28 department property ~~((; and~~

29 ~~(g) Gifts))~~.

30 (2) The director shall make weekly remittances to the state
31 treasurer of moneys collected by the department.

32 (3) All fines and forfeitures collected or assessed by a district
33 court for a violation of this title or rule of the department shall be
34 remitted as provided in chapter 3.62 RCW.

35 (4) Proceeds from the sale of food fish or shellfish taken in test
36 fishing conducted by the department, to the extent that these proceeds
37 exceed the estimates in the budget approved by the legislature, may be

1 allocated as unanticipated receipts under RCW 43.79.270 to reimburse
2 the department for unanticipated costs for test fishing operations in
3 excess of the allowance in the budget approved by the legislature.

4 (5) Proceeds from the sale of salmon carcasses and salmon eggs from
5 state general funded hatcheries by the department of general
6 administration shall be deposited in the regional fisheries enhancement
7 group account established in RCW 75.50.100 (as recodified by this act).

8 (6) Moneys received by the commission under RCW 75.08.045 (as
9 recodified by this act), to the extent these moneys exceed estimates in
10 the budget approved by the legislature, may be allocated as
11 unanticipated receipts under RCW 43.79.270. Allocations under this
12 subsection shall be made only for the specific purpose for which the
13 moneys were received, unless the moneys were received in settlement of
14 a claim for damages to food fish or shellfish, in which case the moneys
15 may be expended for the conservation of these resources.

16 (7) Proceeds from the sale of herring spawn on kelp fishery
17 licenses by the department, to the extent those proceeds exceed
18 estimates in the budget approved by the legislature, may be allocated
19 as unanticipated receipts under RCW 43.79.270. Allocations under this
20 subsection shall be made only for herring management, enhancement, and
21 enforcement.

22 **Sec. 10.** RCW 75.08.245 and 1988 c 115 s 1 are each amended to read
23 as follows:

24 The department may supply, at a reasonable charge, surplus salmon
25 eggs to a person for use in the cultivation of salmon. The department
26 shall not intentionally create a surplus of salmon to provide eggs for
27 sale. The department shall only sell salmon eggs from stocks that are
28 not suitable for salmon population rehabilitation or enhancement in
29 state waters in Washington. All sales or transfers shall be consistent
30 with the department's egg transfer and aquaculture disease control
31 regulations as now existing or hereafter amended. Prior to department
32 determination that eggs of a salmon stock are surplus and available for
33 sale, the department shall assess the productivity of each watershed
34 that is suitable for receiving eggs.

35 ~~((The salmon enhancement advisory council, created in RCW~~
36 ~~75.48.120, shall consider egg sales at each meeting.))~~

1 **Sec. 11.** RCW 75.10.150 and 1996 c 267 s 14 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 Since violation of the rules of the department relating to the
4 accounting of the commercial harvest of food fish and shellfish result
5 in damage to the resources of the state, liability for damage to food
6 fish and shellfish resources is imposed on a wholesale fish dealer for
7 violation of a provision in chapter 75.28 RCW (as recodified by this
8 act) or a rule of the department related to the accounting of the
9 commercial harvest of food fish and shellfish and shall be for the
10 actual damages or for damages imposed as follows:

11 (1) For violation of rules requiring the timely presentation to the
12 department of documents relating to the accounting of commercial
13 harvest, fifty dollars for each of the first fifteen documents in a
14 series and ten dollars for each subsequent document in the same series.
15 If documents relating to the accounting of commercial harvest of food
16 fish and shellfish are lost or destroyed and the wholesale dealer
17 notifies the department in writing within seven days of the loss or
18 destruction, the director shall waive the requirement for timely
19 presentation of the documents.

20 (2) For violation of rules requiring accurate and legible
21 information relating to species, value, harvest area, or amount of
22 harvest, twenty-five dollars for each of the first five violations of
23 this subsection following July 28, 1985, and fifty dollars for each
24 violation after the first five violations.

25 (3) For violations of rules requiring certain signatures, fifty
26 dollars for each of the first two violations and one hundred dollars
27 for each subsequent violation. For the purposes of this subsection,
28 each signature is a separate requirement.

