## SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1620

- 1 AN ACT Relating to protection of vulnerable adults; amending RCW
- 2 74.34.020, 74.34.025, 74.34.050, 74.34.070, 74.34.080, 74.34.110,
- 3 74.34.130, 74.34.180, 74.34.200, 70.124.010, 70.124.020, 70.124.030,
- 4 70.124.060, 70.124.090, 70.124.100, 26.44.010, 26.44.015, 26.44.020,
- 5 26.44.030, 26.44.032, 26.44.040, and 74.39A.060; reenacting and
- 6 amending RCW 70.124.040 and 26.44.050; adding new sections to chapter
- 7 74.34 RCW; creating new sections; and repealing RCW 74.34.010,
- 8 74.34.015, 74.34.030, 74.34.055, and 74.34.060.
- 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that the provisions
- 11 for the protection of vulnerable adults found in chapters 26.44,
- 12 70.124, and 74.34 RCW contain different definitions for abandonment,
- 13 abuse, exploitation, and neglect. The legislature finds that combining
- 14 the sections of these chapters that pertain to the protection of
- 15 vulnerable adults would better serve this state's population of
- 16 vulnerable adults. The purpose of chapter 74.34 RCW is to provide the
- 17 department and law enforcement agencies with the authority to
- 18 investigate complaints of abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation,
- 19 or neglect of vulnerable adults and to provide protective services and
- 20 legal remedies to protect these vulnerable adults.

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- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 74.34 RCW
- 3 The legislature finds and declares that:
- 4 (1) Some adults are vulnerable and may be subjected to abuse,
- 5 neglect, financial exploitation, or abandonment by a family member,
- 6 care provider, or other person who has a relationship with the
- 7 vulnerable adult;

to read as follows:

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- 8 (2) A vulnerable adult may be home bound or otherwise unable to
- 9 represent himself or herself in court or to retain legal counsel in
- 10 order to obtain the relief available under this chapter or other
- 11 protections offered through the courts;
- 12 (3) A vulnerable adult may lack the ability to perform or obtain
- 13 those services necessary to maintain his or her well-being because he
- 14 or she lacks the capacity for consent;
- 15 (4) A vulnerable adult may have health problems that place him or
- 16 her in a dependent position;
- 17 (5) The department and appropriate agencies must be prepared to
- 18 receive reports of abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation, or
- 19 neglect of vulnerable adults;
- 20 (6) The department must provide protective services in the least
- 21 restrictive environment appropriate and available to the vulnerable
- 22 adult.
- 23 **Sec. 3.** RCW 74.34.020 and 1997 c 392 s 523 are each amended to
- 24 read as follows:
- 25 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in
- 26 this section apply throughout this chapter.
- 27 (1) "Abandonment" means action or inaction by a person or entity
- 28 with a duty of care for a ((frail elder or a)) vulnerable adult that
- 29 leaves the vulnerable person without the means or ability to obtain
- 30 necessary food, clothing, shelter, or health care.
- 31 (2) "Abuse" means ((a nonaccidental act of physical or mental
- 32 mistreatment or injury, or sexual mistreatment, which harms a person
- 33 through action or inaction by another individual)) the willful action
- 34 or inaction that inflicts injury, unreasonable confinement,
- 35 <u>intimidation</u>, or <u>punishment</u> on a <u>vulnerable</u> adult. In instances of
- 36 <u>abuse of a vulnerable adult who is unable to express or demonstrate</u>
- 37 physical harm, pain, or mental anguish, the abuse is presumed to cause
- 38 physical harm, pain, or mental anguish. Abuse includes sexual abuse,

- 1 mental abuse, physical abuse, and exploitation of a vulnerable adult,
  2 which have the following meanings:
- 3 (a) "Sexual abuse" means any form of nonconsensual sexual contact, 4 including but not limited to unwanted or inappropriate touching, rape, sodomy, sexual coercion, sexually explicit photographing, and sexual 5 harassment. Sexual abuse includes any sexual contact between a staff 6 7 person, who is not also a resident or client, of a facility or a staff 8 person of a program authorized under chapter 71A.12 RCW, and a 9 vulnerable adult living in that facility or receiving service from a program authorized under chapter 71A.12 RCW, whether or not it is 10
- (b) "Physical abuse" means the willful action of inflicting bodily
  injury or physical mistreatment. Physical abuse includes, but is not
  limited to, striking with or without an object, slapping, pinching,
  choking, kicking, shoving, prodding, or the use of chemical restraints
  or physical restraints unless the restraints are consistent with
  licensing requirements, and includes restraints that are otherwise
  being used inappropriately.

