- AN ACT Relating to salmon recovery funding; amending RCW 75.46.005,
- 2 75.46.010, 75.46.040, 75.46.050, 75.46.060, 75.46.070, 75.46.100,
- 3 75.46.080, and 76.12.110; amending 1999 c 309 s 114 (uncodified);
- 4 amending 1999 c 309 s 129 (uncodified); amending 1999 c 309 s 304
- 5 (uncodified); adding new sections to chapter 75.46 RCW; adding a new
- 6 section to Title 79A RCW; creating a new section; repealing RCW
- 7 75.46.130; making appropriations; providing an effective date;
- 8 providing an expiration date; and declaring an emergency.
- 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 10 **Sec. 1.** RCW 75.46.005 and 1998 c 246 s 1 are each amended to read
- 11 as follows:
- 12 The legislature finds that repeated attempts to improve salmonid
- 13 fish runs throughout the state of Washington have failed to avert
- 14 listings of salmon and steelhead runs as threatened or endangered under
- 15 the federal endangered species act (16 U.S.C. Sec. 1531 et seq.).
- 16 These listings threaten the sport, commercial, and tribal fishing
- 17 industries as well as the economic well-being and vitality of vast
- 18 areas of the state. It is the intent of the legislature to begin
- 19 activities required for the recovery of salmon stocks as soon as

possible, although the legislature understands that successful recovery efforts may not be realized for many years because of the life cycle of salmon and the complex array of natural and human-caused problems they face.

5 The legislature finds that it is in the interest of the citizens of the state of Washington for the state to retain primary responsibility 6 7 for managing the natural resources of the state, rather than abdicate 8 those responsibilities to the federal government, and that the state 9 may best accomplish this objective by integrating local and regional recovery activities into a state-wide plan that can make the most 10 effective use of provisions of federal laws allowing for a state lead 11 in salmon recovery. The legislature also finds that a state-wide 12 salmon recovery plan must be developed and implemented through an 13 active public involvement process in order to ensure public 14 participation in, and support for, salmon recovery. 15 The legislature also finds that there is a substantial link between the provisions of 16 the federal endangered species act and the federal clean water act (33 17 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq.). The legislature further finds that habitat 18 19 restoration is a vital component of salmon recovery efforts. 20 Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature to specifically address salmon habitat restoration in a coordinated manner and to develop a 21 structure that allows for the coordinated delivery of federal, state, 22 and local assistance to communities for habitat projects that will 23 24 assist in the recovery and enhancement of salmon stocks.

The legislature also finds that credible scientific review and oversight is essential for any salmon recovery effort to be successful.

The legislature further finds that it is important to monitor the overall health of the salmon resource to determine if recovery efforts are providing expected returns. It is important to monitor salmon habitat projects and salmon recovery activities to determine their effectiveness in order to secure federal acceptance of the state's approach to salmon recovery. Adaptive management cannot exist without monitoring. For these reasons, the legislature believes that a coordinated and integrated monitoring process should be developed.

The legislature therefore finds that a coordinated framework for responding to the salmon crisis is needed immediately. To that end, the salmon recovery office should be created within the governor's office to provide overall coordination of the state's response; an independent science ((team)) panel is needed to provide scientific