29 (4) For other violations of rules relating to the accounting of the
30 commercial harvest, fifty dollars for each separate violation.

31 **Sec. 12.** RCW 75.12.230 and 1998 c 190 s 81 are each amended to
32 read as follows:

33 Within the waters described in RCW 75.12.210 (as recodified by this
34 act), a person shall not transport or possess salmon on board a vessel
35 carrying fishing gear of a type other than troll lines or angling gear,
36 unless accompanied by a certificate issued by a state or country
37 showing that the salmon have been lawfully taken within the territorial
38 waters of the state or country.

1 **Sec. 13.** RCW 75.20.061 and 1983 1st ex.s. c 46 s 73 are each
2 amended to read as follows:

3 If the director determines that a fishway or fish guard described
4 in RCW 75.20.040 and 75.20.060 (as recodified by this act) and in
5 existence on September 1, 1963, is inadequate, in addition to other
6 authority granted in this chapter, the director may remove, relocate,
7 reconstruct, or modify the device, without cost to the owner. The
8 director shall not materially modify the amount of flow of water
9 through the device. After the department has completed the
10 improvements, the fishways and fish guards shall be operated and
11 maintained at the expense of the owner in accordance with RCW 75.20.040
12 and 75.20.060 (as recodified by this act).

13 **Sec. 14.** RCW 75.20.098 and 1997 c 424 s 6 are each amended to read
14 as follows:

15 When reviewing a mitigation plan under RCW 75.20.100 or 75.20.103
16 (as recodified by this act), the department shall, at the request of
17 the project proponent, follow the guidance contained in RCW 90.74.005
18 through 90.74.030.

19 **Sec. 15.** RCW 75.20.100 and 1998 c 190 s 87 are each amended to
20 read as follows:

21 (1) In the event that any person or government agency desires to
22 construct any form of hydraulic project or perform other work that will
23 use, divert, obstruct, or change the natural flow or bed of any of the
24 salt or fresh waters of the state, such person or government agency
25 shall, before commencing construction or work thereon and to ensure the
26 proper protection of fish life, secure the approval of the department
27 as to the adequacy of the means proposed for the protection of fish
28 life. This approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

29 (2)(a) Except as provided in RCW 75.20.1001 (as recodified by this
30 act), the department shall grant or deny approval of a standard permit
31 within forty-five calendar days of the receipt of a complete
32 application and notice of compliance with any applicable requirements
33 of the state environmental policy act, made in the manner prescribed in
34 this section.

35 (b) The applicant may document receipt of application by filing in
36 person or by registered mail. A complete application for approval
37 shall contain general plans for the overall project, complete plans and

1 specifications of the proposed construction or work within the mean
2 higher high water line in salt water or within the ordinary high water
3 line in fresh water, and complete plans and specifications for the
4 proper protection of fish life.

5 (c) The forty-five day requirement shall be suspended if:

6 (i) After ten working days of receipt of the application, the
7 applicant remains unavailable or unable to arrange for a timely field
8 evaluation of the proposed project;

9 (ii) The site is physically inaccessible for inspection; or

10 (iii) The applicant requests delay. Immediately upon determination
11 that the forty-five day period is suspended, the department shall
12 notify the applicant in writing of the reasons for the delay.

13 (d) For purposes of this section, "standard permit" means a written
14 permit issued by the department when the conditions under subsections
15 (3) and (5)(b) of this section are not met.

16 (3)(a) The department may issue an expedited written permit in
17 those instances where normal permit processing would result in
18 significant hardship for the applicant or unacceptable damage to the
19 environment. In cases of imminent danger, the department shall issue
20 an expedited written permit, upon request, for work to repair existing
21 structures, move obstructions, restore banks, protect property, or
22 protect fish resources. Expedited permit requests require a complete
23 written application as provided in subsection (2)(b) of this section
24 and shall be issued within fifteen calendar days of the receipt of a
25 complete written application. Approval of an expedited permit is valid
26 for up to sixty days from the date of issuance.