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- 19 <u>(c) "Mental abuse" means any willful action or inaction of mental</u>
  20 <u>or verbal abuse. Mental abuse includes, but is not limited to,</u>
  21 <u>coercion, harassment, inappropriately isolating a vulnerable adult from</u>
  22 <u>family, friends, or regular activity, and verbal assault that includes</u>
  23 ridiculing, intimidating, yelling, or swearing.
  - (d) "Exploitation" means an act of forcing, compelling, or exerting undue influence over a vulnerable adult causing the vulnerable adult to act in a way that is inconsistent with relevant past behavior, or causing the vulnerable adult to perform services for the benefit of another.
- (3) "Consent" means express written consent granted after the ((person)) vulnerable adult or his or her legal representative has been fully informed of the nature of the services to be offered and that the receipt of services is voluntary.
- 33 (4) "Department" means the department of social and health 34 services.
- (5) (("Exploitation" means the illegal or improper use of a frail elder or vulnerable adult or that person's income or resources, including trust funds, for another person's profit or advantage.
- 38 (6) "Neglect" means a pattern of conduct or inaction by a person or 39 entity with a duty of care for a frail elder or vulnerable adult that

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results in the deprivation of care necessary to maintain the vulnerable person's physical or mental health.

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- (7) "Secretary" means the secretary of social and health services.
- 4 (8) "Frail elder or vulnerable adult" means a person sixty years of 5 age or older who has the functional, mental, or physical inability to care for himself or herself. "Frail elder or vulnerable adult" shall 6 7 include persons found incapacitated under chapter 11.88 RCW, or a 8 person who has a developmental disability under chapter 71A.10 RCW, and 9 persons admitted to any long-term care facility that is licensed or required to be licensed under chapter 18.20, 18.51, 72.36, or 70.128 10 RCW, or persons receiving services from home health, hospice, or home 11 12 care agencies licensed or required to be licensed under chapter 70.127
- 14 (9) No frail elder or vulnerable person who relies upon and is 15 being provided spiritual treatment in lieu of medical treatment in accordance with the tenets and practices of a well-recognized religious 16 denomination shall for that reason alone be considered abandoned, 17 abused, or neglected.)) "Facility" means a residence licensed or 18 19 required to be licensed under chapter 18.20 RCW, boarding homes; chapter 18.51 RCW, nursing homes; chapter 70.128 RCW, adult family 20 homes; chapter 72.36 RCW, soldiers' homes; or chapter 71A.20 RCW, 21 residential habilitation centers; or any other facility licensed by the 22 23 <u>department</u>.
- 24 <u>(6) "Financial exploitation" means the illegal or improper use of</u> 25 <u>the property, income, resources, or trust funds of the vulnerable adult</u> 26 <u>by any person for any person's profit or advantage.</u>
- 27 <u>(7) "Individual provider" means a person under contract with the</u> 28 <u>department to provide services in the home under chapter 74.09 or</u> 29 74.39A RCW.
- 130 (8) "Mandated reporter" is an employee of the department; law
  131 enforcement officer; social worker; professional school personnel;
  132 individual provider; an employee of a facility; an operator of a
  133 facility; an employee of a social service, welfare, mental health,
  134 adult day health, adult day care, home health, home care, or hospice
  135 agency; county coroner or medical examiner; Christian Science
  136 practitioner; or health care provider subject to chapter 18.130 RCW.
  - (9) "Neglect" means (a) a pattern of conduct or inaction by a person or entity with a duty of care to provide the goods and services that maintain physical or mental health of a vulnerable adult, or that