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- 1 review and oversight; a coordinated state funding process should be
- 2 <u>established through a salmon recovery funding board;</u> the appropriate
- 3 local or tribal government should provide local leadership in
- 4 identifying and sequencing habitat ((restoration)) projects to be
- 5 funded by state agencies; habitat ((restoration)) projects should be
- 6 implemented without delay; and a strong locally based effort to restore
- 7 salmon habitat should be established by providing a framework to allow
- 8 citizen volunteers to work effectively.
- 9 **Sec. 2.** RCW 75.46.010 and 1998 c 246 s 2 are each amended to read 10 as follows:
- 11 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter 12 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
- 13 (1) "Adaptive management" means reliance on scientific methods to 14 test the results of actions taken so that the management and related 15 policy can be changed promptly and appropriately.
- 16 (2) "Board" means the salmon recovery funding board created in section 3 of this act.
- 18 <u>(3)</u> "Critical pathways methodology" means a project scheduling and 19 management process for examining interactions between habitat projects 20 and salmonid species, prioritizing habitat projects, and assuring 21 positive benefits from habitat projects.
- (((3))) (4) "Habitat project list" is the list of <u>habitat</u> projects resulting from the critical pathways methodology under RCW 75.46.070(2) that shall receive consideration for funding by the salmon recovery funding board. Each project on the list must have a written agreement from the landowner on whose land the project will be implemented, and must be based on the limiting factors analysis conducted in RCW 75.46.070 when completed.
- 29 (5) "Habitat projects" or "projects" include but are not limited to 30 habitat restoration projects, habitat protection projects, habitat projects that improve water quality, habitat projects that protect 31 32 water quality, habitat-related mitigation projects, and habitat project 33 <u>corrective</u> maintenance and monitoring activities. Projects that 34 include the use of side channels, off-stream rearing enhancement, improvement in overwintering habitat, or use of acclimation ponds shall 35 receive consideration for funding. 36
- (((4))) (6) "Habitat work schedule" means those projects from the habitat project list that will be implemented during the current

- 1 funding cycle. The schedule shall also include a list of the entities
- 2 and individuals implementing projects, the start date, duration,
- 3 estimated date of completion, estimated cost, and funding sources for
- 4 the projects.
- 5 $((\frac{5}{}))$ <u>(7)</u> "Limiting factors" means conditions that limit the
- 6 ability of habitat to fully sustain populations of salmon. ((These
- 7 factors are primarily fish passage barriers and degraded estuarine
- 8 areas, riparian corridors, stream channels, and wetlands.
- 9 (6))) (8) "Listed stocks" means salmon and trout stocks that are
- 10 <u>listed or proposed for listing as threatened or endangered under the</u>
- 11 federal endangered species act, 16 U.S.C. Sec. 1531 et seg.
- 12 (9) "Project sponsor" is a county, city, special district, tribal
- 13 government, state agency, a combination of such governments through
- 14 interlocal or interagency agreement((s provided under chapter 39.34
- 15 RCW)), a nonprofit organization, or one or more private citizens.
- 16 $((\frac{7}{}))$ (10) "Salmon" includes all species of the family Salmonidae
- 17 which are capable of self-sustaining, natural production except for
- 18 Atlantic salmon.
- 19 <u>(11) "Salmon recovery activities" or "activities" includes but is</u>
- 20 not limited to habitat protection or restoration activities by local
- 21 governments, tribes, other public entities, and private entities. The
- 22 <u>activities must have as a principal purpose the protection and</u>
- 23 restoration of salmonid populations. "Activities" may include:
- 24 Preparation of stream corridor guidelines, programmatic permitting, and
- 25 preparation of geographic information system protocols. "Activities"
- 26 do not include updates related to the growth management act.
- 27 (12) "Salmon recovery plan" means a state plan developed in
- 28 response to a proposed or actual listing under the federal endangered
- 29 species act that addresses limiting factors including, but not limited
- 30 to harvest, hatchery, hydropower, habitat, and other factors of
- 31 decline.
- 32 (((9))) <u>(13) "Interagency team" or "team" means the interagency</u>
- 33 review team created in RCW 75.46.080.
- 34 (14) "Tribe" or "tribes" means federally recognized Indian tribes.
- 35 $\left(\left(\frac{10}{10}\right)\right)$ "WRIA" means a water resource inventory area
- 36 established in chapter 173-500 WAC as it existed on January 1, 1997.
- $((\frac{11}{11}))$ (16) "Owner" means the person holding title to the land or
- 38 the person under contract with the owner to lease or manage the legal
- 39 owner's property.

