SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 6590

- 1 AN ACT Relating to improving K-12 preparedness and performance
- 2 through promoting better oral health; adding new sections to chapter
- 3 43.70 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 43.20A RCW; and creating a
- 4 new section.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that dental
- 7 problems impede children's success in school and affect their overall
- 8 health by undermining their nutrition, speech development,
- 9 concentration, and school attendance. Lack of treatment for dental
- 10 health issues is estimated to result nationally in a loss of one
- 11 million six hundred thousand school days annually, according to the
- 12 national center for health statistics.
- 13 (2) The legislature recognizes that, according to a *United States*
- 14 Surgeon General Report of 2000: Oral Health in America, dental disease
- 15 is the most common chronic infectious disease facing our children today
- 16 and is five times more common than asthma in children ages five to
- 17 seventeen.
- 18 (3) The legislature recognizes that dental disease begins early,
- 19 with fourteen percent of one and two year olds studied by the state

- 1 department of health experiencing dental decay. Dental decay
- 2 prevalence increases with age, affecting fifty-four percent of
- 3 Washington second graders. Decay in this age group increased between
- 4 the 1994 and 2000 surveys.
- 5 (4) The legislature declares that measures such as oral health
- 6 screenings and access to oral health disease prevention methods should
- 7 be readily available to children in a variety of health care settings,
- 8 including dental, medical clinic, and family physician settings. If
- 9 prevention methods are employed, there will be substantial savings to
- 10 the state's overburdened health care system.
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 43.70 RCW
- 12 to read as follows:
- The superintendent of public instruction, the department of health,
- 14 and the department of social and health services are encouraged to
- 15 collectively and collaboratively develop a plan that promotes age
- 16 appropriate oral health screenings and preventive services at age one
- 17 and at age five, or before entering a public or private school setting.
- 18 The departments may report to the legislature on their findings and
- 19 recommendations.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 43.20A RCW
- 21 to read as follows:
- 22 (1) The secretary is encouraged to design and implement a program
- 23 of oral health prevention training sessions for physicians, physician
- 24 assistants, and advanced registered nurse practitioners in each county
- 25 no less than once per year, or at appropriate intervals in counties
- 26 with lower numbers of resident physicians. This training should be
- 27 modeled to complement existing mandates for oral cavity exams and be
- 28 consistent with existing reimbursement for fluoride varnish
- 29 applications by primary care providers.
- 30 (2) Physicians participating in the department training program
- 31 under subsection (1) of this section shall receive continuing medical
- 32 education credits for their completion in the program. Credits shall
- 33 be awarded on a continuing medical education level 1 basis.
- 34 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 43.70 RCW
- 35 to read as follows:

- 1 The department is encouraged to develop methods for promoting the
- 2 use of oral health coordinators in local health jurisdictions that
- 3 currently function without these resources.
