1 AN ACT Relating to the family policy council; amending RCW
2 70.190.005, 70.190.040, and 70.190.070; adding a new section to chapter
3 70.190 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 28A.300 RCW; recodifying
4 RCW 70.190.040; and repealing RCW 70.190.050, 70.190.060, 70.190.065,
5 70.190.075, 70.190.080, 70.190.085, 70.190.090, 70.190.100, 70.190.110,
6 70.190.120, 70.190.130, 70.190.150, 70.190.160, 70.190.170, 70.190.180,
7 and 70.190.190.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

9 **Sec. 1.** RCW 70.190.005 and 1994 sp.s. c 7 s 301 are each amended
10 to read as follows:

11 The legislature finds that a primary goal of public involvement in
12 the lives of children has been to strengthen the family unit.

13 However, the legislature recognizes that traditional two-parent
14 families with one parent routinely at home are now in the minority. In
15 addition, extended family and natural community supports have eroded
16 drastically. The legislature recognizes that public policy assumptions
17 must be altered to account for this new social reality. Public effort
18 must be redirected to expand, support, strengthen, and help reconstruct

1 family and community (~~(networks)~~) associations to assist in meeting the
2 needs of children.

3 The legislature finds that a broad variety of services for children
4 and families has been independently designed over the years and that
5 the coordination and cost-effectiveness of these services will be
6 enhanced through the adoption of ((an)) a common approach (~~(that allows~~
7 ~~communities to prioritize and coordinate services to meet their local~~
8 ~~needs))~~) to their delivery. The legislature further finds that the most
9 successful programs for reaching and working with at-risk families and
10 children treat individuals' problems in the context of the family,
11 offer a broad spectrum of services, are flexible in the use of program
12 resources, and use staff who are trained in crossing traditional
13 program categories in order to broker services necessary to fully meet
14 a family's needs.

15 The legislature further finds that eligibility criteria,
16 expenditure restrictions, and reporting requirements of state and
17 federal categorical programs often create barriers toward the effective
18 use of resources for addressing the multiple problems of at-risk
19 families and children.

20 The purposes of this chapter are (1) to modify public policy and
21 programs to empower communities to support and respond to the needs of
22 individual families and children and (2) to improve the responsiveness
23 of services for children and families at risk by facilitating greater
24 coordination and flexibility in the use of funds by state and local
25 service agencies.

26 **Sec. 2.** RCW 70.190.040 and 1993 c 336 s 901 are each amended to
27 read as follows:

28 (1) The legislature finds that helping children to arrive at school
29 ready to learn is an important part of improving student learning.

30 (2) To the extent funds are appropriated, the (~~(family policy~~
31 ~~council))~~) superintendent of public instruction shall award grants to
32 community-based consortiums that submit comprehensive plans that
33 include strategies to improve readiness to learn.

34 **Sec. 3.** RCW 70.190.070 and 1994 sp.s. c 7 s 304 are each amended
35 to read as follows:

36 The community public health and safety networks shall:

1 (1) Review state and local public health data and analysis relating
2 to risk factors, protective factors, and at-risk children and youth;

3 (2) Prioritize the risk factors and protective factors to reduce
4 the likelihood of their children and youth being at risk. The
5 priorities shall be based upon public health data and assessment and
6 policy development standards provided by the department of health under
7 RCW 43.70.555; and

8 (3) Develop long-term comprehensive plans to reduce the rate of at-
9 risk children and youth; set definitive, measurable goals, based upon
10 the department of health standards; and project their desired
11 outcomes((÷

12 ~~(4) Distribute funds to local programs that reflect the locally~~
13 ~~established priorities and as provided in RCW 70.190.140;~~

14 ~~(5) Comply with outcome based standards;~~

15 ~~(6) Cooperate with the department of health and local boards of~~
16 ~~health to provide data and determine outcomes; and~~

17 ~~(7) Coordinate its efforts with anti-drug use efforts and~~
18 ~~organizations and maintain a high priority for combatting drug use by~~
19 ~~at-risk youth)).~~

20 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 70.190 RCW
21 to read as follows:

22 A county that contains one or more public health and safety
23 networks on the effective date of this section may retain the network
24 and use it to develop additional long-term comprehensive plans as
25 provided in RCW 70.190.070.

26 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. RCW 70.190.040 is recodified as a new
27 section in chapter 28A.300 RCW.

28 NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. The following acts or parts of acts are each