- 1 (17) "SASSI" means the salmon and steelhead stock inventory report
- 2 and appendices.
- 3 (18) "SSHIAP" means the salmon and steelhead habitat inventory and
- 4 <u>assessment project.</u>
- 5 (19) "Technical review team" means the salmon recovery technical
- 6 review team created in section 7 of this act.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 75.46 RCW to read as follows:
- 9 (1) The salmon recovery funding board is created consisting of ten 10 members.
- (2) Five members of the board shall be voting members who are 11 12 appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the senate. One of these voting members shall be a cabinet-level appointment as the 13 14 governor's representative to the board. Board members who represent the general public shall not have a financial or regulatory interest in 15 16 salmon recovery. The governor shall appoint one of the general public members of the board as the chair. The voting members of the board 17 18 shall be appointed for terms of four years, except that two members 19 initially shall be appointed for terms of two years and three members shall initially be appointed for terms of three years. In making the 20 appointments, the governor shall seek a board membership that 21 22 collectively provide the expertise necessary to provide strong fiscal 23 oversight of salmon recovery expenditures, and that provide extensive 24 knowledge of local government processes and functions 25 understanding of issues relevant to salmon recovery in Washington state. The governor shall appoint at least three of the voting members 26 27 of the board no later than ninety days after the effective date of this section. Vacant positions on the board shall be filled in the same 28 29 manner as the original appointments. The governor may remove members 30 of the board for good cause.
- In addition to the five voting members of the board, the following 31 five state officials shall serve as ex officio nonvoting members of the 32 33 The director of the department of fish and wildlife, the board: 34 executive director of the conservation commission, the secretary of transportation, the director of the department of ecology, and the 35 36 commissioner of public lands. The state officials serving in an ex officio capacity may designate a representative of their respective 37 agencies to serve on the board in their behalf. Such designations 38

- 1 shall be made in writing and in such manner as is specified by the 2 board.
- 3 (3) Staff support to the board shall be provided by the interagency 4 committee for outdoor recreation. For administrative purposes, the 5 board shall be located with the interagency committee for outdoor
- 7 (4) Members of the board who do not represent state agencies shall 8 be compensated as provided by RCW 43.03.250. Members of the board 9 shall be reimbursed for travel expenses as provided by RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 75.46 RCW to read as follows:
- (1) The board is responsible for making grants and loans for salmon habitat projects and salmon recovery activities from the amounts appropriated to the board for this purpose. To accomplish this purpose the board may:
- 17 (a) Provide assistance to grant applicants regarding the procedures 18 and criteria for grant and loan awards;
- (b) Make and execute all manner of contracts and agreements with public and private parties as the board deems necessary, consistent with the purposes of this chapter;
- (c) Accept any gifts, grants, or loans of funds, property, or financial or other aid in any form from any other source on any terms that are not in conflict with this chapter;
- 25 (d) Adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW as necessary to carry out 26 the purposes of this chapter; and
- (e) Do all acts and things necessary or convenient to carry out the powers expressly granted or implied under this chapter.
- 29 (2) The interagency committee for outdoor recreation shall provide 30 all necessary grants and loans administration assistance to the board, 31 and shall distribute funds as provided by the board in section 5 of 32 this act.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 75.46 RCW to read as follows:
- 35 (1) The board shall develop procedures and criteria for allocation 36 of funds for salmon habitat projects and salmon recovery activities on 37 a state-wide basis to address the highest priorities for salmon habitat

recreation.

