1 AN ACT Relating to character education; amending RCW 28A.150.211;
2 and creating new sections.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that academic success
5 rests on a foundation of character. The legislature further finds that
6 parents are the first and primary moral educators of children, and that
7 schools have a role in reinforcing the character traits and values
8 deemed important by parents and the local community. The legislature
9 further finds that when character education is integrated into a
10 school's curriculum there is a decline of incidences involving
11 violence, bullying, and harassment. The legislature intends to
12 encourage school districts to integrate character education into each
13 school's curriculum. The legislature further intends that local
14 communities, in partnership with schools or school districts, will have
15 the responsibility for determining which character traits and values
16 are included in each district or school's character education program.

17 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.150.211 and 1994 c 245 s 10 are each amended to
18 read as follows:

1 (1) The legislature also recognizes that certain basic values and
2 character traits are essential to individual liberty, fulfillment, and
3 happiness. However, these values and traits are not intended to be
4 assessed or be standards for graduation. The legislature intends that
5 local communities have the responsibility for determining how these
6 values and character traits are learned as determined by consensus at
7 the local level. These values and traits include the importance of:

8 (~~(1)~~) (a) Honesty, integrity, and trust;

9 (~~(2)~~) (b) Respect for self and others;

10 (~~(3)~~) (c) Responsibility for personal actions and commitments;

11 (~~(4)~~) (d) Self-discipline and moderation;

12 (~~(5)~~) (e) Diligence and a positive work ethic;

13 (~~(6)~~) (f) Respect for law and authority;

14 (~~(7)~~) (g) Healthy and positive behavior; and

15 (~~(8)~~) (h) Family as the basis of society.

16 (2) Each school district is strongly encouraged to develop and
17 implement a character education program that incorporates into its
18 curriculum the character traits and values included in subsection (1)
19 of this section. Each school district is also strongly encouraged to
20 develop its character education program in partnership with parents and
21 the entire spectrum of stakeholders in its local community.

22 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) Subject to legislative funding, the
23 office of the superintendent of public instruction shall provide to
24 each school district that develops and implements a character education
25 program in partnership with parents and the entire spectrum of
26 stakeholders in its local community, under the provisions of RCW
27 28A.150.211, an amount for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2001, of one
28 dollar per full-time equivalent elementary school student, however,
29 each district shall receive at least two hundred dollars for each
30 elementary school operated by the district.

31 (2) A school district that receives funding in accordance with this
32 section shall certify to the superintendent of public instruction that
33 funds received were expended for the purposes of this act.

34 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. If specific funding for the purposes of this
35 act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not provided by

1 June 30, 2000, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and
2 void.

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