- 1 avoids or prevents physical or mental harm or pain to a vulnerable
- 2 adult; or (b) an act or omission that demonstrates a serious disregard
- 3 of consequences of such a magnitude as to constitute a clear and
- 4 present danger to the vulnerable adult's health, welfare, or safety.
- 5 (10) "Permissive reporter" means any person, employee of a
- 6 financial institution, attorney, or volunteer in a facility or program
- 7 providing services for vulnerable adults.
- 8 (11) "Protective services" means any services provided by the
- 9 department to a vulnerable adult with the consent of the vulnerable
- 10 <u>adult</u>, or the legal representative of the vulnerable adult, who has
- 11 been abandoned, abused, financially exploited, neglected, or in a state
- 12 of self-neglect. These services may include, but are not limited to
- 13 case management, social casework, home care, placement, arranging for
- 14 medical evaluations, psychological evaluations, day care, or referral
- 15 for legal assistance.
- 16 (12) "Self-neglect" means the failure of a vulnerable adult, not
- 17 living in a facility, to provide for himself or herself the goods and
- 18 services necessary for the vulnerable adult's physical or mental
- 19 <u>health</u>, and the absence of which impairs or threatens the vulnerable
- 20 <u>adult's well-being</u>. This definition may include a vulnerable adult who
- 21 <u>is receiving services through home health, hospice, or a home care</u>
- 22 agency, or an individual provider when the neglect is not a result of
- 23 <u>inaction</u> by that agency or individual provider.
- 24 (13) "Vulnerable adult" includes a person:
- 25 (a) Sixty years of age or older who has the functional, mental, or
- 26 physical inability to care for himself or herself; or
- 27 (b) Found incapacitated under chapter 11.88 RCW; or
- 28 (c) Who has a developmental disability as defined under RCW
- 29 71A.10.020; or
- 30 (d) Admitted to any facility; or
- 31 (e) Receiving services from home health, hospice, or home care
- 32 agencies licensed or required to be licensed under chapter 70.127 RCW;
- 33 or
- 34 (f) Receiving services from an individual provider.
- 35 **Sec. 4.** RCW 74.34.025 and 1997 c 392 s 304 are each amended to
- 36 read as follows:
- The cost of benefits and services provided to a ((frail elder or))
- 38 vulnerable adult under this chapter with state funds only does not

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- 1 constitute an obligation or lien and is not recoverable from the
- 2 recipient of the services or from the recipient's estate, whether by
- 3 lien, adjustment, or any other means of recovery.
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 74.34 RCW 5 to read as follows:
- 6 (1) When there is reasonable cause to believe that abandonment,
- 7 abuse, financial exploitation, or neglect of a vulnerable adult has
- 8 occurred, mandated reporters shall immediately report to the
- 9 department. If there is reason to suspect that sexual or physical
- 10 assault has occurred, mandated reporters shall immediately report to
- 11 the appropriate law enforcement agency and to the department.
- 12 (2) Permissive reporters may report to the department or a law
- 13 enforcement agency when there is reasonable cause to believe that a
- 14 vulnerable adult is being or has been abandoned, abused, financially
- 15 exploited, or neglected.
- 16 (3) No facility, as defined by this chapter, agency licensed or
- 17 required to be licensed under chapter 70.127 RCW, or facility or agency
- 18 under contract with the department to provide care for vulnerable
- 19 adults may develop policies or procedures that interfere with the
- 20 reporting requirements of this chapter.
- 21 (4) Each report, oral or written, must contain as much as possible
- 22 of the following information:
- 23 (a) The name and address of the person making the report;
- (b) The name and address of the vulnerable adult and the name of
- 25 the facility or agency providing care for the vulnerable adult;
- 26 (c) The name and address of the legal guardian or alternate
- 27 decision maker;
- 28 (d) The nature and extent of the abandonment, abuse, financial
- 29 exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect;
- 30 (e) Any history of previous abandonment, abuse, financial
- 31 exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect;
- 32 (f) The identity of the alleged perpetrator, if known; and
- 33 (g) Other information that may be helpful in establishing the
- 34 extent of abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, or the
- 35 cause of death of the deceased vulnerable adult.
- 36 (5) Unless there is a judicial proceeding or the person consents,
- 37 the identity of the person making the report under this section is
- 38 confidential.