- l protection and restoration. To the extent practicable the board shall
- 2 adopt an annual allocation of funding. The allocation should address
- 3 both protection and restoration of habitat, and should recognize the
- 4 varying needs in each area of the state on an equitable basis. The
- 5 board has the discretion to partially fund, or to fund in phases,
- 6 salmon habitat projects. The board may annually establish a maximum
- 7 amount of funding available for any individual project, subject to
- 8 available funding. No projects required solely as a mitigation or a
- 9 condition of permitting are eligible for funding.
- 10 (2)(a) In evaluating, ranking, and awarding funds for projects and 11 activities the board shall give preference to projects that:
- 12 (i) Are based upon the limiting factors analysis identified under 13 RCW 75.46.070;
- 14 (ii) Provide a greater benefit to salmon recovery based upon the 15 stock status information contained in the department of fish and
- 16 wildlife salmonid stock inventory (SASSI), the salmon and steelhead
- 17 habitat inventory and assessment project (SSHIAP), and any comparable
- 18 science-based assessment when available;
- 19 (iii) Will benefit listed species and other fish species; and
- 20 (iv) Will preserve high quality salmonid habitat.
- 21 (b) In evaluating, ranking, and awarding funds for projects and
- 22 activities the board shall also give consideration to projects that:
- 23 (i) Are the most cost-effective;
- 24 (ii) Have the greatest matched or in-kind funding; and
- 25 (iii) Will be implemented by a sponsor with a successful record of 26 project implementation.
- 27 (3) The board may reject, but not add, projects from a habitat 28 project list submitted by a lead entity for funding.
- 29 (4) For fiscal year 2000, the board may authorize the interagency
- 30 review team to evaluate, rank, and make funding decisions for
- 31 categories of projects or activities or from funding sources provided
- 32 for categories of projects or activities. In delegating such authority
- 33 the board shall consider the review team's staff resources, procedures,
- 34 and technical capacity to meet the purposes and objectives of this
- 35 chapter. The board shall maintain general oversight of the team's
- 36 exercise of such authority.
- 37 (5) The board shall seek the guidance of the technical review team
- 38 to ensure that scientific principles and information are incorporated
- 39 into the allocation standards and into proposed projects and

- activities. If the technical review team determines that a habitat project list complies with the critical pathways methodology under RCW 75.46.070, it shall provide substantial weight to the list's project priorities when making determinations among applications for funding of projects within the area covered by the list.
- (6) The board shall establish criteria for determining when block 6 7 grants may be made to a lead entity or other recognized regional 8 recovery entity consistent with one or more habitat project lists 9 developed for that region. Where a lead entity has been established pursuant to RCW 75.46.060, the board may provide grants to the lead 10 entity to assist in carrying out lead entity functions under this 11 chapter, subject to available funding. The board shall determine an 12 13 equitable minimum amount of funds for each region, and shall distribute the remainder of funds on a competitive basis. 14
- 15 (7) The board may waive or modify portions of the allocation procedures and standards adopted under this section in the award of 16 grants or loans to conform to legislative appropriations directing an 17 alternative award procedure or when the funds to be awarded are from 18 19 federal or other sources requiring other allocation procedures or 20 standards as a condition of the board's receipt of the funds. board shall develop an integrated process to manage the allocation of 21 22 funding from federal and state sources to minimize delays in the award 23 of funding while recognizing the differences in state and legislative 24 appropriation timing.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 75.46 RCW to read as follows:
- (1) Habitat project lists shall be submitted to the salmon recovery funding board for funding by January 1st and July 1st of each year beginning in 2000. The board shall provide the legislature with a list of the proposed projects and a list of the projects funded by October 1st of each year beginning in 2000 for informational purposes.
- 32 (2) The interagency committee for outdoor recreation shall track 33 all funds allocated for salmon habitat projects and salmon recovery 34 activities on behalf of the board, including both funds allocated by 35 the board and funds allocated by other state or federal agencies for 36 salmon recovery or water quality improvement.
- 37 (3) Beginning in December 2000, the board shall provide a biennial 38 report to the governor and the legislature on salmon recovery

