1 AN ACT Relating to creating a developmental disabilities ombudsman;  
2 and creating new sections.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature recognizes that an  
5 increasing number of individuals with developmental disabilities  
6 receive services in home and community-based settings and are not  
7 served by the long-term care ombudsman program. The legislature  
8 intends to promote the quality of services and increase consumer  
9 protections for individuals with developmental disabilities by  
10 investigating the best method of providing ombudsman services.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** The department of community, trade, and  
12 economic development shall, by December 31, 2001, prepare and present  
13 to the legislature and the governor, directly or by contract, a report  
14 of the feasibility, and advantages and disadvantages, of combining a  
15 developmental disabilities ombudsman program with the long-term care  
16 ombudsman program in chapter 43.190 RCW and the family and children's  
17 ombudsman program in chapter 43.06A RCW. The report shall also  
18 incorporate recommendations on having a single state ombudsman program,

1 serving persons in long-term care, persons with developmental  
2 disabilities, consumers of mental health services, and persons  
3 receiving families and children's services. The report shall provide  
4 recommendations on serving persons with developmental disabilities not  
5 currently being served by any ombudsman program, avoiding duplication  
6 of services, and providing comprehensive services, while respecting the  
7 unique needs of individuals.

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