- 1 **Sec. 6.** RCW 74.34.050 and 1997 c 386 s 34 are each amended to read 2 as follows:
- 3 (1) A person participating in good faith in making a report under 4 this chapter or testifying about alleged abuse, neglect, abandonment,
- 5 ((or)) <u>financial</u> exploitation, <u>or self-neglect</u> of a vulnerable adult in
- 6 a judicial or administrative proceeding under this chapter is immune
- 7 from liability resulting from the report or testimony. The making of
- 8 permissive reports as allowed in ((RCW 74.34.030)) this chapter does
- 9 not create any duty to report and no civil liability shall attach for
- 10 any failure to make a permissive report ((under RCW 74.34.030)) as
- 11 allowed under this chapter.
- 12 (2) Conduct conforming with the reporting and testifying provisions
- 13 of this chapter shall not be deemed a violation of any confidential
- 14 communication privilege. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as
- 15 superseding or abridging remedies provided in chapter 4.92 RCW.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. A new section is added to chapter 74.34 RCW to read as follows:
- 18 (1) A person who is required to make a report under this chapter
- 19 and who knowingly fails to make the report is guilty of a gross
- 20 misdemeanor.
- 21 (2) A person who intentionally, maliciously, or in bad faith makes
- 22 a false report of alleged abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation,
- 23 or neglect of a vulnerable adult is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 8. A new section is added to chapter 74.34 RCW
- 25 to read as follows:
- 26 (1) The department shall initiate a response to a report, no later
- 27 than twenty-four hours after knowledge of the report, of suspected
- 28 abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect of
- 29 a vulnerable adult.
- 30 (2) When the initial report or investigation by the department
- 31 indicates that the alleged abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation,
- 32 or neglect may be criminal, the department shall make an immediate
- 33 report to the appropriate law enforcement agency. The department and
- 34 law enforcement will coordinate in investigating reports made under
- 35 this chapter. The department may provide protective services and other
- 36 remedies as specified in this chapter.

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- 1 (3) The law enforcement agency or the department shall report the 2 incident in writing to the proper county prosecutor or city attorney 3 for appropriate action whenever the investigation reveals that a crime 4 may have been committed.
- 5 (4) The department and law enforcement may share information 6 contained in reports and findings of abandonment, abuse, financial 7 exploitation, and neglect of vulnerable adults, consistent with RCW 8 74.04.060, 42.17.310, and other applicable confidentiality laws.
- 9 (5) The department shall notify the proper licensing authority 10 concerning any report received under this chapter that alleges that a 11 person who is professionally licensed, certified, or registered under 12 Title 18 RCW has abandoned, abused, financially exploited, or neglected 13 a vulnerable adult.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. A new section is added to chapter 74.34 RCW to read as follows:
- 16 (1) Where appropriate, an investigation by the department may 17 include a private interview with the vulnerable adult regarding the 18 alleged abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, or self-19 neglect.
- (2) In conducting the investigation, the department shall interview the complainant, unless anonymous, and shall use its best efforts to interview the vulnerable adult or adults harmed, and, consistent with the protection of the vulnerable adult shall interview facility staff, any available independent sources of relevant information, including if appropriate the family members of the vulnerable adult.
  - (3) The department may conduct ongoing case planning and consultation with: (a) Those persons or agencies required to report under this chapter or submit a report under this chapter; (b) consultants designated by the department; and (c) designated representatives of Washington Indian tribes if client information exchanged is pertinent to cases under investigation or the provision of protective services. Information considered privileged by statute and not directly related to reports required by this chapter must not be divulged without a valid written waiver of the privilege.
- 35 (4) The department shall prepare and keep on file a report of each 36 investigation conducted by the department for a period of time in 37 accordance with policies established by the department.

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(5) If the department determines that the vulnerable adult has suffered from abuse, neglect, self-neglect, abandonment, or financial exploitation, and lacks the ability or capacity to consent, and needs the protection of a guardian, the department may bring a guardianship action under chapter 11.88 RCW as an interested person.