- 1 expenditures. This report shall be coordinated with the state of the 2 salmon report required under RCW 75.46.030.
- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** A new section is added to chapter 75.46 RCW 4 to read as follows:
- (1) The salmon recovery technical review team is created. 5 The technical review team is composed of no less than five members selected 6 7 by the director of fish and wildlife. The director shall ensure that 8 lead scientists representing state, tribal, federal, and local 9 government interests are represented on the technical review team, and shall include members representing the private sector. Members of the 10 technical review team shall have an educational and professional 11 scientific background in salmonids, salmonid habitat, or related 12 13 fields. The members of the technical review team shall not serve any 14 fixed term. The numbers of members of the technical review team may be 15 increased or decreased depending on the need for scientific expertise, 16 but the technical review team must always consist of at least five members. Administrative support for the technical review team is 17 18 provided by the department of fish and wildlife. Assignments and direction to the technical review team shall be made by the chair of 19 the technical review team. The chair of the technical review team 20 shall be designated by the members of the team. 21
- 22 (2) The technical review team is responsible for receiving habitat 23 project lists submitted by lead entities under RCW 75.46.060, for 24 screening and ranking projects on such lists, for providing its ranking 25 of projects, within categories on a statewide basis, to the board, and determining whether the critical pathways methodology under RCW 26 27 75.46.070 has been complied with in the development and ranking of projects on the habitat project list. The technical review team shall 28 29 review and rank the projects submitted from across the state for 30 funding, organize pertinent information, and provide the board with its findings. The technical review team shall make an active effort to 31 communicate the criteria for reviewing and ranking projects with the 32 33 lead entities. The technical review team shall make information available to lead entities regarding deficiencies in projects that 34 result in their low ranking in the review process. The technical 35 36 review team may not remove a project from a habitat project list.
- 37 (3) The technical review team is also responsible for working in 38 conjunction with the independent science panel to develop standardized

- 1 monitoring indicators and data quality guidelines for habitat projects
- 2 and salmon recovery activities across the state, and for recommending
- 3 criteria for the systematic and periodic evaluation of monitoring data
- 4 to help ensure the effectiveness of the state's salmon recovery
- 5 efforts.
- 6 **Sec. 8.** RCW 75.46.040 and 1998 c 246 s 5 are each amended to read 7 as follows:
- 8 (1) The salmon recovery office is created within the office of the
- 9 governor to coordinate state strategy to allow for salmon recovery to
- 10 healthy sustainable population levels with productive commercial and
- 11 recreational fisheries. The primary purpose of the office is to
- 12 coordinate and assist in the development of salmon recovery plans for
- 13 evolutionarily significant units, and submit those plans to the
- 14 appropriate tribal governments and federal agencies ((in response to
- 15 the federal endangered species act)) as an integral part of a state-
- 16 wide strategy developed consistent with the guiding principles and
- 17 procedures under section 9 of this act. The governor's salmon recovery
- 18 office may also:
- 19 (a) Act as liaison to local governments, the state congressional
- 20 delegation, the United States congress, federally recognized tribes,
- 21 and the federal executive branch agencies for issues related to the
- 22 state's endangered species act salmon recovery plans; and
- 23 (b) Provide the biennial state of the salmon report to the
- 24 legislature pursuant to RCW 75.46.030.
- 25 (2) This section expires June 30, 2006.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. A new section is added to chapter 75.46 RCW
- 27 to read as follows:
- 28 (1) By September 1, 1999, the governor, with the assistance of the
- 29 salmon recovery office, shall submit a state-wide salmon recovery
- 30 strategy to the appropriate federal agencies administering the federal
- 31 endangered species act.
- 32 (2) The governor and the salmon recovery office shall be guided by
- 33 the following considerations in developing the strategy:
- 34 (a) The strategy should identify state-wide initiatives and
- 35 responsibilities with regional and local watershed initiatives as the
- 36 principal mechanism for implementing the strategy;

