HOUSE BILL 2357

State of Washington 56th Legislature 2000 Regular Session

By Representatives Dickerson, Stensen, Huff, Gombosky, Clements, Kenney, Conway, Hurst, Van Luven and Edmonds

Read first time 01/11/2000. Referred to Committee on Health Care.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to establishing a cancer task force; creating new
- 2 sections; providing an expiration date; and declaring an emergency.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that:
- 5 (1) Over 200,000 men in the United States were diagnosed with 6 prostate cancer during the last year, and approximately forty-two
- 7 thousand American men died due to this disease;
- 8 (2) With an estimated nine million American men currently afflicted
- 9 with this disease, prostate cancer can be considered a serious epidemic
- 10 in the United States deserving immediate public health attention; and
- 11 (3) Significantly more research is needed to determine the causes
- 12 and most effective treatments for prostate cancer.
- 13 The legislature further finds that greater public awareness about
- 14 cancer prevention, strengthening cancer support networks, and fostering
- 15 the development community cancer prevention resources are an important
- 16 part of the legislature's goal of cancer prevention and the overall
- 17 improvement of our state's public health.

- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) There is established the prostate cancer task force to consist of seventeen members selected as follows:
- 3 (a) Two members of the house of representatives, one selected from 4 each of the caucuses;
- 5 (b) Two members of the senate, one selected from each of the 6 caucuses;
 - (c) Two members representing local public health officers;
- 8 (d) One member who is a physician and is a board certified 9 oncologist;
- 10 (e) One member who is a physician and is a board certified 11 urologist;
- 12 (f) Four members who are prostate cancer patients or survivors;
- 13 (g) One member who is a prostate cancer researcher; and
- (h) Four cancer advocates, no less than one of whom must represent the group most at risk of prostate cancer.
- 16 (2) The secretary of the department of health shall appoint all 17 nonlegislative members of the task force within thirty days from the 18 effective date of this act. The secretary shall consider obtaining a 19 geographical distribution and balance throughout the state.
- 20 (3) Staffing shall be provided by the department of health.
- 21 (4) Members of the task force shall serve without remuneration.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** The task force shall:

- (1) Conduct a survey and produce a resource guide of public and private community resources that assist persons with prostrate cancer and their families;
- 26 (2) Identify resources in Washington state that are devoted to 27 conducting prostate cancer research, detection, and treatment;
- 28 (3) Conduct a national survey of programs, education and training 29 resources, and research and assistance that could serve as a model for 30 Washington state;
- 31 (4) Develop a state-wide strategy for targeting information, 32 assistance, and direct care to groups that are most at risk of prostate 33 cancer, and determine the roles that local and state government, 34 institutions of higher education, and the private sector should play to 35 decrease the incidence of prostate cancer, increase the quality of life 36 for patients and survivors of prostate cancer, and foster the search 37 for a cure;

- 1 (5) Identify areas of the state that are most in need of cancer 2 information and assistance;
- 3 (6) Determine gaps in research, detection, and treatment of 4 prostate cancer in Washington state;
- 5 (7) Identify the salient nonmedical supportive needs of prostate 6 cancer patients and survivors and their families; and
- 7 (8) Provide a written report to the governor, the house of 8 representatives health care committee, and the senate committee on 9 health and long-term care by December 12, 2000, presenting the findings 10 and recommendations of the task force.
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** This act expires July 1, 2001.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. If any provision of this act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect immediately.