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- 6 (6) When the investigation is completed and the department 7 incident of abandonment, abuse, determines that an financial 8 exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect has occurred, the department 9 shall inform the vulnerable adult of their right to refuse protective 10 services, and ensure that, if necessary, appropriate protective services are provided to the vulnerable adult, with the consent of the 11 12 vulnerable adult. The vulnerable adult has the right to withdraw or 13 refuse protective services.
- 14 (7) The department may photograph a vulnerable adult or their 15 environment for the purpose of providing documentary evidence of the physical condition of the vulnerable adult or his or her environment. 16 17 When photographing the vulnerable adult, the department shall obtain permission from the vulnerable adult or his or her legal representative 18 19 unless immediate photographing is necessary to preserve evidence. 20 However, if the legal representative is alleged to have abused, neglected, abandoned, or exploited the vulnerable adult, consent from 21 the legal representative is not necessary. 22 No such consent is 23 necessary when photographing the physical environment.
- 24 (8) When the investigation is complete and the department determines that the incident of abandonment, abuse, financial 26 exploitation, or neglect has occurred, the department shall inform the 27 facility in which the incident occurred, consistent confidentiality requirements concerning 28 the vulnerable adult, witnesses, and complainants. 29
- 30 Sec. 10. RCW 74.34.070 and 1997 c 386 s 35 are each amended to read as follows: 31
  - ((In responding to reports of alleged abuse, exploitation, neglect, or abandonment under this chapter, the department shall provide information to the frail elder or vulnerable adult on protective services available to the person and inform the person of the right to refuse such services.)) The department ((shall)) may develop cooperative agreements with community-based agencies ((servicing the abused elderly and)) providing services for vulnerable adults.

- 1 agreements shall cover ((such subjects as)): (1) The appropriate roles
- 2 and responsibilities of the department and community-based agencies in
- 3 identifying and responding to reports of alleged abuse( $(\tau)$ ); (2) the
- 4 provision of case-management services((-,)); (3) standardized data
- 5 collection procedures  $(( -))_{\underline{i}}$  and  $\underline{(4)}$  related coordination activities.
- 6 **Sec. 11.** RCW 74.34.080 and 1984 c 97 s 14 are each amended to read 7 as follows:
- 8 If access is denied to an employee of the department seeking to
- 9 investigate an allegation of <u>abandonment</u>, abuse, ((<del>neglect</del>,)) <u>financial</u>
- 10 exploitation, or ((abandonment)) neglect of a vulnerable adult by an
- 11 individual, the department may seek an injunction to prevent
- 12 interference with the investigation. The court shall issue the
- 13 injunction if the department shows that:
- 14 (1) There is reasonable cause to believe that the person is a
- 15 vulnerable adult and is or has been <u>abandoned</u>, abused, ((<del>neglected</del>,))
- 16 <u>financially</u> exploited, or ((<del>abandoned</del>)) <u>neglected</u>; and
- 17 (2) The employee of the department seeking to investigate the
- 18 report has been denied access.
- 19 **Sec. 12.** RCW 74.34.110 and 1986 c 187 s 5 are each amended to read
- 20 as follows:
- 21 An action known as a petition for an order for protection of a
- 22 vulnerable adult in cases of <u>abandonment</u>, abuse ((<del>or</del>)), <u>financial</u>
- 23 exploitation, or neglect is created.
- 24 (1) A vulnerable adult may seek relief from <u>abandonment</u>, abuse
- 25 ((or)), financial exploitation, or neglect, or the threat thereof, by
- 26 filing a petition for an order for protection in superior court.
- 27 (2) A petition shall allege that the petitioner is a vulnerable
- 28 adult and that the petitioner has been abandoned, abused ((or)),
- 29 <u>financially</u> exploited, or neglected, or is threatened with <u>abandonment</u>,
- 30 abuse ((or)), financial exploitation, or neglect by respondent.
- 31 (3) A petition shall be accompanied by affidavit made under oath
- 32 stating the specific facts and circumstances which demonstrate the need
- 33 for the relief sought.
- 34 (4) A petition for an order may be made whether or not there is a
- 35 pending lawsuit, complaint, petition, or other action between the
- 36 parties.

