- 1 TO THE HONORABLE WILLIAM J. CLINTON, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED
- 2 STATES, AND TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE
- 3 OF REPRESENTATIVES, AND TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF
- 4 THE UNITED STATES, IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE HONORABLE
- 5 MADELEINE ALBRIGHT, SECRETARY OF STATE:
- 6 We, your Memorialists, the Senate and House of Representatives of
- 7 the State of Washington, in legislative session assembled, respectfully
- 8 represent and petition as follows:
- 9 WHEREAS, The United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All
- 10 Forms of Discrimination Against Women was adopted by the United Nations
- 11 General Assembly on December 18, 1979, became an international treaty
- 12 on September 3, 1981, and as of December 1997, one hundred sixty-one
- 13 nations have ratified or acceded to the convention's provisions; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Although the United States is considered a world leader in
- 15 human rights, supports and has a position of leadership in the United
- 16 Nations, was an active participant in the drafting, and is a signatory
- 17 of the convention, the United States is one of the few nations that has
- 18 not ratified the treaty; and
- 19 WHEREAS, The spirit of the convention is rooted in the goals of the
- 20 United Nations and the United States that seek to affirm faith in

- 1 fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person,
- 2 and in the equal rights of men and women; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The convention provides a comprehensive framework for
- 4 challenging the various forces that have created and sustained
- 5 discrimination based on sex against half of the world's population and
- 6 the one hundred sixty-one nations that have ratified the convention
- 7 have agreed to follow the convention prescriptions; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Although women have made major gains in the struggle for
- 9 equality in social, business, political, legal, and educational fields,
- 10 there is much more to be accomplished; and through its support,
- 11 leadership, and prestige, the United States can help create a world
- 12 where women are no longer discriminated against and have achieved one
- 13 of the most fundamental of human rights, equality;
- NOW, THEREFORE, Your Memorialists respectfully pray that the United
- 15 States ratify the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All
- 16 Forms of Discrimination Against Women and to support the convention's
- 17 continuing goals.
- 18 BE IT RESOLVED, That copies of this Memorial be immediately
- 19 transmitted to the Honorable William J. Clinton, President of the
- 20 United States, the Honorable Madeleine Albright, Secretary of State,
- 21 the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the House of
- 22 Representatives, and each member of Congress from the State of
- 23 Washington.