27 (b) For the purposes of this subsection, "imminent danger" means a
28 threat by weather, water flow, or other natural conditions that is
29 likely to occur within sixty days of a request for a permit
30 application.

31 (c) The department may not require the provisions of the state
32 environmental policy act, chapter 43.21C RCW, to be met as a condition
33 of issuing a permit under this subsection.

34 (d) The department or the county legislative authority may
35 determine if an imminent danger exists. The county legislative
36 authority shall notify the department, in writing, if it determines
37 that an imminent danger exists.

38 (4) Approval of a standard permit is valid for a period of up to
39 five years from date of issuance. The permittee must demonstrate

1 substantial progress on construction of that portion of the project
2 relating to the approval within two years of the date of issuance. If
3 the department denies approval, the department shall provide the
4 applicant, in writing, a statement of the specific reasons why and how
5 the proposed project would adversely affect fish life. Protection of
6 fish life shall be the only ground upon which approval may be denied or
7 conditioned. Chapter 34.05 RCW applies to any denial of project
8 approval, conditional approval, or requirements for project
9 modification upon which approval may be contingent.

10 (5)(a) In case of an emergency arising from weather or stream flow
11 conditions or other natural conditions, the department, through its
12 authorized representatives, shall issue immediately, upon request, oral
13 approval for removing any obstructions, repairing existing structures,
14 restoring stream banks, or to protect property threatened by the stream
15 or a change in the stream flow without the necessity of obtaining a
16 written approval prior to commencing work. Conditions of an oral
17 approval to protect fish life shall be established by the department
18 and reduced to writing within thirty days and complied with as provided
19 for in this section. Oral approval shall be granted immediately, upon
20 request, for a stream crossing during an emergency situation.

21 (b) For purposes of this section and RCW 75.20.103 (as recodified
22 by this act), "emergency" means an immediate threat to life, the
23 public, property, or of environmental degradation.

24 (c) The department or the county legislative authority may declare
25 and continue an emergency when one or more of the criteria under (b) of
26 this subsection are met. The county legislative authority shall
27 immediately notify the department if it declares an emergency under
28 this subsection.

29 (6) The department shall, at the request of a county, develop five-
30 year maintenance approval agreements, consistent with comprehensive
31 flood control management plans adopted under the authority of RCW
32 86.12.200, or other watershed plan approved by a county legislative
33 authority, to allow for work on public and private property for bank
34 stabilization, bridge repair, removal of sand bars and debris, channel
35 maintenance, and other flood damage repair and reduction activity under
36 agreed-upon conditions and times without obtaining permits for specific
37 projects.

38 (7) This section shall not apply to the construction of any form of
39 hydraulic project or other work which diverts water for agricultural

1 irrigation or stock watering purposes authorized under or recognized as
2 being valid by the state's water codes, or when such hydraulic project
3 or other work is associated with streambank stabilization to protect
4 farm and agricultural land as defined in RCW 84.34.020. These
5 irrigation or stock watering diversion and streambank stabilization
6 projects shall be governed by RCW 75.20.103 (as recodified by this
7 act).

8 A landscape management plan approved by the department and the
9 department of natural resources under RCW 76.09.350(2), shall serve as
10 a hydraulic project approval for the life of the plan if fish are
11 selected as one of the public resources for coverage under such a plan.

12 (8) For the purposes of this section and RCW 75.20.103 (as
13 recodified by this act), "bed" means the land below the ordinary high
14 water lines of state waters. This definition does not include
15 irrigation ditches, canals, storm water run-off devices, or other
16 artificial watercourses except where they exist in a natural
17 watercourse that has been altered by man.

18 (9) The phrase "to construct any form of hydraulic project or
19 perform other work" does not include the act of driving across an
20 established ford. Driving across streams or on wetted stream beds at
21 areas other than established fords requires approval. Work within the
22 ordinary high water line of state waters to construct or repair a ford
23 or crossing requires approval.

