BACKGROUND:

The recurrent committee group has charge of historical items on the capital campus. Historical furnishings in the capital buildings have been lost or sold to former elected officials. All furniture and artwork currently under authority of the Department of General Administration subject to general administrative procedures.

Current practice is the procedure follows the sale of surplus property to state elected officials unless it is valued at less than \$1,000 and declared a plot of personal property which in some way depicts a representative office which he has served may be sold to an elected official after leaving his private residence equipment.

SUMMARY:

Establishes Capital Furnishing Preservation Committee to recover and preserve existing and historical furnishings statewide and prevent future loss of historical items. The committee is also to review and advise on feature remodeling, restoration, protection of furniture.

Grants the Capital Furnishing Preservation Committee authority to decide whether to move 50 years old historical furnishings or not. Authorizes extension of just cause statewide elected officials in the legislature.

Committee membership defined as one member from each party to be appointed by their respective caucuses and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives. One member from each party to be appointed by the respective caucuses and the Secretary of the Senate the Governor or the Governor designate.

Lieutenant Governor, the Lieutenant Governor designee representative in the office of the Secretary of State, State Auditor, State Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner, representative in the state Supreme Court, representative in the Washington State Historical Society, Department General Administrator, Thurston County Planning Council, each appointed by the Governor and three private citizens appointed by the Governor.

State capitol building defined as the building on the capitol campus hist of furnishing defined including fire, insurance, art works 50 years old.

Legislature has in effect in which state historical furnishing is illustrative of the state should be maintained and preserved for the people of the state. It is stated that the purpose of the act is to increase awareness of the public and state employees about the significance of furnishing in the state capitol buildings as envisioned by the original architects.
