BACKGROUND:

Absentee ballots or mail ballots may only be counted if:

- The vote for whom the ballot was issued is signed on the outer return envelope in which the ballot is placed.
- The outer return envelope is postmarked or before the day of the primary election for which it was received. However, if the postmark is not legible, an overseas service voter casts the ballot in the outer return envelope and the voter attests to have cast the ballot no later than the date of the primary election for which the ballot was issued.
- The ballot is received by the county auditor or certifier of election results.

The Secretary of State has adopted a rule providing that a voter signs the affidavit on the outer return envelope and the auditor or certifier notifies the voter and affirms that the voter signed the affidavit on the day before the election results are certified.

SUMMARY:

An absentee or mail ballot may only be counted if the vote for whom the ballot was issued is signed on the outer return envelope late than 8:00 p.m. the day of the primary election for which it was issued.

FISCAL NOTE: Not requested.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Ninety days after the end of the session in which it is passed.