24 **Sec. 16.** RCW 75.20.1001 and 1993 sp.s. c 2 s 31 are each amended
25 to read as follows:

26 The department shall process hydraulic project applications
27 submitted under RCW 75.20.100 or 75.20.103 (as recodified by this act)
28 within thirty days of receipt of the application. This requirement is
29 only applicable for the repair and reconstruction of legally
30 constructed dikes, seawalls, and other flood control structures damaged
31 as a result of flooding or windstorms that occurred in November and
32 December 1990.

33 **Sec. 17.** RCW 75.20.104 and 1993 sp.s. c 2 s 33 are each amended to
34 read as follows:

35 Whenever the placement of woody debris is required as a condition
36 of a hydraulic permit approval issued pursuant to RCW 75.20.100 or
37 75.20.103 (as recodified by this act), the department, upon request,

1 shall invite comment regarding that placement from the local
2 governmental authority, affected tribes, affected federal and state
3 agencies, and the project applicant.

4 **Sec. 18.** RCW 75.20.1041 and 1993 sp.s. c 2 s 34 are each amended
5 to read as follows:

6 The department and the department of ecology will work
7 cooperatively with the United States army corps of engineers to develop
8 a memorandum of agreement outlining dike vegetation management
9 guidelines so that dike owners are eligible for coverage under P.L.
10 84-99, and state requirements established pursuant to RCW 75.20.100 and
11 75.20.103 (as recodified by this act) are met.

12 **Sec. 19.** RCW 75.20.106 and 1993 sp.s. c 2 s 35 are each amended to
13 read as follows:

14 The department may levy civil penalties of up to one hundred
15 dollars per day for violation of any provisions of RCW 75.20.100 or
16 75.20.103 (as recodified by this act). The penalty provided shall be
17 imposed by notice in writing, either by certified mail or personal
18 service to the person incurring the penalty, from the director or the
19 director's designee describing the violation. Any person incurring any
20 penalty under this chapter may appeal the same under chapter 34.05 RCW
21 to the director. Appeals shall be filed within thirty days of receipt
22 of notice imposing any penalty. The penalty imposed shall become due
23 and payable thirty days after receipt of a notice imposing the penalty
24 unless an appeal is filed. Whenever an appeal of any penalty incurred
25 under this chapter is filed, the penalty shall become due and payable
26 only upon completion of all review proceedings and the issuance of a
27 final order confirming the penalty in whole or in part.

28 If the amount of any penalty is not paid within thirty days after
29 it becomes due and payable the attorney general, upon the request of
30 the director shall bring an action in the name of the state of
31 Washington in the superior court of Thurston county or of any county in
32 which such violator may do business, to recover such penalty. In all
33 such actions the procedure and rules of evidence shall be the same as
34 an ordinary civil action. All penalties recovered under this section
35 shall be paid into the state's general fund.

1 **Sec. 20.** RCW 75.20.130 and 1996 c 276 s 2 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 (1) There is hereby created within the environmental hearings
4 office under RCW 43.21B.005 the hydraulic appeals board of the state of
5 Washington.

6 (2) The hydraulic appeals board shall consist of three members:
7 The director of the department of ecology or the director's designee,
8 the director of the department of agriculture or the director's
9 designee, and the director or the director's designee of the department
10 whose action is appealed under subsection (6) of this section. A
11 decision must be agreed to by at least two members of the board to be
12 final.

13 (3) The board may adopt rules necessary for the conduct of its
14 powers and duties or for transacting other official business.

15 (4) The board shall make findings of fact and prepare a written
16 decision in each case decided by it, and that finding and decision
17 shall be effective upon being signed by two or more board members and
18 upon being filed at the hydraulic appeals board's principal office, and
19 shall be open to public inspection at all reasonable times.

20 (5) The board has exclusive jurisdiction to hear appeals arising
21 from the approval, denial, conditioning, or modification of a hydraulic
22 approval issued by the department: (a) Under the authority granted in
23 RCW 75.20.103 (as recodified by this act) for the diversion of water
24 for agricultural irrigation or stock watering purposes or when
25 associated with streambank stabilization to protect farm and
26 agricultural land as defined in RCW 84.34.020; or (b) under the
27 authority granted in RCW 75.20.190 (as recodified by this act) for off-
28 site mitigation proposals.
