SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL 8013

State of Washington 56th Legislature 1999 Regular Session

- TO THE HONORABLE WILLIAM J. CLINTON, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, AND TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE
- 3 OF REPRESENTATIVES, AND TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF
- 4 THE UNITED STATES, IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED:
- We, your Memorialists, the Senate and House of Representatives of
- 6 the State of Washington, in legislative session assembled, respectfully
- 7 represent and petition as follows:
- 8 WHEREAS, Parts of Western Washington received the highest amount of
- 9 rainfall in state history between the months of November and February,
- 10 raining for ninety-one consecutive days and producing over fifty-five
- 11 inches of rain in King County; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Parts of the Olympic Peninsula, i.e., Lilliwaup, received
- 13 over one hundred fourteen inches of rain in a four-month period; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Sixty-one homes have been damaged and twenty-six homes are
- 15 uninhabitable in the area known as Carlyon Beach, with property losses
- 16 estimated at over ten million dollars; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Ground water problems will cost over two million dollars
- 18 to repair and currently no water or sewer systems are in operation; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Shoreline bulkheads are failing, and public facilities
- 20 expenses are estimated at one million dollars, excluding the cost of
- 21 geo-technical assistance; and

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1 WHEREAS, Washington State Department of Transportation estimates of 2 highway damages reach eleven million two hundred two thousand dollars, 3 and ten million dollars of those damages are in Mason County alone; and 4 WHEREAS, Local government estimates of damages to county roads and 5 city streets reach seven million three hundred ninety-two thousand four hundred thirty-five dollars; and 6

WHEREAS, Governor Locke's emergency proclamation now includes six western counties and directs state government to support emergency response activities as needed around the state and authorizes the Washington Military Department and its Emergency Management Division to coordinate state agencies in the affected areas; and

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WHEREAS, County officials are continuing to assess damages to 12 determine sufficient damage for justification of federal assistance; 13 14 and

WHEREAS, When damage from an event is so great it is beyond the capability of local and state government to repair, the Governor can ask the President to declare a disaster, thus making a variety of federal disaster assistance programs available to help restore communities to their predisaster condition;

NOW, THEREFORE, Your Memorialists respectfully pray that if the 20 Governor requests federal assistance, the President and the Federal 21 Emergency Management Agency will be sensitive to the needs of 22 Washington's citizens affected by the record rainfall. 23

24 BE IT RESOLVED, That copies of this Memorial be immediately transmitted to the Honorable William J. Clinton, President of the 26 United States, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and each member of Congress from the State of Washington. 28

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