- 1 (b) The strategy should emphasize collaborative, incentive-based 2 approaches;
- 3 (c) The strategy should address all factors limiting the recovery 4 of Washington's listed salmon stocks, including habitat and water quality degradation, harvest and hatchery management, inadequate 5 streamflows, and other barriers to fish passage. Where other limiting 6 factors are beyond the state's jurisdictional authorities to respond 7 to, such as some natural predators and high seas fishing, the strategy 8 9 shall include the state's requests for federal action to effectively 10 address these factors;
- 11 (d) The strategy should identify immediate actions necessary to 12 prevent extinction of a listed salmon stock, establish performance 13 measures to determine if restoration efforts are working, recommend 14 effective monitoring and data management, and recommend to the 15 legislature clear and certain measures to be implemented if performance 16 goals are not met;
- (e) The strategy shall rely on the best scientific information as available and provide for incorporation of new information as it is obtained;
- (f) The strategy should seek a fair allocation of the burdens and costs upon economic and social sectors of the state whose activities may contribute to limiting the recovery of salmon; and
- (g) The strategy should seek clear measures and procedures from the appropriate federal agencies for removing Washington's salmon stocks from listing under the federal act.
- 26 (3) Beginning on September 1, 2000, the strategy shall be updated 27 through an active public involvement process, including early and 28 meaningful opportunity for public comment. In obtaining public 29 comment, the salmon recovery office shall hold public meetings 30 throughout the state and shall encourage regional and local recovery 31 planning efforts to similarly ensure an active public involvement 32 process.
- 33 (4) This section shall apply prospectively only and not 34 retroactively. Nothing in this section shall be construed to 35 invalidate actions taken in recovery planning at the local, regional, 36 or state level prior to the effective date of this section.
- 37 **Sec. 10.** RCW 75.46.050 and 1998 c 246 s 6 are each amended to read 38 as follows:

- (1) The governor shall request the national academy of sciences, 1 the American fisheries society, or a comparable institution to screen 2 3 candidates to serve as members on the independent science panel. 4 institution that conducts the screening of the candidates shall submit 5 a list of the nine most qualified candidates to the governor, the speaker of the house of representatives, and the majority leader of the 6 7 senate. The candidates shall reflect expertise in habitat requirements 8 of salmon, protection and restoration of salmon populations, artificial 9 propagation of salmon, hydrology, or geomorphology.
- 10 (2) The speaker of the house of representatives and the majority 11 leader in the senate ((shall)) may each remove one name from the 12 nomination list. The shall consult with tribal governor 13 representatives and the governor shall appoint five scientists from the remaining names on the nomination list. 14
 - (3) The members of the independent science panel shall serve four-year terms. Vacant positions on the panel shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments. Members shall serve no more than two full terms. The independent science panel members shall elect the chair of the panel among themselves every two years. ((The members of the independent science panel shall be compensated as provided in RCW 43.03.250 and reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.)) Based upon available funding, the governor's salmon recovery office may contract for services with members of the independent science panel for compensation under chapter 39.29 RCW.
 - (4) The independent science panel shall be governed by generally accepted guidelines and practices governing the activities of independent science boards such as the national academy of sciences. The purpose of the independent science panel is to help ensure that sound science is used in salmon recovery efforts. The governor's salmon recovery office shall request review of salmon recovery plans by the science review panel. The science ((review)) panel does not have the authority to review individual projects or habitat project lists developed under RCW 75.46.060, 75.46.070, and 75.46.080 or to make policy decisions. The panel shall periodically submit its findings and recommendations under this subsection to the legislature and the governor.
- 37 (5) The independent science panel ((shall submit its findings to 38 the legislature and the governor)), in conjunction with the technical 39 review team, shall recommend standardized monitoring indicators and

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- 1 <u>data quality guidelines for use by entities involved in habitat</u> 2 <u>projects and salmon recovery activities across the state.</u>
- 3 (6) The independent science panel, in conjunction with the 4 technical review team, shall also recommend criteria for the systematic 5 and periodic evaluation of monitoring data in order for the state to be 6 able to answer critical questions about the effectiveness of the 7 state's salmon recovery efforts.
- 8 (7) The recommendations on monitoring as required in this section 9 shall be provided in a report to the governor and to the legislature by the independent science panel, in conjunction with the salmon recovery 10 office, no later than December 31, 2000. The report shall also include 11 recommendations on the level of effort needed to sustain monitoring of 12 salmon projects and other recovery efforts, and any other 13 recommendations on monitoring deemed important by the independent 14 science panel and the technical review team. The report may be 15 16 included in the biennial state of the salmon report required under RCW 17 75.46.030.