- 1 (5) A petitioner is not required to post bond to obtain relief in 2 any proceeding under this section.
- (6) An action under this section shall be filed in the county where the petitioner resides; except that if the petitioner has left the residence as a result of <u>abandonment</u>, abuse ((<del>or</del>)), <u>financial</u> exploitation, <u>or neglect</u>, or in order to avoid <u>abandonment</u>, abuse ((<del>or</del>)), <u>financial</u> exploitation, <u>or neglect</u>, the petitioner may bring an action in the county of either the previous or new residence.
- 9 (7) The filing fee for the petition may be waived at the discretion 10 of the court.
- 11 **Sec. 13.** RCW 74.34.130 and 1986 c 187 s 7 are each amended to read 12 as follows:
- The court may order relief as it deems necessary for the protection of the petitioner, including, but not limited to the following:
- 15 (1) Restraining respondent from committing acts of <u>abandonment</u>, 16 abuse ((<del>or</del>)), <u>neglect</u>, <u>or financial</u> exploitation;
- 17 (2) Excluding the respondent from petitioner's residence for a 18 specified period or until further order of the court;
- 19 (3) Prohibiting contact by respondent for a specified period or 20 until further order of the court;
- 21 (4) Requiring an accounting by respondent of the disposition of 22 petitioner's income or other resources;
- 23 (5) Restraining the transfer of property for a specified period not 24 exceeding ninety days;
- 25 (6) Requiring the respondent to pay the filing fee and court costs, 26 including service fees, and to reimburse the petitioner for costs 27 incurred in bringing the action, including a reasonable attorney's fee.
- Any relief granted by an order for protection, other than a judgment for costs, shall be for a fixed period not to exceed one year.
- 30 **Sec. 14.** RCW 74.34.180 and 1997 c 392 s 202 are each amended to 31 read as follows:
- (1) An employee or contractor who is a whistleblower and who as a result of being a whistleblower has been subjected to workplace reprisal or retaliatory action, has the remedies provided under chapter 49.60 RCW. RCW 4.24.500 through 4.24.520, providing certain protection
- 36 to persons who communicate to government agencies, apply to complaints
- 37 made under this section. The identity of a whistleblower who

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complains, in good faith, to the department or the department of health 1 2 suspected abandonment, abuse, ((<del>neglect,</del>)) financial 3 exploitation, or ((abandonment)) neglect by any person in a ((boarding 4 home)) facility, licensed or required to be licensed ((pursuant to 5 chapter 18.20 RCW or a veterans' home pursuant to chapter 72.36 RCW)), or care provided in a ((boarding home or a veterans' home)) facility or 6 7 in a home setting, by any person associated with a hospice, home care, 8 or home health agency licensed under chapter 70.127 RCW or other in-9 home provider, may remain confidential if requested. The identity of 10 the whistleblower shall subsequently remain confidential unless the department determines that the complaint was not made in good faith. 11

- (2)(a) An attempt to expel a resident from a ((boarding home or veterans' home)) facility, or any type of discriminatory treatment of a resident who is a consumer of hospice, home health, home care services, or other in-home services by whom, or upon whose behalf, a complaint substantiated by the department or the department of health has been submitted to the department or the department of health or any proceeding instituted under or related to this chapter within one year of the filing of the complaint or the institution of the action, raises a rebuttable presumption that the action was in retaliation for the filing of the complaint.
- (b) The presumption is rebutted by credible evidence establishing the alleged retaliatory action was initiated prior to the complaint.
  - (c) The presumption is rebutted by a ((functional assessment)) review conducted by the department that shows that the resident or consumer's needs cannot be met by the reasonable accommodations of the facility due to the increased needs of the resident.
    - (3) For the purposes of this section:

Investigations may be conducted regardless of the location of the 5 alleged abuse or neglect. Child protective services includes referral 6 7 to services to ameliorate conditions ((which)) that endanger the 8 welfare of children, the coordination of necessary programs and 9 services relevant to the prevention, intervention, and treatment of 10 child abuse and neglect, and services to children to ensure that each child has a permanent home. In determining whether protective services 11 12 should be provided, the department shall not decline to provide such services solely because of the child's unwillingness or developmental 13 inability to describe the nature and severity of the abuse or neglect. 14 15  $((\frac{19}{19}))$  <u>(17)</u> "Malice" or "maliciously" means an evil intent, wish, 16 or design to vex, annoy, or injure another person. (21)) (19) "Unfounded" means available information indicates that, where likely than not, child abuse or neglect did not occur.

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(1)(a) When any practitioner, county coroner or medical examiner, law enforcement officer, professional school personnel, registered or licensed nurse, social service counselor, psychologist, pharmacist, licensed or certified child care providers or their employees, employee of the department, juvenile probation officer, or state family and children's ombudsman or any volunteer in the ombudsman's office has reasonable cause to believe that a child ((or adult dependent or developmentally disabled person,)) has suffered abuse or neglect, he or she shall report such incident, or cause a report to be made, to the proper law enforcement agency or to the department as provided in RCW 26.44.040.

For the purposes of this subsection, "severe abuse" means any of the following: Any single act of abuse that causes physical trauma of sufficient severity that, if left untreated, could cause death; any single act of sexual abuse that causes significant bleeding, deep bruising, or significant external or internal swelling; or more than one act of physical abuse, each of which causes bleeding, deep bruising, significant external or internal swelling, bone fracture, or unconsciousness.
- (d) The report ((shall)) must be made at the first opportunity, but in no case longer than forty-eight hours after there is reasonable cause to believe that the child ((or adult)) has suffered abuse or neglect. The report ((shall)) must include the identity of the accused if known.
  - (2) The reporting requirement of subsection (1) of this section does not apply to the discovery of abuse or neglect that occurred during childhood if it is discovered after the child has become an adult. In all other cases, the department shall notify the law enforcement agency 11 12 within seventy-two hours after a report is received by the department. 13 If the department makes an oral report, a written report ((shall)) must also be made to the proper law enforcement agency within five days 14 15 thereafter.

The 16 department shall present the risk factors at all hearings in which the 17 placement of a dependent child is an issue. Substance abuse must be a 18 risk factor. The department shall provide 30 assurances of appropriate confidentiality of the identification of persons reporting under this section. Neither the substance of the complaint provided to the licensee or 5 contractor nor any copy of the complaint or related report published, 6 7 released, or made otherwise available shall disclose, or reasonably 8 lead to the disclosure of, the name, title, or identity of any 9 complainant, or other person mentioned in the complaint, except that 10 the name of the provider and the name or names of any officer, employee, or agent of the department conducting the investigation shall 11 be disclosed after the investigation has been closed and the complaint 12 13 has been substantiated. The department may disclose the identity of 14 the complainant if such disclosure is requested in writing by the 15 complainant. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to 16 interfere with the obligation of the long-term care ombudsman program or department staff to monitor the department's licensing, contract, 17 and complaint investigation files for long-term care facilities. 18

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(7) The resident has the right to be free of interference, coercion, discrimination, and reprisal from a facility in exercising his or her rights, including the right to voice grievances about treatment furnished or not furnished. A facility that provides longterm care services shall not discriminate or retaliate in any manner against a resident, employee, or any other person on the basis or for the reason that such resident or any other person made a complaint to the department, the attorney general, law enforcement agencies, or the long-term care ombudsman, provided information, or otherwise cooperated with the investigation of such a complaint. Any attempt to discharge a resident against the resident's wishes, or any type of retaliatory treatment of a resident by whom or upon whose behalf a complaint substantiated by the department has been made to the department, the attorney general, law enforcement agencies, or the long-term care ombudsman, within one year of the filing of the complaint, raises a rebuttable presumption that such action was in retaliation for the filing of the complaint. "Retaliatory treatment" means, but is not limited to, monitoring a resident's phone, mail, or visits; involuntary seclusion or isolation; transferring a resident to a different room unless requested or based upon legitimate management reasons; withholding or threatening to withhold food or treatment unless
